AUSA, OUR AUSA

It is all too common for students to simply say "Bloody Students" Association - a waste of time", and consign their union to oblivion. But the Association itself is not the problem, rather the people in it. Last week's guest editorial explained frankly which people: this week we have an article by last year's President about this year's Executive; last Friday (the day after we went to print) we would have had, or attempted to have, a Special General Meeting to decide whether to pay the Executive; soon we can expect to see some action on the issue, and perhaps a few will see that the coup during the holidays was not all banter.

But enough of that. What I want to say here is that AUSA itself both is worth saving and can be saved. AUSA has the money and facilities to enable its members to achieve most reasonable aims, be they social or political: what the Association lacks is the initiative to make it more than a country club, to make it a true front-line organisation for students.

That initiative has to start at the top, for the membership cannot be expected to motivate itself. Unfortunately our President is a self-confessed fence-sitter, someone who would rather give a "balanced view" than take a stand on issues. People are taking the so-called a I policy seriously: That be given an enema in the hope of getting our P as all you can see of W these days is his feet.

Elections for next year's Executive will be held soon. Without a strong and cohesive Exec next year, AUSA's decline will rapidly worsen. Important issues such as equitable distribution of Association funds, Deed of Management negotiations, assessment, constitutional reform and student welfare will slip completely from the students' control, your control. Don't try and say that it doesn't concern you: it concerns you just as much as who becomes your Member of Parliament in November, and one would hope that you care about that.

Yes, certain things need to be changed, so pick an Executive that will listen to your ideas for change and that will be prepared to implement those ideas. AUSA could be made an extremely worthwhile and valuable organisation if only its members will recognise that it is theirs, and that their votes, if well used, will give them a real return for their money.

It was a beautiful sunrise this morning, one of the best Friday mornings this year. Exec may not produce much, but the Craccum staff delivers. - Dak.

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

Be prepared to outline how your skills and/or experience could relate and



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

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
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it's about time we said enough is enough.

After five months of trying to get the Department of Education to listen to student requests for an improved system of assessing hardship applications this year, a group of Education Fightback workers decided that it was time that the public knew how bad the situation was. Thus, on Tuesday the 9th of June, some forty students went out to the Department of Education in Gillies Ave to protest by staging a picket and a sit-in.

Education Vice President Heather Worth has made several attempts this year to communicate with both the Minister of Education and the Director General of Education, but to no avail. In fact by March Merv Wellington had made himself unobtainable, not responding to phone calls either to Parliament or to his home.

A meeting in February between NZUSA and the Department of Education had no constructive result in ensuring that the grants scheme was better run this year. Letters written on behalf of students who had been denied hardship grants and pointing out to the Director General the inconsistencies and anomalies in the grants scheme failed to move the bureaucracy. In one case, a student had kept an account of her text-book expenses: a total of \$310, but the Department decreed that she should only have spent \$100. Similarly, a music student was penalised for purchasing a musical instrument and attending a jazz workshop.

It was as an attempt to bring the increasing ridiculousness of the situation to the public that the sit-in was conceived. An indication of the level of the protesters was that three people were arrested for trespass: Heather, Leonie Morris and Bill Bradford.

Bill Bradford is an excellent example of the student who has been badly treated by the Department. A shepherd, with 4½ year old twin children and a wife who is a masters student in Chinese, he gained provisional admission to this University in 1980, did a full time course and had a full-time job to support himself and his family. He gave up his job in order to sit exams, all of which he passed, but managed

to save \$1000 during the year. He was unable to find a job over the summer. At the beginning of this year both he and his wife applied for a Supplementary Hardship Grant, and were turned down because "you have not made enough effort to save over the last year". By the time he got that reply in mid-May he was \$300 in debt with a family income of \$46 per week.


Bills frustration was apparent at his

hearing in the District Court. Both he and Leonie pleaded guilty to the charge of trespass, but both were adamant that they had done what they felt they had to do, and were in no way sorry for their actions. With 35% of hardship applications having been turned down completely so far this year, they felt the situation called for desperate measures.

The District Judge was sympathetic to what they had to say, and discharged them both without conviction after ordering them to pay \$25 costs. Such a decision is perhaps indicative of a tacit support for the struggle of students in maintaining their level of grants. Students now are, in real terms, 114% worse off than they were in 1976, when the Standard Tertiary Bursary was introduced.

Heather has pleaded not guilty to the charge of trespass, and so will face a court on the 27th of July. Given the amount of media coverage already given to the sit-in both on television and on the front pages of the daily papers, that case should provide an excellent opportunity for students to further their cause. The Government will only respond to the situation if it becomes widely publicised, and so it is now up to students to press the issue until the Department of Education does something.

It is important for everyone to remember that the Hardship Grants are for just that: hardship, and while some lucky students might not need extra money, there are certainly those who do. It was for those people that the protest was held, it was for those people that Heather, Leonie and Bill were arrested, and it is for those people that this campus should show its support on Monday 27 July.



READY TO ROLL

The Executive of our Association is elected to administer an organisation with a turnover in excess of a million dollars. Besides the management of the Association's affairs and the responsibility for the administration of vast sums of student's money, the Executive also carries the responsibility for the determination of the Association's policy in regard to liaison with the University, to the national bodies to which AUSA is affiliated, to the government and to the general public.

When we elect people to our

Executive, we expect them to behave in a mature, responsible and rational manner, and to be mindful of how serious the business with which they deal is and the good faith which the members of AUSA have invested in them.

The President of the Association, Wayne McIntosh, in a report to the Executive meeting of June 12th about methods of expediting the Executive's business said:

"Finally I wish to state that this year's executive in my opinion is most dedicated, responsible and

administratively competent one that I have witnessed in seven years at this University".

The substance of the report was a

series of recommendations aimed at eliminating the appalling behaviour exhibited by some members of the Executive individually and by the Executive collectively.

I have attended the bulk of Executive meetings this year, as I have attended Executive meetings since mid-1978. I have attended numerous meetings of various clubs and of the University. I previously spent a number of years on my School Council. I have attended a meeting of the ARAC and I have listened to Parliament on numerous occasions. I have never observed any decision-making body less competent to hold any responsibility whatsoever. The Executive of our Association is not competent to make basic decisions about the affairs of the

It is difficult to know whether or not I should go into detail. Recorded details of how this Executive conducts itself would be so sickening that they would proclude people from obtaining an overall perspective on their representatives. It is my intention to have a tape-recorder in the next meeting of the Executive, and then prepare a transcript so that you can find out what it's really like.

Executive members seem entirely incapable of distinguishing between important matters and trivia - or perhaps I'm wrong, since the amount of discussion devoted to questions before the Executive seems to be inversely in proportion to the importance of these questions. Perhaps it's a sick joke. A really sick joke. Executive members seem incapable of following the procedure of business before them. They do not understand the standing orders of the Association. They devote hours to repeating discussions which have already taken place at its expert sub-committees, thus rendering these committees redundant. They frequently demonstrate blatant self-interest in the business before them and are childish, petty and frivolous by turns.

I pity the Secretary of AUSA, whose duty it is to prepare the minutes of Executive meetings. It must sometimes be very tempting to record what actually happens.

Sitting next to me at the back of the room was an "ordinary student" who was attending the meeting for a specific item on the agenda. He was there at 6.30pm. The meeting dealt with his business at about 10.00pm. He was amazed and amused by the clownish and irresponsible behaviour of the Executive until his item was dealt with. After the Executive had dealt with his business, he left. I have never seen anybody so absolutely livid.

An organisation called Fuck The System regularly runs candidates in AUSA elections with the aim of disrupting the decision-making processes of the Association. I suggest that they don't bother this time. I see no possibility of the decision-making procedures of the Executive being disrupted any further.

These generalisations do not apply to all Executive members, merely the bulk. Some were not present on 12th June, some left and some sat through it without being quite as bad as the rest.

Perhaps these people should resign to make a motion of no confidence in the Executive appropriate.

Do you want to see the world, the cheapest way possible and gain an insight of the country by meeting the locals?

Traveller's Directory is an international organisation which enables people to do just that. The directory serves as an informal hospitality and travel information service for both members on the go and hosts at home.

Each member in the directory sends in a brief paragraph describing a bit about him or herself, what he or she can offer in the way of hospitality - anything from floor space to a guestroom, maybe a meal and some advice on seeing the local area.

To be in the directory you have to be prepared to have other travellers stay with you. Although, if it is not convenient other listees will understand and appreciate whatever advice you may be able to give them.

The most common response from the uninitiated is 'Aren't you afraid that.....' followed by the latest and most horrible, paranoid fantasy.

From my own experience on a recent trip to the United States I found the people I stayed with terrific; warm, friendly and very hospitable. All that was required of me was a little help with the chores, maybe some money for the food and talk about my travels and information about New Zealand. (Don't let that worry you, there is no need to be an expert about N.Z; most Americans aren't sure where N.Z. isl)

There are several ways the directory screens out people who think it is some kind of dating agency or whatever. The directory can not be bought in shops and to join takes a little bit of effort; sending the application, getting a bank draft. Everybody writes a background

paragraph about themselves so you are able to do your own screening as well. You can tell fairly quickly from this and a phone call when you arrive if you want to stay and obviously the other listee can do the same about you.

Examples of a few entries show the variety of the members.

- Erich (20) of Zurich, Switzerland is a student who can offer sleeping bag space - enjoys 'life not work'.

- Patrick (30) of New York commutes to a brokerage house in Wall St. Backpacking, photography are his interests and prefers listees who are non-smokers.

- Yoram (42) from Hollywood - a photojournalist with 2 children. Interests are 'eclectic and varied' - photography, ethnic art, art deco, old cars, Hebrew.

The directory is published in semi-annual segments so it stays current for the constant influx of new members. To join it costs \$20 which entitles you to a copy of the directory plus two newsletters: 'The Vagabond's Shoes' which keeps listees informed of the latest travel bargains discovered by other travellers, and 'The Link', providing a forum through which members discuss ideas, proposals, and problems within the organisation.

Traveller's Directory does not suit everyone, some people prefer the guided tour. But if you want to meet people besides shopkeepers and waiters this is a good way to do it.

New Zealand membership is presently quite small but it is possible to stay with members within the country. The bulk of the members are from the U.S. and Europe.

COOKERY COLUMN

Reactionary Des(s)erts or On the Run Again

This column is the product of a partnership, but unlike the partnerships of Rogers and Hammerstein or Nanker and Phledge we don't write together, one doing the ingredients and the other the instructions. Instead we take it in turns which is why the whole thing sometimes lacks such things as balance, direction and elan.

Reviewing progress to date we seem to have concentrated on healthy soups (take the jawbone of an ass...) and cheap main courses (gently simmer one bucket of potato peelings...).

So to restore balance, if not direction, and in fine contradistinction to last week's revolutionary minestrone, here are two very unhealthy and extremely reactionary puddings.

Sarah's Sponge:

Take one cup of flour and two teaspoons of baking powder and mix to a thick dough with enough water. Place in a buttered pie dish.

Boil up a tablespoon of golden syrup, an ounce of butter and a quarter of a cup of white sugar in a cup of water. Pour this over the dough and bake at about 350° for about half an hour - until spongy inside and golden crisp on top.

During bursary weeks and on birthdays add a few sultanas to the dough.

Indelible Cheesecake:

Make a biscuit base by melting about three ounces of butter and mixing into this about five ounces of malt biscuit crumbs, half a teaspoon of cinnamon and perhaps a tablespoon of brown sugar then pressing this mix into a buttered pie plate and leaving in the fridge.

Mix together until smooth about eight ounces of cream cheese, a tin of condensed milk, a teaspoon of vanilla and perhaps half a cup of lemon juice. Careful with the lemon or it will go soft and never set. An electric mixer helps but the fifty odd (very odd) people at one N.Z.U. Ski Tournament can certify this can be done by hand. Pour this into the base and return to the fridge.

For a topping get a tin of (say) boysenberries and dissolve two tablespoons each of white sugar and cornflour into half a cup of fruit juice. Cook and stir until it is thick and clear then chuck in perhaps a cup of fruit, pour the whole lot onto the set cheesecake and return to the fridge to chill.

Wines:

It is (thankfully) years since I've tasted either of these, but you may understand just what they are like if I confess that the best of my recollection our favourite wine with each of these dishes was Villa Maria sauterne.

10 days ago, Philomena Horsley spoke on campus as part of a national tour to promote awareness of the problem of sexual harrassment at universities. Despite being undermined by the comments of the President of AUSA on the TV news, she succeeded in taking the issue further into the public eye than it

In this article, Philomena explains the role of the Women's Department of the Australian Union of Students (AUS). Her comments should give some indication of why our own national student organisation, NZUSA, should have a Woman Vice-President, and will also give an idea of the importance attached to women's issues in Australia.

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semi-autonomous, part of the Australian Union of Students. It exists to meet the needs of women and therefore actively works on issues such as sexual harassment, sexism in education, childcare, abortion, women's health and sexuality. These issues are particularly relevant to women students, but they also reflect the sexism found in proader society which makes it impossible for individual women students to overcome their oppression alone.

The Women's Department provides a structure to enable women to confront and fight these issues by organising together, autonomously from men, and by being part of the broader Women's Liberation

Movement. I think it's important to understand the way the Dept. is organised because as feminists we believe the actual process and principles involved in any action are as important as the results we achieve. The Women's Dept. is organised in a way that facilitates and values all forms of contributions by women, attempts to break down concentrations of power and hierarchical structures, and enables women to collectively make decisions about our needs and

So... how do we work?

We operate at three levels campus, regional (or state) and national. Women's groups on campus offer support and encouragement to women and work to raise the consciousness about women's issues on campus. They receive regular information and resources from the Women's Dept.

All student women are welcome to attend Regional Women's Policy Collective meetings (RWPC) which provides a forum in which women meet and discuss what each campus group, is doing, what problems they ace, and co-ordinate activities. An important task of the RWPC is to ensure input into the Women's Dept. at a local level so that all women are involved in the decisions about policy, campaigns and

direction. This is done through the election of one or more Regional Women's Organisers (RWO's), who along with the Women's Officer the Women's Department Worker and a member of staff from AUS, constitute the National Women's Policy Collective. This meets regularly during the year to determine the running of the Women's Dept. and direct the Women's Officer in her

The Women's Department ensures that information between groups and states is kept flowing; produces material such as booklets, stickers, badges, leaflets, publishes Women's News Service, a regular, national feminist magazine; circulates the Women's Department Newsletter, and maintains a resource library. What have we done?

Because of the way the Women's Department operates the campaigns and priorities for each year are planned ahead from the previous years experience, as well as decided, should some crisis arise, by the National Women's Policy Collective.

In 1980 we began with a national campaign, 'Stamp Out Sexism', which involved working with the AUS Education Dpt., teacher unions, women's advisory units and campus women and research assistants. This year we have maintained and developed these contacts, and the nature of the campaign has shifted from a national to a more regional nature. Student women, already active in education campaigns, are fighting the Fraser Government's cut to education funding, the imminent threat to re-introduce fees to tertiary institutions, the forced and amalgamation of teacher-training colleges and the resultant cuts in intakes, the withdrawl of funding to childcare facilities, the inaccessability and below poverty-level standard of the Tertiary Education Assistance Scheme - all of which have a greater affect on women in terms of their access to, and ability to study at education institutions.

1980 also saw several crises around proposed restrictive changes to abortion laws. Although the Women's Department had planned a national campaign around the demand for free safe abortion, we found ourselves instead forced into reacting to attacks on abortion by right-wing groups and politicians, something N.Z. women are familiar

In Queensland, the Government attempted to introduce legislation aimed at restricting abortion even to women whose pregnancy was the result of rape or incest, with penalties ranging from 3-12 years jail for women and doctors. National demonstrations and activities by women, and solid opposition resulted in the legislation being narrowly defeated.

Last year the Senate and the House of Representatives were tied on the anti-abortion clause which was suggested for the proposed Human Rights Bill, to protect the rights of a foetus. This year this has recently been resolved by concession on both sides. Currently, the Victorian Government is about to table a report on proposed changes to its abortion laws and the Women's Department will be prepared to act with national pressure if the Government attempts to limit women's access in any way.

1980 saw a national campaign to combat the extremely common occurrence of sexual harassment on campus. Male academics continue to use their double power, as men and as teachers, to harass or coerce women students sexually. This can range from subtle, verbal innuendo to blatant demands for a fuck.

Increasingly women students are working together to raise the issue on campus and ensure that individual women have access to some counselling and/or redress procedures. The Women's Department is in the process of producing a 'tactics' book for women's groups.

To enable women to feel confident and capable of taking up issues of immediate concern on their campus,

as well as national campaigns, the Women's Department organised a national Skills Workshop earlier this year. This was attended by Regional Women's Organisers and other women who are prepared to organise such workshops on a regional basis in their own States. The workshop included practical work on media skills such as all facets of leaflet production, screen-printing, lay-out for student newspapers, information on cost-cutting and distribution, use of graphics in feminist publications etc. Organisation skills such as discussion on working in women's groups, how to organise campaigns, dealing with male-dominated bureaucracies, how to organise speakers, women's weeks on campus etc. made up the second half of the two-day workshop.

Other projects the Women's Department is working on in 1981 include a booklet on women and the health industry, information on the specific issues of disabled women and feminism, the rights of lesbian women, women under employment, the defence of funding for women's refuges, changes in rape legislation, women in prison.... as well as the publication of books on child-care and the position of women on campuses

MOBILISATION TO STOP THE TOUR

Dinner at Trillos Tuesday 2.6.81

With Donald Woods as guest speaker.

Driving into Downtown we parked next to a Vauxhall Deluxe with a predictable sign on the back window - "Labour-positive practical solutions Labour election 1981." Then to the Trillos foyer which was full of people buying tickets and selling books. The people were very low key, lots of muted tones, a little eccentricity here and there but no fashion to speak of. The place was set up as though for a political rally. Big slogans were draped over the podium reading -"The People say No. Stop the 1981 Tour". "Act now Rob No Visas No Tour." "Rugby Yes Racism No. Apartheid Kills." In black and red and yellow and blue and white. Very colourful and assertive compared with the low-key gathering.

The function was organised by Mobilisation to Stop the Tour, a group made up of people from Hart, Care and all organisations against the tour. There was the usual Trillos spread, pay your \$15 and get unlimited food and drink and have a good natter to all your like-minded friends. So the crowd full of uni professors, ministers of religion,

lawyers (believe it or not) and even sad Robbie all came to hear Donald Woods, the drawcard for this fundraising evening. And it was worth the somewhat uninspired food and the long wait to hear him. Many of the minds gathered must have felt a little benumbed with all the oral gratification but the minute Donald Woods began to speak he had us all in the palm of his hand.

The information poured forth. A "political hobo" is what he called himself. He has been to thirty-six countries to tell what he knows about South Africa. Why? In 1978 he escaped from that country following his banning, having been jolted - to use his own words - out of his political complacency and the success which had come his way in middle age. Jolted out of the two cars, mansion, holiday house, good salary syndrome to realise that there are more important things in life.

Propaganda weapons have been and continue to be employed in this world with remarkable success. South Africa, financed by millions, has conned the world and not surprisingly NZ. The black liberation movement by comparison has no money and no expertise in propaganda. The whites buy public opinion. They invite people to come and see their country and show them only what they want to be seen.

They direct the debate in the area that they want, like rugby for example. He explains that the reason that he tours endlessly is to pull aside the veil on the real South Africa. His great-great-grandfather was born there. It is his home and he hopes to return.

And now for some good points about South Africa. Mahatma Ghandi was born there. He confesses he loves to tell Indians that "we lent him to you to free India". As well there is the Anglo-Saxon heritage which South Africa shares with other Commonwealth countries. There are three main languages in South Africa: the Xhosa language, English and the now politically unpopular language Afrikaans. Of the 30 million people in the country 41/2 million are white and the remaining 25 million are black. The propaganda machine likes to project to the world that different nations of blacks make up the whole: Zulus, Swazis etc. In fact the basic culture is the same. It is revealing that whereas an Afrikaans speaker could not communicate with a solely English speaker, the blacks can talk together as their languages are not so vastly different. It is the age-old principle of divide and rule. But there is more unity of purpose in the black movement than the whites would like to admit. No black leader has ever said that the whites have no place in

South Africa. It is the whites who fear the shadows and expect to be slaughtered, something which has never eventuated, except in The Belgian Congo where the local people had not been prepared to take over governing.

The issue of NZ accepting the Springboks to tour here is the culmination of what is very important to the South African propaganda machine. In 1976, millions of rands were spent on getting successful South Africans on as many television screens as possible all over the world, for example, Gary Player at golf. They even bribed the judges to pick Miss South Africa to be Miss World. Up to 1976 the machine had been saying that apartheid was good - the blacks wanted to remain separate. It didn't occur to them that if the blacks wanted to be separate, laws wouldn't be necessary. In 1976 a new approach was embarked upon, that of the embittered white minority, repentant of their sins, puzzled about their role, reassessing apartheid and needing patience to deal with the difficult task ahead of them. The classical cop-out of the man who has done something seriously wrong. Nixon, remember? But the whites have no real idea of what is going on.

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June 16th is one of the days that will never be forgotten by the people of South AFrica when a bright, peaceful day in Soweto set by the students for a peaceful demonstration against the use of Afrikaans turned out that children, not only of school-going age, but creche-going age, were brutally killed by the regime forces. For those who witnessed it, it still brings nightmares.

It was a bright winter morning. Students from different parts of Soweto were to meet at Orlando High School. The demonstration started at Naledi High and all other schools joined in. The demonstration remained peaceful until the Orlando West bridge towards Orlando station when Vorster's forces intervened and started shooting at the students who were marching peacefully towards their main meeting centre. When shooting started at Orlando bridge, I wasn't there but I saw the first casualities that managed to reach it still alive. I then decided I must go and see what was happening in the location. I had hardly gone beyond the 2nd zone of Diepkloof from Baragwanath when I saw a scene that remains vivid in my mind up to this day.

Black policemen were shooting at kids as though they were shooting at birds. People came to the scene from different directions including children. Despite the shooting the students were still shouting "POWER TO THE

PEOPLE" and had their fists clenched and raised higher. A boy of about four years responded to the shouts and shouted "AMANDLA". This was when an African policeman pointed his gun at this young child and shot it through the chest. The child died instantly.

People were crying loudly and I noticed a woman of about 26 years who fainted silently as this young boy fell on his face and it was obvious that he had died. We attended to the woman with African nurses who had sacrificed their off-duty time to help children.

It was only after that woman had regained consciousness that we were told she was the mother of the child the four year old who was shot earlier.

During that chaotic scene I managed to talk to one elderly man and asked him what was happening, his reply was that he didn't know. He only saw police shooting at black kids.

The unity that the people of Soweto demonstrated on that day will never be forgotten. Taxi drivers and owners of private cars rushed kids to Baragwanath hospital and to the nearest clinics. Private doctors were also very helpful. The most hurting part of it all was to see how our people, the black policemen are being used as oppressive tools against their own people by the regime

Mothers in different parts of Soweto - in spite of the intimidation

that the system was intensifying by visiting families who had children killed and telling them not to publicise the dates of funerals - showed unity by helping others who had also lost members of their families in whatever way. They attended the night vigils in big numbers and prayer meetings especially funerals though the police had started killing even at funerals in churches and cemeteries.

Many parents who had no idea of

the whereabouts of their children were helped by others to visit hospitals and mortuaries. Nurses worked hand in hand with reporters supplying information about people admitted in hospitals by giving their names and addresses. They were working under pressure as they were warned to keep away from political demonstrations. Some nurses were later struck off the register.

When the police started the arrests of students, mothers showed their solidarity by giving sleeping accommodation and food to students who were on the run. The way they responded in attending meetings showed that they took it as an obligation to help. They would carry plastic containers with water in preparation for treating children who would suffocate from teargas.

One noticed that most shebeens in Soweto are run by our women and students asked mothers to close shebeens. They responded well and shebeens stopped operating for the period set as mourning period.

All this showed that mothers are aware of the responsibility that lies on their shoulders in the time of crisis. In spite of the grief they bear for their loss, they showed resistance and gave moral and practical support to their children. They protected them in all ways and gave them food and shelter. Killing of innocent and revolutionary children in cold blood has brought light to many of our people. The question is: DO WE HAVE TO PAY A PRICE SO HIGH IN OUR REVOLUTION?

The image of Africa as a continent is very obscure in the world. Woods states the four misconceptions about the African continent. The first is that it is a backward continent full of jungles and pestilence. It is also widely believed that it is a place of harsh, climatic conditions unhealthy for human habitation. Woods calls it the kindest in the world. Thirdly, that it is poverty striken when in fact it is the wealthiest of all the continents, full of untapped resources. Finally that it is a continent of instability. Of the 51 countries in South Africa there have only been four volatile regimes. Compare it says Woods with the first thirty years of independence in Europe which gave the world Hitler and Stalin. There is no doubt that in Europe they were not ready for the

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It was after World War II that Smuts who had greatly admired Hitler instigated the policy of segregation known as apartheid. This meant 317 laws that govern a black's life from the cradle to the grave. The blackmail that the propaganda machine is operating with regard to the tour is this. If the tour goes ahead they will get rid of two or three of those laws, and if not they'll renege. The crazy premise being that if you get rid of two or three laws that is reforming the society.

Donald Woods has a friend in North

London. I couldn't spell his name so I cannot give it to you. This man spent 15 years on the Robin Island political prison. Three of those years were in solitary confinement. Much of the remaining time was spent working loading a wheelbarrow with sand, wheeling it in a circle and offloading it. He did this with fifty others. One day he was thirsty so he asked for something to drink. The officers buried him up to his neck, opened his mouth with a pickaxe and urinated in his mouth. One morning when he was in solitary confinement he woke up to see that the walls of his cell were painted red. It was his own blood. The Security Police had beaten him up. He was released last year. On medical examination he was found to have TB, ulcers and to be suffering from severe malnutrition. He was "banned" to Transvaal and escaped to London. Donald Woods is amazed at his lack of bitterness and hatred for his captors. The man simply says that they-the-whites-are victims of apartheid too. Their minds are limited by conditioning from birth.

Among the laws are the Job Reservation Laws. A black is not allowed to pull out a nail, he is only allowed to hammer in a nail which uses the front of the hammer. Pulling out nails is work for the next rung, the coloured people. The white majority believe that the blacks are

not as human and as valid as they are. Why? Woods has a theory. The Catholics went to Brazil and converted the natives of that country. They believed in the idea of equality and felt that although the natives were inferior they were still human. The Dutch settlers who came to South Africa were Calvinists. They also believed that all men are equal, but when they were confronted with Hottentots with bows and arrows Woods suggests that they concluded that these people were not human.

There is no doubt anyway that the white South African nationalists do not regard non-whites as human. However they are suffering for it by being isolated to some extent from the rest of the world. To help them feel more accepted in the world they want to come and kick a ball around with NZers. But New Zealanders do not know the whole picture. They think that it is just kicking a ball around, but it is not an ordinary game of football - it involves the lives of millions of people. South Africa has two thirds of the world's diamonds and gold and yet in rural areas two out of every five babies do not live to the age of five. Fourteen times more is spent on white education than on black education. The blacks are educated to have a lower set of expectations than whites.

For years many people have felt that anti-apartheid groups are "nazis, commies, nutters". The South African regime is an affront to mankind and all mankind must throw it back in their faces. No one from South Africa must be allowed to come here whether it be a tiddly-winks team or a trade delegation.

The applause was loud and long. It was question time. One of the questioners was the solitary pro-tour supporter who had jumped up at the beginning. Again he proved difficult to silence. He didn't seem to have clued on that it was question time and not statement time. Donald Woods responded saying that no one has a right to live in isolation and not consider what is happening elsewhere. No one has a right to ignore what is happening to other people. That shut him up and thrilled the crowd. They'd got their money's worth.

Donald Woods

Donald Woods, a fifth generation white South African, was born in Transkei and studied Law in Cape Town before becoming a journalist. At the age of 31, he was appointed Editor of the Daily Dispatch, a leading anti-Apratheid newspaper in Azania (South Africa) Until silenced in 1977 by government banning orders he wrote the most widely syndicated column in the country.

His identification with the liberation aspirations of the black people through the Black Consciousness movement eventually cost him his home, his job, his country. After his friend, Steve Biko, was murdered by the security police while in detention he lead the public outcry which rolloweg.

Woods was forced to flee the country because in his book 'Biko' he called for economic sanctions against the Pretoria Government and had thus committed a capital offense. He now lives in temporary exile in London with his family. Donald Woods has travelled widely and has addressed an estimated total of 300 million people by radio an T.V. As an authority on the horrors of apartheid and the extensive South African propaganda machine which attempts to justify apartheid he has been touring NZ to educate New Zealanders on the affect of a Springbok tour this year, both as support for apartheid and the international repercussions for New



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THE GREAT ARA TRAVEL SURVEY.

Last year, when the ARA anounced its fare increases it also announced that student cash and concession fares would be increased to the same level as ordinary adult fares. As a result AUSA negotiated a concessional rate for students which you all know as the Term Pass.

For those of you who do not know how it works, the following explanation is included:

One zone term pass: Allows unlimited travel on ARA buses (seven days a week, first bus to last bus) within either zone 1 or zone 2 (but not both). The charge is \$3.50 per week.

Two zone term pass: Allows unlimited travel on ARA buses within zone 1 and zone 2. The charge is \$6.00 per week.

The term passes cannot be purchased on a weekly basis however. There is a standard expiry date for every card, for the first term 1981 it is May 8. When a student purchases a card they must pay either \$3.50 or \$6.00 times as many weeks as remain until the expiry date of the card, e.g. if you purchase a 1 zone pass during enrollment week, i.e. Monday February 23 it will cost

you 11 weeks (the number of weeks till May 8) times \$3.50 p.w. or a total of \$38.50. A two zone term pass for the same period would cost 11x\$6 or \$66. You are then eligible for unlimited travel at no extra cost until May 8. Students may purchase the term passes up to 13 weeks in advance of the expiry date, or at any time up to the expiry date. On the other hand if your circumstances change (eg you buy a bicycle) your may return your card to the ARA and recieve a refund on any full weeks' travel still available on your term pass a 10% penalty may be charged on the refund).

This was the best deal that we could negotiate at the time, but there appears to be resistance amongst students to the term-pass. One of the major complaints seemed to be the high initial outlay for the pass. Whatever the reasons, sales of term-passes are lower than last year's sales of concession tickets and we need to know why.

The information from this survey will either tell us that our fears are groundless, or that we need to renegotiate a better deal with the ARA. We are holding the survey now because you have all had the chance to sort out your travel arrangements, and, hopefully have worked out a few ideas on how student travel needs can be better served.

I'm not going to finish that sentence, because there are very few satisfactory ways of doing so. Even the great creeds, endorsed by the main denominations today, are palatable to many church members only by dint of strenuous mental gymnastics and unspoken reservations. Does that mean that the aforesaid gymnasts and reservers aren't Christians?

No. Here's another example. I'm a pacifist, because I can't reconcile "love your neighbour" with "Kill him" or - worse - "bereave his family". Can I therefore castigate all professed Christians in the army as hypocrites? Again, no: there are soldiers who have agonised over tis decision just as I have, and who have reached the opposite conclusion - and who am I to say that I'm right and they're wrong?

Such disagreements are an old Christian habit. That's why the church can rarely speak with one voice, and why we are so prone to schism. It has led to many people rejecting, or being rejected by, the church.

The point is that anyone can be a Christian, not by toeing a particular party line, but by aiming to be like Christ. The important thing isn't where you are, but which way you're facing. Your opinions (which I find find distasteful) tell me where you are - but only you and God know which way you're pointing.

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STUDENT CHRISTIAN MOVEMENT

S.C.M. is not just another bunch of Christians on campus. Malicious rumour has it that we are a woolly-minded group of liberal theologians. Seditious rumour on the other hand identifies us as a front for a communist coalition. They are both wrong.

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
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WHAT IS GAY PRIDE WEEK ABOUT?

Many members of the heterosexual world have recently been asking why we have a GAY PRIDE WEEK, because they are not necessarily 'proud' to be heterosexual. However the pride we are talking about is more of a pride in ourselves as a whole, including a reluctance to be unproud of our gayness; when there are so many groups inour society, which are trying to make gay people feel ashamed of themselves because they are able to love and relate to the 50% of their peers, which the rest find difficult, if not impossible to love and relate to.

Recently Mr. Downey, Chair of the arbitrary Human Rights Commission, stated that he did not feel that all forms of discrimination should be made illegal. Logically, that means that there are some forms of discrimination which he sees as neither unjust nor relative to Human Rights. Since homosexuality does not appear in the Human Rights Commission Act, and since the National Government claims that it shall not be changing its views on homosexuality, this means that the governmen view is a) that homosexuals are not discriminated against, and that Police persecution and the anti-homosexual clauses in the Crimes Act do not exist and are a figment of someone's imagination, b) that homosexuals are one of the few sectors of the taxpaving public, who do not deserve Rights, or c) that homosexuals are not Human, When a government tries to make anything up to 225,000 New Zealanders feel totally worthless, by bowing down and licking the boots of groups like S.P.U.C., and Bartlett's S.P.C.S., then pride becomes a very important issue.

Recently the feeling has become: if you allow us to pretend that you do not exist, and you do not rock the boat, then we shall not arrest you too often. The opposite of being proud is to be either complacent or neutralising or destructive. In politics, if you do not condemn, then you condone: likewise if an oppressed person is not proud of themselves. then they are complacent, neutralising (the effect of others, and the significance of their own achievements) or destructive, and they all lead to the heterosexual world to the feeling that they are justified in persecuting us. (How many times have 'dirty old men' in parks been used as a supposed justification for condemning gay peoplel)

Pride is different from 'Coming out'. When people around you tell 'queer jokes', laugh if they are funny, we can always laugh at ourselves, but if they are bitter, or nasty, then complain; complaining about bigotry never indicates that a person belongs to the group being talked about, and thus avoids having to come out, if your situation would not allow such a thing.

GAY PRIDE WEEK is here to tell us why we must fear loving certain people for the rest of our lives, or until something changes and some people wake up; it is there to tell us how we tick, and that, therefore we are not freakish biological errors or 'queers'; it is there to install a touch of dignity and pride, which our society would otherwise stamp into the pigshit.

GAY PRIDE WEEK is here for gay entertainment, gay education, and non-gay education. It may not be long until this opportunity to speak with each other freely on homosexuality will be taken away from us. Use it now, come along and see us.

AND WHAT ABOUT STONEWALL

On June 28, 1969, certain people were a little pissed off, Stonewall Inn. at 53 Christopher Street, Greenwich Village (remember the hippies?), New York was visited at 3am by the Polizei, who wished to examine their fruit-juice. Somehow the police got the idea that the people were selling liquor illegally. Two hundred homosexuals were turned out into the streets, thirteen were arrested on conduct charges and NO-ONE was charged with any alcohol-related offense. Nevertheless, at 2.15am the following night, the police staged an encore, more arrests and more violence ensuing. The newspapers and media on these nights and the ensuing night of raids and arrests for one week, all stated that the police had acted on their rights to check alcohol misuses; none stated that NO alcohol-related arrests were made, they all claimed that the youths, numbering up to four hundred by the time the gay anger was really going, were violent and hurled items at the cops, yet none thought it unusual that the police should constantly return; surely if a club was selling alcohol illegally, and no arrest was made for it they would be foolish to start up their 'operations' again the very following night.

The massive rioting which took place in New York, then across the United States, and finally across the world, was the start of our whole Gay Rights movement. For the first time in history, gays showed that they could forget about tonight's pick-up for a few hours and form some sort of strong, political, angry base, with which to make their presence felt.

Stonewall is a name only. But behind it is a reason to celebrate, and since GAY PRIDE WEEK '81 is in the form of a celebration, then it is an appropriate event to remember. For gav people Waitangi Day which set up our modern oppressive government is not as important as STONEWALL DAY, Anzac Day commemorates the many who died at Gallipoli; there was the same percentage of homosexuals there as in society, as with all wars, but does the government say "thankyou" or return any favours? Stonewall Day is more important to homsexuals than Anzac Day. And as for Christmas and Easter with the origins of the most oppressive force ever known to 'humanity', well, to gays, STONEWALL DAY is more important than them.

It is twelve years since a single force of gays decided to chuck it all back in their faces: the Police, the government, establishments and institutions, bigots, the church, et al.

To celebrate STONEWALL DAY does not need much. Sometime during the day remember the countless homosexuals who have been murdered, imprisoned, beaten and assaulted, etc. throughout history by the church, Hitler, capitalism, communism, etc. Stonewall has given us the opportunity for revenge.

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

Just as Keith is about to wrap up his segment of the telecast a shot, separate from the machine-gun and mortar fire which has been the background noise to the conversation, rings out, from off-screen we hear a strangled cry and the camera swings round to reveal the now deceased Graeme Thorne stretched out on the luxuriant Lancaster Park turf.

The cameraman, obviously sensing a story similar to that of the Reagan shooting, pans the scene amidst the usual bangings and scrapings of a cameraman at work, along with the hysterical cries of Keith Quinn. The camera finally zooms in on the worried features of Ces Blazey, still holding the hunting rifle that is obviously the murder weapon.

Ces humbles himself with sorrow at having killed an ex-All Black. He stammers a personal apology on behalf of the Rugby Union to Graeme, stating that he thought he was "the Minto chap, you know, the commie stirrer from HART". This however, is not enough for Keith who, incensed with the death of his friend, tries to strangle Ces with his microphone cord.

The scene is changed rapidly back to the studio where an obviously unprepared Peter Williams is staring incredulously at an off-screen monitor. He jerks round to face the camera, straightens his tie, shuffles some papers and attempts to ad lib it.

"Well...things seem to be shaping up quite...aah...dramatically at the rugby. Just a reminder that we'll be back with our commentators Keith Quinn and...oh...at 2.30 for live rugby between New Zealand and South Africa. Until then we have live yachting from Auckland and, coming up soon, a behind-the-scenes look at the off-the-air lives of Keith Quinn and...oh shit. Aah, this of course will be coming up right after this break....

"You want another beer?"






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NO MARX FOR PROUT

TAKING THE MATERIALISM OUT OF SOCIALISM:

The need to popularise socialism in Aotearoa is becoming increasingly important in light of the deepening economic recession and crisis in capitalism. Capitalism has survived economic crises in the past, but is now steadily moving towards its inevitable demise. The gloom which pervades the community must now be broken and replaced with optimism and hope for a better future - but not under capitalism.

Socialism is the future. Only within the structures of a socialistic society can a harmonious coexistence between preservation of the environment and industrial development be achieved. Only in a socialistic society can true democracy be realised and the standard of living of the masses be preserved. The need for socialism in Aotearoa and in all the countries of the world, is very great. Currently however, there has been widespread propaganda to create a hostile and abusive response to the very word. Decades of vilification from the capitalist media, and frequent diatribes by ultra conservative politicians, have created prejudices in the community, and these notions are largely based on misrepresentations and falsifications, including the use of cultural bigotry.

The capitalist media has presented socialism as synonymous with Marxism, or more particularly with Soviet-style state capitalism. This is not the case. Socialism existed before Marxism. Karl Marx criticised the socialism of the day as being Utopian, and he differentiated this brand of socialism by calling it communism. Marxism was of course more revolutionary than the utopian aocialism, and subsequently it was Marxism that had the revolutionary force to spread throughout what is now known as the communist world.

If socialism is not Marxism, then what is it? It is be sically a system that aims to provide all the members of society with an equitable and decent standard of living, and to provide them with every opportunity with expressing all their sentient human capacities. This is not at all possible under capitalism. Socialism does this by asserting collective control over the means of production, distribution and exchange, and by establishing a co-operative spirit in society with the help of co-operative structures. Because it is far more co-operative, it more democratic than capitalism. Because of it's humanistic ideals, socialism naturally imbibes a spiritual sense. It is here that Marx digressed. Although he never criticised spirituality, he also never attributed much importance to it. We therefore find the classical socialism of Marx is as materialistic as capitalism.

No one can claim that most of the present day Marxist nations do not exploit and oppress their citizens - so why hasn't Marxism come up with the goods? It is because of the fundamental ideological flaws. These allow a new elite of oppressors to move into power. The most important of these flaws are listed below:

1) Marx's analysis that man derived satisfaction, self-worth and a meaning to life from creative labour alone - or at least to a major degree - was just wrong. His neglect of the

spiritual side of the human being resulted in a society geared entirely to the provision of material goods for man's happiness. Apart from not providing happiness, this tends to crudify and degrade the human mind.

2) Because of the materialistic nature of Marxism, the leaders of the communist parties that later came to power were themselves materialists, and as such they quickly became corrupted by the lure of grandiose living. Their positions of privilege, once established, were preserved through force. Spiritualists, because of their deep rooted humanistic outlook, are far less likely to exploit, and can be better trusted with social responsibility.

3) Marx's ideal of equality between all members of society is laudable but it doesn't work, even in an ideal socialistic community. Enforcing equality makes for a sluggish economy and resentment amongst various groups in society. Equitable distribution of wealth is a more rational ideal. With this policy proper incentives can be provided,, and relative adjustments made. In practice, communistic states do implement incentive schemes, but these are ideological compromises and thus become devoid of a principled application. These schemes are exploited through privileged groups amassing wealth. The differential between the various incomes has to be kept minimal and in a constant state of adjustment.

4) The lack of understanding by Marx of the psychological basis of class in society, and the influence of this on social movement has resulted in unfortunate developments. This is related to point 2) in that although the oppressor may be overthrown, another may easily take his place. Recognition of the socio-psychology of class, and the respective quests for power of these classes, allows measures to be taken to check possible exploitation by dominating groups either during or after the socialist construction period.

So the need is for a new line of socialist thought that unites humanity, avoiding the divisive sentiments and the repeated exploitation of dominant classes. Current socialist experiments within the alternative community are good as an example, but they are unable to provide the dynamic approach necessary to remove the entrenched power base of capitalism. These experiments - in co-operative living. divorced from mainstream industrial society - are very similar to the socialist experiments in the early 1800's that were labelled as utopian.

An emerging socialist theory called **Prout - Progressive Utilisation Theory** - avoids the above mentioned ideological pitfalls of Marxism. It synthesises spirituality with socialism, and proposes a social morality that focusses on the prevention of exploitation by any dominant class. With a universal sentiment and the practical policies to restructure industry and agriculture in a humane and environmentally consistent manner, Prout can provide a future towards which people can work with optimism and hope. 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THE BAND

Blam Blam are the latest growth off that peat tree which ncludes the likes of the Whizz Kids, The Plague and Pop Mechanix to name less than four. They began eight months ago and have already gathered an impressive record.

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Blam 1: Tim Mahon crept out of an adolescent garage band into The Plague from whence he with fellow snoids played the music of the Whizz

Blam 2: Mark Bell did the same as Blam 1 in a very similar way.

Blam 3: Don McGlashan some would say has done it all. The Plaque had Don also as part of it and as a late entrant he perched upon a drum stool for the much forementioned

The Blams have learnt a lot from their experiences with the Whizz Kids especially concerning the daunting prospects of internal touring. Much of this feeling came out of a masochistic three month tour. They have obviously learnt from this because the Whizz Kids last tour, to Wellington was described as a "trip"?

Originally they were to, logically, be called The Rest and didn't want to become screwed up by taking things seriously. Initially they just wanted to work in south Auckland which proved highly successful playing with jazz mussos, 'kids' and thirty piece orchestras. The Blams feel as though they have done very little touring. However in the last eight months they have ventured forth on three or four occasions. When they started playing in central Auckland, the big dive, the Blams played X.S. (once) and the Reggae Club (more than twice) where they met the likes of the Newmatics and the Gordons.

One of these tours was to the West Coast which isn't the centre of N.Z. music but it is meant to be good for greener reasons and makes for an interesting tour. Wellington holds no bright lights to draw these moths since it is gathering moss on its downhill slalom especially since that attractive palace of sound, Last Resort, has closed. Blam Blam Blam are here in Auckland to stay as much as possible and they don't even want to go to OZ, na, na. The music fo the Blams is a personal commentary on what they see around them. For this reason the band feel as if they have a definite role to play in New Zealand and if they were to go overseas this role could not be fulfilled. They are not here to criticise or be anarchistic but merely to describe the situation the country is in. A song such as There is no depression' is an excellent example of this making fun of the myth building that is so characteristic of our fair land. However songs of the Thomas is quilty' format have been known to ge uestioned especially by T.V. who put a big no stamp on the video of it lit's now called 'Got to be guilty'



The best possible, and certainly most complimentary, way to describe the Blams music is unclassifiable. The main contributing factor to this is that all three Blams do the song writing and are hyperconscious of exploring new rhythm patterns making each song capable of standing entirely on its own two choruses. The band feels that their music is now starting to take its own form and will eventually grow into a definite Blam Blam Blam sound; a collection of hymns derived from local content.

The mass media of radio was the biggest point of contention as far as the band was concerned. The Blams now have their E.P. at number 13 on the Auckland singles charts and number 26 on the New Zealand charts. This makes the E.P. one of the most successful Propeller records and Festival's top N.Z. band BUT just try and hear them on commercial radio. Hauraki claims that an illustrious amount of their music is N.Z. but let us not forget they include Split Enz, Misex, The Swingers, et al in this, even though they are now self confessed Oz

Following the success of this E.P. there is a single comprising of 'No Depression' and 'Got to be Guilty' soon to grace our charts. There is also some talk of single between the Blams and the Newmatics though this 'Police' single depends desperately on the financial situation of both bands which at the moment isn't rife. In the distant recording future an album is looming.

In the mean time however they will be playing their favourite small venues learning more and more about production exercising their vocals and continuing to be a vital and energetic indigenous group.

THE BLAMS, OTIS, REX AND THE KIDS


The Blams at the Reverb Room were excellent last Friday Night playing to a near almost averagely full house. They played one set of just about, not far over or under an hour. The sound was the best heard in a pub or club for years with a very clear and distinct mix. This is for two reasons; the Reverb Room when full has good acoustics and some brilliant mixing by the sound technician on a very illustrious board which may unfortunately, be disappearing in the future due to the expense. The lighting show differs from other bands since it is an intergral part of the Blams on stage switched and dimmed by the blond bombshell of the pub circuit, Jenny Pullar.

The band played their way through all their new favourites being in the position of picking and choosing their numbers from a wide range of powerful songs. The band is fully aware of the audience and their own metaphysical condition and play accordingly. The quality is always there yet even over this weekend their approach was different each night. Thursday had the band on the

dance floor, Friday was playing to the dancing crowd and Saturday had them slowly at first and with pace to finish.

The night began with the 1/4 Acre Kids still looking for Krypton Gold followed by Rex and Otis doing a set of their theatrical music. These two musicians are always working on new songs and able to please an audience without even wiping your bum with their kitten. The 'Kids' appeared again with their new circus show featuring a thalidomide human cannon ball and a male female feline tamer. This show is much better than the first and as soon as excess dialogue is cut out it will be a very visual show. Being a far more visual show it means words don't have to compete with the noise of gulping ad swallowing.

Then after all this, and finally, the Blams played out the night.



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Pharoah's Pyramid

Potiphar's Wife is a play by the Australian playwright Margot Hilton and is only faintly religous. The only character, played by Donna Akersten, a wife, is a Jewish Australian who refers to the rest of the characters by Biblical names. Here endeth the religous content of this playeth.

The play is an abstract romp through the mind of a woman in a situation that has "something for everyone"? It begins with the Wife preparing the chicken and herself for a dinner party busy telling us of her present lover, Pharoah, the father of her child and ex-lover and Pyramid's her child.

The play has one woman telling us aspects of ourselves we would normally only to sing to ourselves in a shower. It isn't however psychological drama but personal drama ending in the hyper-personal world of dreams. Potiphar's wife is a play about women but for all people and is extremely insightful. Ageing and misused, the women ends the play making a definite conclusion that she can survive on her own without sheltering under a great wing of masculinity.

Donna Akersten is totally believable making her character highly accessible. Even through the barrage of fucks we manage to find ourselves easily won over to her point of view. This is poetic theatre with the large amount of metaphorical descriptions taking on a coarse lyrical form. I found the gauze room obstructive for most of the production except for the dream sequence. It created a barrier between the wife and us that never existed before. The music is perfectly suited to fill the breaks in the production keeping the movement flowing. The whole play remained fresh and tangible never needing to brainwash us but was successful by confronting us with convincing openness.

The wife spoke of subjects normally considered embarrassing in the same way gentle folk describe 18 month old babies. This play is extraordinarily successful in telling us a tale that is sadly so prevalent but rarely told and thus deserves to be heard.



Portrait of Frances Hodgkins
E.H.McCormick
Auckland University Press and
OUP

Of the few New Zealanders who have attained in art a reputation beyond these shores, Frances Hodgkins is the most notable painter. The author with a D.Litt. from Cambridge has had an association with her work extending over forty years. His monographs clearly unfold the range and depth of his research. 'The expatriate; a study of Frances Hodgkins' is a penetrating biography enriched by her correspondence, which McCormick was fortunately able to rescue from destruction. 'Works of Frances Hodgkins in New Zealand' includes a lengthy chronology, a hundred page catalogue of her works in this country, her exhibitions here, a bibliography and thirty odd illustrations of her art.

In the present study, biography and art are expertly and agreeably blended. From his previous exhaustive writings of her life and work, the author selects the significant elements, in a career harrowed by afflictions that only the most resolute would endure. She was fortunate that her father - a lifetime disciple of Turner - was at the centre of art activity in Dunedin and himself exhibited. But from the time in her thirties when she left New Zealand in 1901 to further her talent and ambitions, with few exceptions, it was a painful and frustrating struggle.

When after nearly four decades her genius was acknowledged, she confessed she wouldn't want any woman to experience her suffering to achieve it. McCormick's book is crammed with illustrations relating to her life and dozens of reproductions of her watercolours, oils and gouaches, which show the scope of her gifts. Notes indicate where the paintings are held and there is a useful index.

The Auckland University Press has produced a superb publication with a striking dust jacket, fine typography and excellent arrangement of the illustrative material; New Zealand publishers don't have to seek aid from Japan, Hong Kong or Singapore.

Dr McCormick considers his current work on Frances Hodgkins a partial portrait, as it is largely uncritical and incomplete. However his three volumes on her are a major contribution to our history of art and it is no exaggeration to regard him as the world authority on this artist. There remain gaps in our knowledge of Frances Hodgkins as there are also New Zealand collections of her works. A qualified scholar with sabbatical leave could further bibliography about her, but it is unlikely that anyone will approach McCormick's immense opus let alone surpass it, and certainly not without great reliance on what he has already achieved.

His publications are not limited to Hodgkins and these works demonstrate his interests and range; 'Letters and Art in New Zealand,' (1940), 'New Zealand Literature' (1959) and 'Omai, Pacific Envoy' (1977), also from the Univrsity of Auckland Press. Auckland is indeed fortunate that Dr McCormick is a Research Fellow on the campus. Frances Hodgkins is appropriately remembered by the institution, in the city of her birth, of the Frances Hodgkins Fellowship in Art 1966 by the University of Otago.



Joy Division
Unknown Pleasures and
Love Will Tear Us Apart, (12"
Ltd Ed Single)

It would have been preferable to have reviewed "Unknown Pleasures", Joy Division's first album, before the second, Closer, for obvious chronological reasons but taking into account the fame (underground) and availability (until recently) of this bands music, one can hardly complain.

"Unknown Pleasures", now available on general release, is similarly paced to "Closer", employing the familiar, combined bass and drum formulas providing the basis for intense, insistent rhythms, both fast and slow. These 'ingenuous' beats (thanks Grahame.) are the springboards for guitar and vocals. This album is marked by its 'heavy-metal'-ish feel, guitars distorted and rough, though placed back in the mix allowing the drums to drive the songs. The bass is not deep, tending to be gruff rather than an acoustic punch. Synthesizers are used mose economically on "Unknown Pleasures", adding to the sound on the rarest occasions with an ethereal swirl or a barrage of electronic noise.

"Disorder" opens side one as an immediately danceable tune along with "She's Lost Control" and "Shadowplay" on side two. But dancing is not Joy Division's object, it is merely a consequence. "Day Of The Lords", "Candidate" and

"Insight" are slowly intense, haunting with their searing and ghostly background noises. "Wilderness" and "Interzone" suffer only slightly from the hard-rock guitar treatment. "New Dawn Fades" and "I Remember Nothing" are majestic in tempo with their brooding beat, the guitar thinly-spread over intervals. They contain the essence of the beauty that spilled over into "Closer". lan Curtis' vocals, deep and unique, are suitably muffled reflecting the suffering, disillusionment and torture that are so inherent in his words. In retrospect, "Unknown Pleasures",. is the natural base, both musically and emotionally, for the magnificent depressive conflicts of "Closer".

Something always feels heavy in my stomach after listening to Joy Division. This feeling is a potentially dangerous one, arising from the depressive content of the music, the music itself and the fact that lan Curtis hung himself. Whenever in a severe mood of despair the frivolities of life disappear leaving a basic feeling, this feeling is a warmth. Warmth is best displayed by Joy Division on three songs; "Atmosphere", "Decades" and "Love Will Tear Us Apart", the latter now available on a special 12" single. The pulsating rhythm is topped with the flourishes of driving acoustic guitars and airy keyboards. Curtis speaks of, and emits, desperation. It ends in a climax, a plea. The flipside contains two songs: "These Days", an exciting song with layers of bubbling rhythm devices, ringing guitars and Curtis' asphyxiated voice. There's another version of "Love Will Tear Us Apart", shorter, tighter including a different ending. Yet although Joy Division deal with the morbid, the tortured, the music gives out that one basic feeling which is left amidst deep depression. Warmth. And that warmth is LOVE. Not the love of romance but love that transcends, envelopes and spreads. It is as undefinably sensitive as it is universal. Joy Division's music touches a place which Colin Hogg describes with untypical insight as 'out on the edge".

Joy Division will make you cry and you won't know for the life of you why. There is a lot more to say but there are no words for it. The rest is a lump in my throat.

SHURA CHERKASSKY.
Maidment Theatre,

Shura Cherkassky played a big programme including Schumann's Carnival, a mighty test for any pianist, and some of Chopin's more physically taxing pieces. He specialises in the exhilirating moment rather than any long-range melodic impulse. All the pieces he played catered for this tendency to 'spot-light' sound, and if they didn't quite do it, then he made them fit his idea of how music should sound. It is probably significant that we heard no sonata which would test his ability to play through a musical argument.

The Prelude and Fugue in E minor by Mendelssohn which opened the programme introduced the Cherkassky style: right hand melodies so forcefully played that one wished for some light relief from the bright glare. In the Fugue he banged out each re-appearing subject so that Mendelssohn's rather timid contrapuntal thinking was revealed for what it was. But there was little sense of evenness or development in the playing, rather the pianist lit up moments here and there by exaggerating pianissimic or breaking chords so that hidden melodies jumped out from the contrapuntal

Cherkassky's Schumann offered no more subtlety. In fact he seemed to have difficulty with some of these short pieces (in the technical sphere) especially when rapid left hand accompanying figurations were set against very fast semi-quavers in the right. The final March against the Philistines seemed robbed of its grand finale quality because the pianist had fired off his heavy artillery much earlier in the piece and had nothing much left for the climactic last moments. Schumann was careful to write in contrasting sections but Cherkassky ironed out the differences.

The Chopin performance that came off best was the Nocturne in F minor Op. 55, No. 1. The opening melody was quietly and undramatically played. The only moment which was inflated was the big rallentando on the final page and Cherkassky seemed unable to resist the temptation to throw away the last line instead of allowing it to drift quietly into silence. The Scherzo in B flat minor and the Ballade No. 1 in G minor were given huge performances which might have sounded better in the Town Hall but they dwarfed the Maidment. As in the other works played, Cherkassky seemed to break the music up into "takes" indeed, it is surprising to read that he does not make recordings.

Stravinsky's extraordinary
Petrushka pieces concluded the
concert with a blaze of sound. The
pieces seemed more heavily treated
than necessary and, in some places,
the pianist slowed the music down to
allow some of the incredible
difficulties to be negotiated
successfully. Cherkassky played them
with an ideal sharpness in the chunky
chords - and he ended the concert
with a not very careful performance
of Debussy's first Arabesque, as if to
show that its delicate textures were
also part of the wizardry.

Chris Wolverston - who was replacing our program appearance Beth Noakes - came on to an audience and with great chaotic precision and humour left the audience calling for more.

Chris was followed by Peter C.
Jones and this excellent guitarist and piano player rattled the keys and strings while Brendon Power blew incredulous notes through his harp.

The Crowd were now slowly coming down and the evening was finished off by Alan Young who tried hard to bring back the audience who by now (10.45) had had their \$2.50 of highs.

The Concert was compared by 2 club members Chris and Denny and they combined their talents to sing a song for the audience as well as introducing artists.

The Concert was followed by a party in the W.C.R. which was an excellent way for the crowd to unwind (and mix and mingle with the performers).

All in all successful evening of blues and one thoroughly supported by the Public and students and all for \$2.50!!!! We hope that more concerts on similar music types can be offered to a wanting public.

(a) suffered from bronchial pneumonia because an extremely patronising male doctor told me "you just have the flu, take some panadine dear".


(b) was made to feel like I had crawled out of the gutter by the type and tone of questions, relating to another matter, asked by one of the women doctors.

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
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MORE HATE MAIL

Dear Sir

I find it sad to see you engaging in exec bashing of the nature of your last week's editorial. Superficially it was a very spirited emotional diatribe that certainly makes good reading. It is not good for much else, however, In substance and in fact it was somewhat lacking. Many points of detail are incorrect and some vague assertions are not backed up sufficiently to convince a dead rat. Specifically:

'Cafeteria staff are experiencing a major upheaval at the moment". The total catering wages bill is in the order of some \$50,000 a month. The redundancies amount to \$2,400 a month, about 4.8% of the total. It is, to say the least, gross exaggeration to describe this as

'a major upheavel"

'Budgets are being looked into" This is presumably supposed to mean that something is being done about the cafe losses. If so, I hope that you put more thought into the rest of the editorial than you put into that statement. Changing budgets achieves nothing substantive and is accordingly not being done at the moment. Had you bothered to ask me what exactly was being done I could have shown you a report from the catering manager listing 6 specific steps that she was taking to deal with the losses. Redundancies is only one of these steps and changing the budget is not.

'Why at this particular point in time" Again, had you bothered to ask, I could have given you the reason for this. I am disappointed that you criticise the actions of an employee in this manner without checking your facts beforehand. To those who may be unaware of it, AUSA has a reasonably sophisticated computerised Management Reporting system. On the 21st of May this system produced a profit statment for catering for the first 4 months of the year. This showed a loss for that period of \$36,000. Within 3 working days of this the catering manager had assessed the problems and implemented the solutions contained in the report mentioned above. The staff concerned were then given the notice required by their award of their impending redundancy. It is my opinion that this chain of events is indicative of a competent manager at work and I suggesst that your complaints should be addressed to the union and not to Ms Howard or to the Executive. The fact that it happened at the end of the holidays is unfortunate and unavoidable. The steps taken were done as soon as possible and the workers were given all that their union had secured them the entitlement to.

"Exec doesn't really give a damn about the people it employs". If you really gave a stuff about this issue and were not just waffling why were not you or one of your minions at the Exec meeting last week when this was discussed. Had you been bothered enough to do so you would have seen that one of the main concerns during the debate was the welfare of the staff involved and the effect on

"Pack of lousy shit-faced sheep" With a few exceptions I do not think that this description can really be applied to the membership of AUSA.

"Exec has not been questioned enough on its actions this year". And why is this so? Perhaps because students do not know what Exec is doing. Whose fault is that, Mr Kirkpatrick? Your failure to obtain and print reports on Exec meetings must surely be the primary reason for this situation. One cannot reasonably expect 11,500 people to stand in the back of the Council Room during Exec meetings each Thursday evening until 1 in the

"Get rid of it. I dare you to". Silly, childish, immature and unsubstantiated. If you really think that of the place then leave.

In future DAK, if you are genuinely bothered happened, try talking to the people concerned, don't just let loose with a rubbishy editorial like that one. Exec members are people too you know. (Well, most of them).



This week there is only one topic that I have chosen to write about.

TERTIARY ASSISTANCE GRANTS Historically

Up until 1976 the structure was:-

1) Fees Bursary (paid 90% of fees) 2) An Allowance - which increased each year e.g. \$80, 120, 160.

3) Boarding Allowance \$350 NB: THIS AMOUNT WAS **GUARANTEED TO THOSE WHO** HAD TO LIVE AWAY FROM

4) A & B Bursary (\$60 - \$100 pre 1963) - since 1963 \$100 'B' and \$150

The Labour Government (1972-1975) introduced the 'Tertiary Bursary' which came into effect for the 1976 year under the current National Government.

1976 \$13 abated (non boarding) \$24 unabated

NB: The \$11 difference was the old boarding allowance AND UNDER THIS SCHEME THE BOARDING PART WAS GUARANTEED TO STUDENTS WHO HAD TO LIVE AWAY FROM HOME.

4th and subsequent years received an extra supplement of \$3.50 (similar to the old allowance).

1979 - SAME TERTIARY **BURSARY Scheme** but during the 1978 Elections the National Government pledged and made the following changes.

\$19 abated (non boarding) \$30 unabated

\$11 Boarding allowance - same amount no increase since 1976.

BUT AGAIN THE BOARDING PART WAS GUARANTEED TO STUDENTS WHO HAD TO LIVE AWAY FROM HOME.

4th and subsequent years still received the extra \$3.50

1980 THE NEW SYSTEM TERTIARY ASSISTANCE **GRANTS'.**

\$23 abated (the old \$19 and \$3.50 rounded to \$23).

\$17 hardship BUT!! THIS PART WAS NOT GUARANTEED TO STUDENTS WHO BOARD.

(Education fightback begins!) 1981 'Tertiary Assistance Grants' scheme continues

\$23 Abated (non-boarding) \$20 Hardship

NOTES TO THE ABOVE

The 1980 introduction of the new tertiary assistance grants met widespread opposition from both students associations and the Universities. So why introduce it? Maybe this gives you an idea. Mr. Wellington stated upon the

introduction of the hardship scheme that he estimated only 10,000 applications. Throughout the year they received 17,000 applications.

In May 1980 764 replies sent to students with 82 declined - only 11% declined.

In June declines had risen to 40-50%. Hence the Anomaly argument - When you applied determined your grant. In May you may have received \$10, in June, nothing. As the number of applications had increased so the department got tougher throughout the year. In 1981 they (the Education Department) have been consistently tough rejecting 34%-35% consistently from the beginning of the year. I take from this that they are working within a fixed budget and instead of the overall average rejection of 21% in 1980 they have opted for a higher percentage this year of 35%.

1980 21% declined totally // 1981 35% declined totally, so basically

1) The department does not publish its criteria for assessing the hardship grants and they can therefore change them to reject an arbitrarily set percentage of claims

2) The uncertainty and delay (because all forms go to the central offices in Wellington to provide consistency) fouls up students' study while forcing others to give up their

3) Over the last six years of the National Government under the Minister of Education Merv. Wellington's administration, students have received less and less (the bursary for many boarding students has dropped and no account has been made of inflation over that period).

4) The Minister and Education Department which administers the scheme have ignored repeated calls for the once guaranteed boarding part of the bursary to be reinforced as one way to avoid premature over-crowding of Auckland's University and the decline in Otago's rolls in Dunedin, which by the way has the least accommodation problem of any university. This year students at Auckland have been forced to drop out in increasing numbers according to comments from the University Registry and our own experience.

I hope that this gives you food for thought and explains the current position within the brief historical context of the last six years since the Labour Government first introduced the much needed Tertiary Bursary.
