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Stripped of their rights

Why strippers and sex workers are fighting for the love of their jobs

When I first meet Maia* and Olivia*, they give me huge hugs and smiles, and tell me how excited they are to share their experiences. On paper, they're both uncannily similar to me: the same age, the same occupation (students), the same city. One difference? Their part time jobs: outside of university, Maia and Olivia are strippers.

Maia started after her first year of study. "I was struggling to pay rent, and I was working two jobs at that point. I've been a dancer my whole life. I was looking at pole classes. I went to a class, and [an ad] came up. And I was like, I could learn how to do pole for free, and maybe even make some money. The club was super busy. It really got me hooked, basically. It was just really, really fun."

Olivia has a similar story. "I started when I was 19, about two weeks after I had just broken up with my long term boyfriend. And it was a very thrilling experience. I sucked at hospitality, so I was like, 'Okay, let's get more money. And let's reclaim my sexuality.' I wanted independence from my boyfriend who was very controlling over that kind of stuff. It's a massive 'fuck you' to absolutely love [stripping]."

On the surface level, it might seem that both Maia and Olivia got into sex work because of the money. However, looking beyond that, into their answers, that's not the sole truth. What is clear is these two women in front of me are not vulnerable women being forced into the industry out of desperation or coercion, the way that sex work is widely characterised in the media. They're there to make money, but also because they have a passion. Olivia and I get to discussing the commonly held bias that all sex work is out of necessity, and the notion that the women involved in it are "selling their bodies."

"I've definitely run into some people who will say, 'I support sex workers. But isn't it kind of fucked up that we have sex work as an industry like stripping?' And I'm like, not really, actually. There's nothing inherently sexist about stripping. We have

male strippers, as well. It's a job, and one that has a special place in my heart. I get really uncomfortable when people say, 'Oh, you're selling your body.' When they're selling their body too! You don't want to be at a café, making coffee for eight hours. Your feet are sore, you're tired, you need to nap when you get home. You're selling your body and your labour to your job."

Both women speak of their love for dancing, and their love for the sisterhood that they've found within their clubs. Olivia says, "I truly feel that when I go to work, it's like, one of the most exciting parts of my day, and has like a sisterhood sort of back that I haven't felt since like high school. It's a really beautiful environment."

However, both women acknowledge that it's not all glamour. It's gritty, hard and terrifying work, even though neither of their clubs perform "full service" sex work. The problems start with the absence of worker protections available to them. On paper, most strippers are independent contractors, like Maia and Olivia. They'll pay their own taxes, and their own ACC, after they're paid out by their employer.

But, for many strippers, this is about where the liberties of being treated as an indepent contractor stop. Normally, independent contractors have the ability to work "freelance". Their hours are flexible, on an "as-needed" basis. However, Maia and Olivia are rostered onto regular, weekly shifts at their club. When asked what happens if they don't make it into a shift or want a different one, Maia comments, "I have seen people get told to leave, if they're late, despite the fact that we're independent contractors. They're babysitting our own hours."

Olivia echoes this: "We have to go get a doctor's certificate if we want a night off because we're sick. It's even more controlling than other employee situations. Like, if we were really independent contractors, we just wouldn't go to work? I actually [suffered a minor injury] at work. And I didn't want to leave work, because I was kind of concerned I would get fined if I left work early. I had to get my manager to reassure me that I wasn't going to get fined...that's the most vulnerable position I've ever been in at work. And that says a lot, considering what I do for work!"

Independent contractors have the ability to profit on their own account as a tradeoff for lack of access to paid sick leave, holiday pay, and personal grievance or redundancy protections. However, Maia and Olivia can't set their own rates, and their club takes 35% of all their gross earnings, including all their tips. Maia comments, "I don't see anything that goes through the bar. I don't see anything that comes through the doors." Olivia adds, "The reason that people are coming into our club is because we're there and they feel entitled to take 35% of everything. Someone at our club calculated a very rough estimate [of what our boss makes]...she estimated he probably makes nearly two grand a week. We're only open three nights a week. And he's not there



three nights a week. So why is he making more than me?"

Maia sighs. "My club is really good in terms of strip clubs. Terrible in terms of employment.

I'd love to be able to work just when it's busy. To come in for a certain amount of hours and then leave again. I would love to be able to get more of my percentage pay."

Ive heard a lot of people in my lifetime disparage the amount that sex workers get paid. After listening to the stories of Maia and Olivia, I don't think they're paid enough for the weight they take on. Much like any other work, if you're taking on a high level of risk and responsibility for that work, you should be paid highly. For strippers, the risk and the power imbalance is through the roof.

When baby strippers (stripper newbies) come into the club, Maia tells them this: "When you're in the club, every single man there is predatory. They're in the club for a reason. They can't get a girlfriend, they can't get attention. They're getting a divorce. All sorts of things. Recently, a guy came in to celebrate the birth of his newborn baby. You have to be really on guard for every single man that comes in, so we have rules that we set out at the very beginning of



each dance. Which is, don't lick, don't kiss, don't touch between the legs, don't get your dick out. And you can add any rules to that that you want. Some girls don't like their nipples being touched. It depends on the girl, we make it ambivalent, as long as you stick to the like, 'we're not a brothel rules."

Of course, their rules are often ignored by the men that come through the club doors. Maia tells me she's had a man kiss her thighs because he didn't think it was "on the mouth."

Olivia says, "It's honestly like a little treat when they don't try to push [the rules] which is horrible. Yeah, the bar is in hell."

"I've been assaulted in lap dance rooms in clubs that have had management pressure me to do lap dances for people I didn't want to give lap dances to...I've known friends who have been sexually assaulted and raped. Everyone deals with it differently; some tell management, some don't because they feel disempowered or like they won't be believed. When this was the case for me, I was scared to tell management that something had happened for fear that they would fine me, or other girls would be mad at me, for doing 'extra' services, or not being upstanding enough. I asked the person to pay me more money to keep me quiet, even though I had the intention to keep quiet anyway because of the complicated dynamic from not being protected in the first place. I still feel a lot of shame for this and worry about what other girls would think if they found out."

The pain Olivia shares is an important reminder that this is not work to be romanticised. Many women like her deal with fear, shame and trauma just by virtue of trying to do their jobs. In their current clubs, both women say they can walk out of a private dance if someone is breaking the rules, and that there's usually security nearby. However, this is so often not standard practice in other clubs, or feasible if a man physically overpowers them. When asked what measures they think could be taken to improve their safety, both women thought that panic buttons in private rooms would be an asset. Olivia's experience highlights that things can so easily go wrong, and very quickly. Where there's a real threat of danger, there needs to be a real response.

When asked why they stay in the work in spite of all the risk, both girls echo that it's because of the community. Maia says, "I have had some really good experiences with guys that have been really sweet. I think sexual touch is really important for humans. I think it's something that everyone needs...I think it's why I stay. Because I think [emotional intimacy] is really important." Olivia comments, "I always feel backed up by my club. Yeah, like you walk out of the room if someone's pushing your boundaries, even light for one second, and you keep your money. That's a good feeling."

But, she's quick to add, "I'm really proud to share my positive experiences with management at my current club, but it's not always been that way for me, and still isn't for many girls. In short, it is not an industry standard to have management that cares about your boundaries."

Both girls say they plan to leave stripping behind after they finish studying. Like most other university students, the job they have right now is to get them through their studying. But, unlike most other university students, most of the time they love their current job, too.

The reality is, sex work is always going to be around. The people doing it need to feel safe and protected in their community. Walking away from these interviews, it's clear that Parliament and those with influence over the industry need to stand up and make changes to employment safety regulations, and that need is now.

Navigating sex in an allosexual world

Until I got to university, I had no idea that when you called someone "hot", it meant that you found that person sexually attractive. I always assumed "hot" was synonymous with "good looking" or "aesthetically pleasing," and had nothing to do with your downstairs. It was genuinely brain chemistry altering realising that people could just experience sexual attraction purely based on a stranger's presence. What happened to hello, how are you, my name is?

Call me naive, but it wasn't until I was introduced to the casual sex culture of university and young adulthood that I realised it wasn't the norm to only experience sexual attraction after you've gotten to know a person, or formed some kind of emotional connection. Discovering the asexual spectrum, or in my case demisexuality, was a lightbulb moment that explained my disinterest in hook-ups, despite being sex positive.

THE ASEXUALITY SPECTRUM

Ranging broadly from asexuality, greysexuality, to demisexuality, being on the asexual spectrum is wildly different for individuals. Like other sexual orientations, we're not a monolith and as Luka put it, "no two people will have the same thoughts about asexuality and sex."

Charlie, who identifies as non-binary and demisexual, said that they feel like they still have plenty to learn about their sexual orientation.

"I'm only sexually attracted to people I feel very close to, or people who are not in my vicinity, like celebrity crushes or fictional characters. I don't feel sexually attracted to someone unless we've been at least good friends for a while. The idea of having sex with a stranger or someone I'd just met, or even some of my closest friends makes me quite uncomfortable. And the idea of people seeing me as a sexual being or object first, and a person second, makes me incredibly uncomfortable."

Charlie also feels that although they consider themselves a sexual person, they maintain specific boundaries with what they're comfortable with.

"People are incredibly attractive! However, unless I've gotten to know those people and feelings start to arise, I wouldn't even dream of seeing them in a sexual light. I've been with my partner for almost three years now and they're the only person I like to see me in a sexual manner because we've put the time, work, and effort into our relationship and trust each other completely. I can't imagine doing all that work with strangers on a regular basis, that'd be exhausting."

While Charlie still views sex as a fun activity, their close friends still view sex differently—as an activity that can be shared between anyone regardless of how well they know each other.

"I respect their fun, but I just can't see it the same way."

Will, who identifies as greysexual, said that despite the misconceptions surrounding asexuality, they still enjoy sex.

"Some asexual people like sex, like me! My sexuality just means that I don't feel sexual attraction for people, and instead I feel emotional, romantic, or aesthetic attraction."

Similarly, Phillipa felt that a huge myth about asexual individuals is that they never experience any sexual feelings or desire.

"For some of us, it's rare for random

people, but we're capable of experiencing it with our partners, usually in the form of responsive desire. Essentially, it's not something we think about unless there's a physical stimulus of some sort first."

Hana added that another misconception about asexual individuals is that they are incapable of love and affection.

"There are so many different ways to express that you love someone and so many ways of interpreting love, sex is just one way of showing that."

MEDIA REPRESENTATIONS OF ASEXUALITY AND SEX

Although the discussion and representation of queer identities have increased in presence and diversity over time, asexuality remains largely overlooked and severely underrepresented. As a result, many individuals on the asexual spectrum feel misunderstood and unvalidated both among allosexual people and the queer community.

Van. who identifies as asexual and demisexual, said that they've been told they were "frigid and cold" by a male friend, "too young" to determine their sexuality because that they just haven't met the "right" person.

Riley commented that they felt that within the rainbow community, many people still think that asexuality "isn't really a thing."

"I've always been a bit sceptical about coming out about my identity. When you think of being queer, asexuality isn't the first thing that usually comes

> to your mind. Everyone just assumes you're allosexual, and anything other than that is 'weird'. There's always a fear of judgement, especially since this part of the queer community is not talked about as much."

"When you try to become a part of the rainbow community, you hope to be supported for being different. but that's not been the case for me."

For Jack, not only is the lack of asexuality representation in media problematic in allowing them to control how they are perceived, but the saturation of sex-heavy media causes discomfort.

"Shows like *Euphoria* and others that glorify as sex, or depict sex as a social currency, makes me feel deeply uncomfortable in the way they represent sex. Sex, which can be so connecting, empowering, lifechanging and potentially traumatising, is portrayed as something so casual. There is so much more to life than sex."

Riley feels conflicted about the portrayal of sex and sexuality in media.

"Mainstream media treats sex as the end all, as if people get into relationships only because of sex and nothing else."

They feel hopeful that representations of sexuality will become more diverse

and inclusive in the future.

"I'm glad to see things changing. Like Todd in *Bojack Horseman*, or Isaac in the Heartstopper series, having dedicated stories showcasing aro-ace experiences has been very nice. Seeing and hearing these stories makes you feel less alone and provides a sense of community. '

"It's also nice to see more media platforms providing opportunities to talk about asexuality, like Craccum and the New York Post."

Likewise, Spencer said that seeing asexual characters and experiences in the media has helped them to feel validated in their sexuality.

"Florence from Sex Education made me feel more seen."

Charlie commented that although they feel there is often pressure and importance placed on sex, such as when they were in first year halls, it's paramount to stay true to yourself and your boundaries.

"If you're asexual and don't want to have sex, say no! Go with what feels right for you, you don't have to sacrifice your sexuality for the sake of anyone else."

Since we live in an allosexual world, where experiencing sexual attraction regularly is still seen as the "norm", it can be challenging for anyone on the asexual spectrum to not just figure out sex and relationships, but also combat feelings of alienation.

Even though the way I experience sexual attraction has always felt "normal" to me, it's been fascinating seeing the variety of reactions of other allosexual individuals (people who regularly experience sexual attraction). From being personally called "wholesome", to "stuck up", "fussy", or just a good old "prude", it's disheartening to see that people still assign value judgements to what people choose to do, or not do, with their bodies. Let's just collectively agree to validate all sexualities and let everyone live their best lives according to their definition.


Date people who give a shit.


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

ARTISTS ON ARTISTS: EXHIBITING COMMUNITY

Exploring Connection With New Zealand's Top Artistic Talents

It's a frosty Wednesday night on Karangahape Road and the streets of Tāmaki are virtually empty, save for the few brave enough to face the winter chill. Despite the conditions, Studio One is buzzing with gallery-goers, each enduring the elements for a sneak peek at their newest exhibition; Artists on Artists. This opening feels different to most; warmer, more inviting and with a heightened sense of connection. Guests chat loudly over red peach pals, enthusiastically pouring over each work on display and snapping pictures on their phones. A gallery employee swans through the room with a film camera and quests plaster smiles on their faces before her lens. The energy alone is a feat from the Studio One team, who were able to remove the sombre mood commonly associated with art-world gatherings. Instead,

the space is alive, collaborative and absolutely buzzing with enthusiastic art lovers.

The idea behind the exhibition simply amplifies this sense of community; Artists on Artists is a group show, with each artist using another as inspiration for their work. After a successful first iteration in 2022, the project is back for round two with a new lineup of both established and emerging artists from all over Aotearoa.

To shed a little more light on the exhibition we posed a series of questions to two participants, Pam Brabants and Samson Dell, to understand their experiences and delve a little deeper into the nature of the exhibition.

Did you feel comfortable being the subject of another artist's work?

Pam: Believe it or not, I had done some photographic modelling when I was young(er) so being photographed by Jessica Gurnsey was fun because she made it playful. At one point she was standing above me on one of my cabinets and asked me to pull a face. Of the two photos she selected, it was the face-pulling one she liked most. I could see why it was more interesting from a painter's viewpoint, but I was vainly nervous about the outcome.

> Samson: I think for me that depends on the approach of the artist making the work. When Lindsey asked me about being a part of this show, I made it clear that I would be much more comfortable sitting for a portrait if the artist was queer themselves. I spent much of my

undergrad trying to document and represent my own queer identity, so making sure that the artist understood my identity felt like the bare minimum to build a relationship in which we could both see each other equally before making. Being paired with Ritchie Adamson was such a blessing, he brought such a kind and empathetic approach to this show and really made sure that I felt seen and heard throughout the time he spent painting. Considering it was my first time sitting for a painted portrait, it made me feel so comfortable.

Love, actually A philosophical take on soulmates and such

What attributes about the artist you were paired with did you want to highlight through your work?

Pam: Ritchie has a sparky energy about him, but there's also a vulnerability too, almost shyness, which is very appealing. The shape and structure of his face is beautiful. He has unusual tattoos on his arms, which he designed. I wanted to hint at all of these things in his portrait. Painting is essentially a solitary task, an interior journey, which is why I chose to depict him with his eyes closed.

Samson: When Kiran and I caught up to make the work for this show we talked about how each other was feeling post finishing university and all of the changes and uncertainty that we were feeling at that moment. Kiran also talked about their experiences of being photographed for multitudes of student art projects in various facets of their identity, particularly in relation to their drag work. We talked about what they felt was missing to them in terms of being represented and recorded. We then decided to make more relaxed portraits of them in their space during this time of change. I wanted to highlight this softer, gentle side of Kiran's life for them, which was something that also influenced the small-scale, delicate, final work coffee-toned, hand-printed cyanotype.

How did you feel about your own representation through another artist's work?

Pam: It was quite confronting at first, especially seeing the lines around my lips! But Jessica is super talented and I trusted her completely. I guess that's the thing I learned the most about being the subject of a work, how much you entrust a representation of yourself to someone else. I'm very happy with



her hit with BANG!, writer Melody Thomas is back hosting Stuff's latest podcast series The Good Sex Project; combining real people's sex stories with expert's advice to destigmatise conversations around pleasure, intimacy, and relationships. It's frank, funny, and reminiscent of group chat debriefs the next day—but with unbiased and actually sound advice. We picked Melody's brain for her (s)expertise:

How did your podcast get started?

I learned so much over the course of *BANG!*, and I felt like I was starting to get an idea about some of the things standing in the way of good sex and love for so many people. I wanted to help people find the pathway through that: find everyday people willing to share their struggles and triumphs, then weave that together with expert advice.

What has helped you to be able to embrace and feel comfortable talking about sex so openly? Was there an inciting moment for you?

Honestly I've always loved talking about this stuff, though when I was younger it was more for shock-value than anything else. And the conversations were always pretty superficial.

But I'm super comfortable now and I think that's just through talking to so many people about it. At the beginning I wasn't so relaxed. But then I interviewed so many more people, including my Mum and a childhood friend I'd played doctors and nurses with...and the shame and embarrassment just disappeared. Now talking about sex feels no different to talking about anything else.

What advice would you give to people in the beginning stages of their sexual journeys?

I would say to try not to get too caught up in what you think other people are doing, or what you think you're meant to be doing. A lot of people seem to have interpreted sexual empowerment as being "up for it" always, but real sexual empowerment is so much more nuanced than that. I'd say to throw out the scripts that tell you heterosex happens in a certain order (making out, hand stuff, maybe oral, penetration, over) and instead ask "what are you into?" Think about your own answer, be nonjudgemental about the other person's answer, and find the places you overlap. Nothing is compulsory—sex is whatever YOU want it to be.

How can one find their 'voice' in bed?

It's so difficult! Some of 'finding your voice' just comes with age and experience, and you'll get better at it with time. But it's never too early to start thinking about what you're into (you've got no chance of advocating for yourself if you don't even know what you like!) A lot of figuring out what you like just comes with the trial and error of sleeping with people, but you can learn a lot about what kind of touch your body responds to on your own, through masturbation.

And you can practice asserting yourself in non-sexual situations! Tell the barista they got your coffee order wrong, or send back the meal that wasn't cooked properly! A little practice here will naturally roll over into your sex life.

What do you think about hookup culture? Do you think young people's perceptions of sex are moving in the right direction?

I think hookup culture is missing a lot of really important conversations around pleasure, consent, gender expectations and safety. I think the core idea of hookup culture, that casual hookups are all good and you don't need an emotional connection to enjoy sex, is fine and will work for some people. But I also think a lot of people interpret "no emotions" as being no effort and no care required for the other person, and that's a recipe for disaster.

Re: young people's perceptions of sex—on one hand, there's so many more great conversations these days about consent, body positivity, gender, sexuality, feminism...all that stuff, which basically didn't exist when I was young. But I also didn't have to deal with the effects of mainstream, free pornography standing in for sex education! So maybe we started off in the right direction, but we missed a few steps...and we need to go back and fill in the missing bits...And *then* we'll be on the right track!

A surprising sex fact?

Did you know the 'little button' we think is the clitoris is just the tip of the iceberg? The actual clitoris is 8-10 cm long and mostly internal, with legs and bulbs

that wrap around the vagina. We say 'penis and vagina' but actually it's the clitoris that's the biological equivalent of the penis. And just like with a penis, most people with

clitorises require fairly constant stimulation to the clit to reach orgasm.

Very few even make it to the bedroom, instead opting for locations like the dining room table or tiled kitchen floor. They never seemed to mind the lack of tailbone cushioning or the cold feeling of linoleum on their bare skin. None of that matters. Not when you're taken over by such a primal urge. I remember thinking this was just standard pre-sex behaviour; each party undergoing some kind of lycanthropic transformation in the heat of the moment. I imagined my first time would be much the same and when it wasn't. I was left wondering what I'd done wrong. I mean, If he *really* liked me, my favourite shirt wouldn't still be intact, right?

The experience was unremarkable, as most first-times are. There were uncomfortable pauses, strange



sounds and moments where I was painstakingly aware of how unflattering my body positioning was. I remember spending the majority of the encounter just trying to get into the same rhythm, and for the most part, it was to no

avail. As he showed me out that night I thought back to Mila Kunis and Natalie Portman in Black Swan, Leonardo di Caprio and Kate Winslet in *Titanic*

and, dare I say, Robert Pattinson and Kristen Stewart in Twilight, Breaking Dawn. Every movement of theirs had been intentional, passionate, perfectly executed. We, on the other hand, had been a fumbling entanglement of limbs.

While I've had some *much* better experiences since then, most have still been punctuated by awkward little moments. I don't think this is a bad thing, it's really just the nature of the beast. However, it's not something we're likely to see reflected on screen. It wasn't until this year that I actually saw it done right and for that, I have to credit Girls. Those familiar with Lena

Dunham's work will know that she's

no stranger to casting her characters in an unflattering light.

Granted, it can make for some pretty unlikable figures, but it also makes for some incredibly human sex scenes. Just think of the pilot episode; the image of Hannah desperately trying to rip off her tights, the muddled position readjustments, the way she asks whether Adam's mad at her while he's literally inside her. It's weird, it's uncomfortable and honestly, it's refreshingly normal.

Season Five, Episode Seven. Dill falls asleep while giving Elijah an unenthusiastic blowjob, highlighting the often-disappointing nature of drunk sex. Season Three, Episode Six. Ray sheepishly tells a very passive Marnie that he thinks "he slipped out." Season Three, Episode Ten. Hannah's attempt at roleplay becomes confused, prompting Adam to tell her "it doesn't make any fuckin' narrative sense."

These depictions of weird sex are so effective at normalising the awkward bits that mainstream media loves to ignore. Sure, they may not be as *traditionally* romantic, but isn't real intimacy feeling comfortable enough to have these embarrassing little moments and just carry on? The nature of typical Hollywood-esque depictions makes the act seem less human. They prioritise aesthetics over all else, forgoing the sense of connection that often underpins our desire to sleep with each other. Conversely, awkward sex scenes are raw, they're authentic and they demonstrate a genuine understanding of the human experience. In short, my point is this; though they really should, nobody makes sex scenes quite like Lena Dunham.




