



DR JAN CROSTHWAITE SPEAKS...

The second speaker in this year's winter lecture series, Dr Jan Crosthwaite, gave her address in B28 on June the 26th, at 1pm. Entitled 'Womens' Critique of Liberal Democracy', it was a broad feminist coverage of this topic. Throughout the lecture, Dr Crosthwaite emphasized the continued economic and political domination of men in liberal democracies and considered both explanations and alternatives. This was seen to have originated in the centuries of antifeminism evident in feudal Europe and was reflected in the thought of the 'fathers of liberalism', as women were systematically denied rights of citizenship, among the most prominent that of voting. However, their being given it, and others, hasn't ended their oppression because, Dr Crosthwaite claims, liberal democratic society and ideology are both intrinsically sexist. The reason for this centres around two things: firstly, the idea of the individual and secondly that of their rights. Liberal Democratic theory sees individuals as independent, competitive, and pursuant of materialistic goals. To this end, they form alliances to compete for resources. The state's role is to allow free unfettered competition and to ensure equality of opportunity for all of them. It is the individual's right not to be interfered with by the state except for these ends. Such spheres as family and reproductive relationships are seen as personal and, therefore, private.

According to Dr Crosthwaite, liberal democracies are thus sexist in two ways. Firstly, social institutions reinforce sexist stereotypes. The modern nuclear family and its reproductive organisation must, she said, be regarded as one of them - not as part of the private domain because it is neither natural nor necessary but is imposed by society. It was seen as the earliest form of division of labour: in this case, reproductive labour. Furthermore, its continuing existence ensures that genuine equality of opportunity will not be achieved. Secondly, the ideology is itself discriminatory in that it promotes, as paths to power and success, values such as competitiveness and individuality. These are seen, by Dr Crosthwaite, as no less arbitrary than those which are forced upon women, and are less success-oriented - those, for instance, of passivity and submission. There is, she said, no innate male-female mental difference. Women's under-utilisation of the opportunities already available was explained by reference to societal conditioning - womens' being persuaded, for example, that trade apprenticeships are 'Unfeminine'. This constituted the most significant form of modern male dominance.
So far so good? Well, not entirely.Dr

Crosthwaite would have done better if she hadn't condemned both society and its backing ideology. Taking the Marx-inspired line that true human nature was not evident under capitalism due to the domination of people by their governing philosophy, she argued that neither the competitiveness of men nor the collective nature imposed upon women reflected our 'true' personalities. Furthermore, she said that this was one of society's inevitable consequences. The true psychological reality of what it is to be human was seen as unknown as yet, due to the stereotype to which all of us are moulded. This may be correct, but to then call the ideology rather than its interpretation, the society - sexist, was nonsensical. Because if you don't know what human nature really is, describing one set of chracteristics - these idealised by liberal democratic theory - as 'male' while others are 'female' is doubtlessly irrational. It is equally unreasonable to attack a belief system which incorporates one particular view of people especially by calling it 'sexist' - if you don't even know the real nature of people at all. In fact, if societal conditioning is given sufficient importance, the belief that men and women are naturally psychologically similar is also unsubstantiable, as is any opinion concerning this question. The only way to discover the truth about all this would be to abolish the socio-economic order, create an anarchist society and then discover what men and women are really like. This has never been achieved and never will be under liberal democracy. Dr Crosthwaite did not advocate it and, in fact, gave no clear idea s to the way ahead for sexual equality. Such things as free childcare are, if we accept her reasoning, merley placebos and will have little effect on our underlying beliefs if they are as tied up in society as she suggests. A straight radical and revolutionary viewpoint would have made altogether more sense (despite alienating the audience) or perhaps a more conventional liberal critique. Dr Crosthwaite borrowed from both and included the strong points of neither. Later (a few days after the lecture) I tried to ask her some questions about her ideas. But she'd flown to Australia. While, as a certain ex-Canterbury slicker said

afterwards, Dr Crosthwaite had given her audience food for thought, exactly what type of thought it was was a matter for debate. Had she given a more consistent lecture, she would have accomplished more towards what is clearly an admirable goal.

The appointment of the Secretary-General of the United Nations to arbitrate in the dispute between France and New Zealand reflects a reative and imaginative approach to this affair.

Since it is impossible that in a matter of this kind all parties should be satisfied, an independent arbiter, with power to bind, is the most likely hope for a reasonable compromise. M. Perez de Cuellar has shown himself to be both detached and deeply sympathetic.

Indeed, it was the very purpose of establishing the United Nations, as of the League of Nations before it, that disputes and grievances should be resolved by the arbitrament of law and negotiation rather than of arms. The weakness of both world bodies has derived from the failure of the member nations to concede that element of their own sovereignty which arbitration requires.

In the long run, among the family of nations, if one party is thought to win, in the end, both 'ose. This is part of the non-logic in human affairs which we ignore at our peril. It would be no gain for New Zealand to humiliate France. any more than for the French to think they gain by failing to make reparation and apology to New Zaland.



The task of M. Perez de Cuellar is to find a forumla by which the honour of each may be satisfied. Given that he succeeds, a strong precedent is established for other conflicts to be brought to enlightened negotiation and settlement.

The problem with an advanced deadline is that one's comments may be overtaken by events. Nevertheless, I commend to your careful observation this example of the dynamics of reconciliation being worked out. This is a subject n which we all need to major with honours.

Normally there would be a pre-election forum where all the candidates would speak, usually in alphabetical order. If this is attempted this year, we would probably never hear from Messrs. Ward, Watson and Wood who are, I think, three of the more serious contenders. My solution would be to have a kind of knockout competition, with a series of elections, and the winners of each going through to the next round. If 2 of the candidates could be eliminated to start with, there would be 32 left, or 8 groups of 4. To this end, I believe Aloysins could almost certainly be disqualified as a non-member of AUSA. This would leave one more person, who could voluntarily drop out, or we could just have one group of 5. The detals could be worked out, and I am available for consultation if my organisational skills are required.

HOLIDAY JOBS IN UK

An organisation known as BAVE (Britain Australia Vocational Exchange) is arranging 1986/7 summer holiday jobs for New Zealand and Australian tertiary students in the UK. Work will last for eight weeks and there is a chance to see the country for a further four weeks. For a fee of 10 pounds for administration and 40 pounds for placement, students are given jobs with British employers, and applications are now invited from penultimate - or final-year students, mainly in the fields of business studies, commerce,

computing, engineering and laboratory work. People from all NZ universities have participated in the last six years. The scheme is competitive and a tutor's report is required. Successful candidates will be notified by September or October and will attend a briefing meeting in London on November 28th before starting work on December 1st. They are expected to make their own travel arrangements, but exemptions are arranged from tax and national insurance payments and from work permits. Average earnings last year were 110 pounds weekly and there is a minimum salary this year of 90 pounds.

This letter applauds Marshall for better than compensating students for the effects of GST but questions whether Cost Recovery is not just a machine to more than return this cost to the nation. A further letter was written to Marshall requesting he does not resign as he is one of the few cabine ministers opposed to this Cost Recovery Scheme. I encourage you to write to MP's yourself on this issue as it has the potential to effect students for decades to come.

On the more social scene, Jim Mc Lay and Merv Wellington will be appearing on campus over the next fortnight.

Thursday 17th July will be the Annual Hall Day with the Wizard appearing as judge.

To wind up, Paul Simon shows great insight in his choice of prophets but my suggestion to you is to look further than the tenement walls for





The Limits of Green



Rachel McAlpine

NEW NOVEL WITH TOPICAL INTEREST

Omelette, the heroine of Rachhel McAlpine's first novel, 'The Limits to Green', takes her name from a suggestion of immaculate conception. To Omelette's mother Mary's insistence that, despite the attentions of a rather awkward male, there can be no father, her doctor retorts that 'you can't make an omelette without breaking eggs'. Hence: Omelette.

If Omelette is born some sort of female messiah, then her mission is to deliver her people and her country from the nuclear evil being advanced by colonial invaders. Her country is the 'Sleeping Islands' bearing a distinct resemblance to a possible N.Z. of the not too distant future, and the colonial invader, RUSA, likewise evokes a future Russian/American hybrid super-super power.

hybrid super-super power.

The RUSAns are colonising with a vanguard of multi-national industries which create a demand for nuclear power stations, which in turn open the way to secret nuclear weapon's stations. Sinister... the Sleeping Island's Government has a Ministry of Development and

Omelette is equipped with mystical powers which allow her to confront this evil on an organic level. She can, for example, create music that encourages trees to grow, and is so 'in tune' with nature that snails trail after her, attracted it seems, 'by the distinctive smell of her farts'.

She makes her first stand against the nuclear menace at the tender age of sixteen. She transfers to unpolluted water barrel loads of dying fish, victims of nuclear power station effluent, effluent due 'they said, to a tiny, tiny human error which was instantaneously corrected and would certainly never happen again.'

Omelette's life flows on through a succession of tilts at nuclear power and the men of power behind it, and through a succession of men all sadly violent, dishonest and manipulative -- like her neighbour Edward, the phallic Perpindicular Man, 'even acquisitive, territorial in bed.'

Finally she links with the gentle George Marion, who plants trees and whose head bears a perpetual aura of cloud. Together they destroy nuclear power stations and Think Big projects by overgrowing them with trees and by inducing earthquakes. The novel leads to a final showdown with nuclear weapons secrely deployed at what ostensibly is a harmless meteorological station somewhere in the north of the South Island (sounds like Black Birch, or Tangimoana?). The use they make of nature here goes way beyond ordinary conceptions of the limits to the Green Movement. Reading this book as a male was never a totally comfortable experience, since in its mystical enlistment of nature McAlpine's novel is an affirmation of women's creativity, playfulness and persistence in the face of patriarchal power and destruction.

But McAlpine's playful tone lends the novel a comic irony which avoids taking itself too seriosly yet, like a good political cartoon, highlights the sinister. The racy, insistent phrasing of her prose is testimony to McAlpines primary status as a poet.

'Limits to Green' is, in a sense an 'action novel' - in so far as it calls for action against social evil. So I'm not sure how successful it will be in that respect. Because I always understood from Brecht that for social art to make people act it must alienate them - distance them to allow objectivity. But far from alientated, 'The Limits to Green' left me with a warm, cheery feeling inside. A highly recommended read.

12 O'CLOCK ROCK - UB40 LIVE

Whoever thought-up the code-name for the British Unemployment Benefit form was probably surprised to learn that a group of unemployed musicians had collectively called themselves by that name. That person must have been astonished when in 1980, UB40 became one of the most successful groups in England, scoring numerous hit singles and accumulating a massive following.

Six years on and there is no fear of a return to the dole queue for the members of UB40; they are bigger than ever, having recently hit the top yet again, accompanied by Chrissie Hynde, on a version of the 1960s pop tune 'I Got You (Babe)'. The band demonstrate the method to their music in UB40 LIVE. Not a band to avoid controversy in stating their radical political beliefs, UB40 are also a unique example of a group who have managed massive international success while remaining on their own independent record label; they manage all their own affairs, including the development of the music scene and a recording studio in their hometown, Birmingham.

Their danceably-rhythmic reggae is infused with a melodic pop sensibility and a social and political conscience on songs like 'One In Ten' and 'Don't Let It Pass You By'. But the politics are played-down on UB40 LIVE while the band concentrate on nostalgic cover versions of 'Red Red Wine', 'Johnny Too Bad', 'Sweet Sensation' and 'Cherry Oh Baby'. These selections also give the multi-racial band an opportunity to dub it up on reggae effects.

Paradox, The Barbs, and Sonya Waters, all at the Rising Sun Tavern, 5 July.





One of the few live music venues in the city for bands, has closed down. The Rising Sun has been the victim of constant raiding by the Police. 'Doing their job,' I expect they would

One patron put it another way, saying, 'while they're here, worried about underage drinkers, enjoying theirselves at the gigs, other people are being attacked, raped, robbed or murdered.

What's needed says our unnamed patron, is for the setting up of a decent underage venue for bands.' He says, 'there's been a lot of yap, but simply no action.' While New Zealand sleeps on in the 80's, the legal drinking age stays, unlike Australia and the U.K. with an 18 y.o. legal drinking age.

Even though he was pretty angry, he managed to give us two recent reviews of bands stands at the Rising Sun.

The Warners; The Batmen; and Bygone Era. Sat. 28 June.

Bygone era are a young band from the North Shore, and this was their second live gig. They're a punk band - in that style, and while they only played for 30 minutes they did a nice Ramones cover, 'Blitzkrieg Bop.' Their last couple of songs, 'Haunting Love' and '21 st. Century Man' - both show that they have a lot of potential though. Give them time and plenty of practice, Bygone Era should mature into a pretty good band.

The Batmen were on next, but their set suffered from a rather drunk guitarist - along with the mass depletion of the audience. But the Batmen played on like true professionals they are! By the time the Warners made it to the stage, there was hardly any patrons left to appreciate their style of music. Depression ruled, but the Warners still put on an exciting performance, and got things swinging when they played their hit track, 'Elsie's got a Gun,' along with their other superb sounds they played in conjunction with the overboard antics of the Batmen sitting in the audience. This helped to clear the gloomy feelings and put a slice of life back into the night.

Overall, a spoilt night, but band wise, the Warners really lived up to their reputation as an excellent live performing band in style. See them live again when they appear at 'Shadows' Thursday, 24 July with Bygone Era as support. Or better still catch their debut 4 songs 7 E.P., called naturally, 'Elsie's Got a Gun', out in three weeks - and see for yourself how good they really are.

Even with countless viewings of the movie under my belt and with back-of-the-Gallery seats, I could not help being gripped by the fever. The rest of the overful house likewise.

The crumbling glitz of His Majesty's is the perfect setting for this satire of the Hollywood Golden Age and is complimented perfectly by a simple and wonderfully tacky set. What's more, this predominantly local cast contains no weak elements in what is a difficult and tiring show. From beginning to end, they go over the top for a highly stimulating performance.

No Lapses in this Live Show

It is the little details that count - like a subtle bloodstain here and there, silhouettes behind the effective screen device that reveal every physical detail during the seduction sequence. the Coca-Cola logo on the coffin and so on. These little touches and the many throwaway lines ensure there are no lapses in this production, greatly stripped down from the subtle-by-comparison film version.





Less than two years ago, Tim Finn and Split Enz sold out five nights in a row at the Logan Campbell Centre. Yet these days Finn on his own can't even fill it once and is transferred to the Galaxy. By contrast, hairy-chested Australian Jimmy Barnes fills Logan Concrete two nights running. A sad comment on the New Zealand public, who only seem to follow live local commercial rock when it's charting.

Charting. Tim the True Master

Sad for them too, because they missed something special. Split Enz didn't really produce anything knockout after 'Aiaita', but I've never witnessed a bad Enz concert. Finn has lost none of his ability to hold an audience, as a small but enthusiastic crowd acknowledged. He promised a long show with all stops out and delivered it. His material, although undeniably commercial, is quality stuff, harmonious, lyrically intelligent and far more soulful than anything the later Enz produced. He always was the 'man alone in post - 'True Colours' Enz, with the commercial sound being a Neil Finn contribution. This performance drew mainly from the 'Big Canoe' album and the pieces came alive in a way they never did on record. Old favourites 'Fraction Too Much Friction' and 'Staring at the Embers' met a joyful response, a solo piano 'Six Months in a Leaky Boat, superior to the Enz version, moved the crowd considerably, and a reggaefied Dylan oldie 'Licence to Kill' both surprised and delighted. Hats off to the tight and effortless backing band (especially the rhythm section) and all technical persons as

Tim Still Knocks 'Em in Suit

'I've been away too long' stated a visibly moved Finn. The crowd responded with two encores and yelled themselves hoarse for a third. The hair is greyer and the harlequin costumes have been replaced by a smart suit but Tim Finn has lost none of his talent and ability. Life after Enz exists. 'I won't be away so long next time', he promised. Anytime,

Joe 90 wowed the crowd with their wacky humour and quirky, Devo-esque pieces. But behind the greasy hair, hornrimmed glasses, socks and sandals and generally nerdish exterior lay some interesting ideas and excellent musicianship. 'Walls Surrounding Me' and a frenetic 'Time Warp' for a city infected by Rocky fever were obvious highlights. Provided they avoid the same old rut, this is a band to watch out for.





The 1986 Auckland Film Festival will be held at the St James from July 18-31. While all of the films will probably be better than Rambo, the following highly critical comments have been written by two who have been bored too often. The comments are arranged in rough categories and do not cover all the films, but any omitted from our extreme categories can be assumed to sit in the middle. Philippe Hamilton & Caroline Montague

☆ Hail Mary

The most controversial film in the festival will probably also be the most ravishing to look at and the most stimulating intellectually. The gospel story of the annunciation in modern dress is intercut with a teacher debating in scientific terms the origins of life on earth. BEhind a jerky and personal narrative style, in which sounds, images and elements of narrative and philosophic discourse are woven into a seemless and perfect whole, Godard uses the cinema to ask himself about faith, god and the origins of life, while creating at the same time a film that is simply beautiful to contemplate at a basic level.



Broken Mirrors

⇔ BROKEN MIRRORS

Marleen Gorris' 'A Question of Silence', 1983 went beyond mere feminism. It was subversive and tough. 'Broken Mirrors' is a bleaker and more explicit statement about the violence of men against women told through two, at first seemingly disconnected stories.

Gorris now has the experience and expertise to handle this material confidently using the thriller mechanism of voyeurism and suspense. Unfortunately its message may be undermined by the very extremity of the violence against women depicted in the film. Non-feminists could be alienated, or worse, in the Hitchcock/De palma tradition of implied misogyny, sadists may get their jollies out of this film for the wrong

Brutal, Stark **Portrayal** 'Kaz: A Working Girl', by Leah Poulter

Directed by Lisa Warrington Theatre Corporate, for a season.

Harrowing is an accurate description of this one-woman portrayal of a heroin-addicted New Zealand-born prostitute living in Kings Cross, Sydney, toured by Dunedin's Fortune Theatre Company. It makes for depressing viewing, but it could never be accused of inaccuracy.

Over two acts, Miranda Harcourt portrays K'az at opposite ends of a four-month period. The first act catches Kaz in her flat, preparing to go to work and following yet another beating by her pimp 'boyfriend'. She sees herself at a crossroads in her life and talks of her hopes and aspirations - to get money together, quit heroin and prostitution, settle down, have kids and never work again. An air of desperation and hopelessness is always present, as the second act, which catches Kaz in a hospital bed, drug-addicted and malnourished, emphasizes. Desperately, she clings to her hopes, despite her plans of our months earlier having led nowhere, and having been told she is now infertile. When she leaves hospital, it is to go back on the game, get some money and quit, but as always, she turns back to heroin, with the resolve of using it to get through yet another bad patch, then quit. Nothing changes for Kaz in this desperately-sad existence


Harcourt portrays Kaz brilliantly. Street-smart, yet scared and desperately hopeful, Kaz has spent her life being used and abused by the men who live off her, and her drug addiction ensures that, despite her desperate hopes, she cannot escape, unless she stops loathing herself. Harcourt puts the right touch of desperation into her frantic movements and chilling monologues.

I have always found monologues a hard dramatic style to get into, somehow artificial and monotonous. Yet the grim realism and sadness of this piece kept me captivated throughout. It has been criticized for being too long, but I did not notice this. To shorten it would only trivialize it as it would immediately become a more action-packed but less everyday, less accurate portrayal of the life of a victim of a society which provides a market for prostitutes, yet also demeans them.

Elizabeth O'Connor is a New Zealand writer and director whose recent works include <u>THE CASE OF THE STATE VERSUS CITIZEN Z</u> (Theatre Corporate CTC 1985) and <u>CHASE DRAGONS</u> (Maidment Theatre 1986)

Here she focusses on the power and peculiarities of the New Zealand environment. THE ASHMAN is intensely atmospheric. A brother and sister, and an outsider, play out possessive love relationships in and around a bush cottage in the Marlborough Sounds.

The whole Little Theatre has been turned into a forest for the productions, so that the plays will appear to take place in a clearing. The bush - the claustrophobic yet wild atmosphere that is uniquely New Zealand - will be created for both audience and actors.

STUDENT LIFE CONDUCTING

SURVEY

Student Life is conducting the University Religious Survey during second and third terms. The results will be released near the end of

The objectives of the survey are to gain a current understanding of trends in student thinking regarding Christianity, and to find students who are interested in discussing the possibility of knowing God in a personal way. The survey itself takes about ten minutes to complete and is anonymous and non-threatening. Results of previous uses of this survey at Auckland University have been surprising to some people. Of the students interviewed, 50% had some kind of church or organisational affiliation. Most had a pretty vague concept of their philosophy of life and felt that their philosophy of life did not provide a solution for the basic problems facing mankind. Most had not seriously read even half of the New Testament of the Bible, and 85% did not have an accurate, biblical knowledge of who Jesus Christ was. While 82% did not have a biblical knowledge of how to become a Christian, 65% indicated that if it was possible to know God personally they would be interested.

DEPARTMENT OF ACCOUNTANCY ANNUAL REPORT

I. Developments

The major teaching developments in 1985 centered around the Business Equipment Laboratory (for undergraduate teaching), and the third year of the Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree.

The Business Equipment Laboratory is already used to capacity. While the major user group are students enrolled in 01.203 Accounting Information Systems (327 students), it is also used in 01.200 Financial Accounting (379 students), 01.202 and 01.302 Cost and Management Accounting (346 and 192 students respectively) and 01.303 Investments (150 students). Major applications are the use of spreadsheets like Multiplan and Lotus 1-2-3, and accounting, finance and statistical analysis packages. The Laboratory has been an extremely successful development. We repeat here two familiar issues of concern - that the Laboratory is not large enough and that the Department is not resourced adequately for Laboratory based teaching. That the Laboratory has been so successful is due in no small measure to the time and energy expended by Mr Morris and Mr Speer in the Lab.

In 1985 the first intake of MBA students reached the third year. Staff in the Department of Accountancy provided a capstone course aimed at integrating the material taught in the first (Accounting) and second (Finance) year courses. We are now involved in all three years of the MBA programme, and are pleased to report that the staff members involved were all rated highly by the MBA candidates. The staff involved enjoy teaching post-experience students, typically executives with strong aspirations and plenty of energy. The strongly interactive sessions are quite different from the large class lectures that dominate our undergraduate teaching. The costs, in time invested, are however substantial particularly as all MBA students must complete a research essay. One staff member (Professor Emanuel) was involved in this supervision.

As usual, we report that our graduates are quickly finding employment, and employers seem pleased with the product we are producing. At the end of 1985 the demand for accounting graduates was substantially greater than the supply. While it is difficult to assess the degree of shortage, casual evidence suggests that the supply of graduates was about 60% of the demand.


Overall Progress in the Department

Nineteen eighty five was a year of consolidation after our move into the Commerce Building. It was also a year when we saw some signs of an improvement in our staff student ratio, with student numbers held at about 750 EFTS's and an increase of 4 in our establishment. The HSC salary determination has made recruitment easier, at least for the moment. The Department's plan is to get to a staff-student ratio of 1:15 as quickly as possible.

One result of this improvement is that for the first time ever we are looking to provide tutorials in some of our third year papers, something other Departments take for granted. In 1986 the Department is providing clinics in most of its subjects as a supplement to the lectures and tutorials, and is providing increased support to the first year subjects.

As was mentioned in the last two Annual Reports, there is a strong spirit of enthusiasm for teaching and research in the Department. The volume of working papers addressing research and teaching questions continues to grow, with acceptances forthcoming from reputable international journals. This output will be reflected in an increased quality and quantity of published material in future Annual Reports.



The Auckland University Jewish Society on the n your article attacking the appointment of front page of last week's Craccum described my article on Mr Wally Hirsh as 'hate material'. It is Wally Hirsh you point out that he is a

> found it easier to discredit me, the writer, rather than to discredit the argument. The questions I asked still remain unanswered. My article was on the appointment of Mr Wally Hirsh, the new Race Relations Concilliator. I have never attacked Mr Hirsh because of his Jewishness nor have I questioned him personally, nor have I doubted his abilities. In contrast the University Jewish Society made numerous personal attacks on myself, misquoted me and made many unsubstantiated allegations. I leave it to the readers to decide which of the two articles was 'hate material'. Firstly, for the record, I was asked by the

interesting to note that the writers of the article

Craccum Editor to write the article for Craccum. There was never any intention to hide my identity. I have never denied writing the article, nor would I want to. Everything I said I can substantiate and expand on. Indeed, on numerous occasions I have approached Adam Ross, President of the University Jewish Society, to discuss with me, publicly or privately, Mr Hirsh's appointment and the whole Zionism argument. Adam has continually refused. Instead he saw fit to use the medium of Craccum to make personal attacks, leaving me with no opportunity to counter his argument. My offer of a public forum on the issue still remains.

Secondly, the University Jewish Society again finds it convenient to blur the distinction between Judaism and Zionism and they describe anyone who is anti-zionist as anti-judaic (antisemitic). This is absurd. In doing so they make it extremely difficult for anyone, as I have found to my detriment, to criticise the discriminatory policies of Israel (which is a Zionist state) without being accused of anti-semitism and racism. Following their argument, does criticism of white supremacy rule in South Africa also

To illustrate the fallacy of their argument I shall use the very argument they use to substantiate this in their article. They said 'the vast majority of Jews in the world are Zionists of some form or other', thereby trying to legitimise Zionism for all Jews. They then go on to say that to attack Zionism is to attack Jews, but with a different name. However, their first statement by implication admits that a minority of Jews are anti-zionist. This means that if one is Jewish, one doesn't automatically have to be a Zionist. The logical extension of this, therefore, is one can be critical of Zionism and not be anti-semitic.

Thirdly, the article goes on to define Zionism as the 'National Movement of Jewish People' which manifests itself in the establishment of the Jewish State (Israel). It goes on to say that Zionism does not embrace a racist doctrine of any kind. Surely this is a contradiction in terms. How can a Jewish stage not be racist? By the virtue of the fact it is a state for Jews, it must discriminate against non-jews to retain its sovereignty. Rabbi Meir Kahane, an extreme Zionist and a member of the Knesset, substantiates this by saying 'A state can be permanently defined as Jewish OR democratic. but never both. Indeed, the very idea of a democratic Jewish state is nonsense'

There are many points in last week's article 1 wish to refute, many of which were outright lies (e.g. Israel does not discriminate on the basis of race or nationality) however, time and space prevent me. It is unfortunate that the University Jewish Society has seen fit to make personal

allegations rather than address the real issues of Mr Hirsh's appointment.

I have always remained and will always remain open to discussion on any of the points I have

You have allowed your paper to be used to make a disgusting attack on the 95% of world Jewry who are Zionist. Zion (Israel) is the soul of Judaism and is a noble concept despite the efforts of the Soviet-Arab bloc to discredit it. Have you looked at the Human Rights records (Hutchinsons is a good guide) of those countries who voted for the infamous U.N. resolution ten years ago?

Your article asserts that since almost all Jews are Zionist, we are therefore almost all racist. Does this include Helen Suzman of South Africa? Isaac Stern? Sammy Davis jnr? Anatoly Scharansky? Einstein?

Are non-Jewish Zionists also racist in your writer's view? Is Conor Cruise O'Brien racist? Richard Crossman? Winston Churchill?

It is time this sort of slur was recognized for what it is: a successor to the Nazi slogans of the 1930s and '40s. There is a famous cartoon in which Hitler berates Goebbels for not having thought of it.

This is an attack on the Jewish Community of Auckland by, God help us, presumably the city's future leaders. Israel is our spiritual and historic homeland to which we are devoted as much as we are devoted to our land of N.Z. Yet so were the Jews of Germany devoted to that country. If Israel had been independent in the 1930s, many more of them would not have been murdered.

If Witi Ihimaera lives in New York is he not still a Maori and deeply attached to his spiritual and ancestral land of New Zealand?

If people like the writer of your article ever have any power in N.Z. then it will be all the more necessary for the Jews of New Zealand to know that there is one country where they will be safe in the knowledge that their fate is in the hands of other Jews.

Openline is a great idea. The latest opinions by the Auckland University Jewish Society have some major gaps in it. According to the Society Israel remains a 'symbol of hope' to Jews around the world who are not free to leave and go to Israel.

Not true. 1,140 Jews left the Soviet Union in 1985 - 350 (three hundred and fifty) went to Israel. 4,000 (four thousand) Jewish people left South Africa in 1985 - 254 (two hundred and fifty four) went to Israel. Israelis net emigration in 1985 was 5000. The Jewish people of the Western World keep telling us that the 'unfree' Jewish people want to go to Israel. Why should they when Jewish people in the West who are free to move to Israel are not going. It does not appear that even the most ardent Zionists in Auckland will in fact be 'Next Year in Jerusalem'. There are 9.5 million (nine point five million) Jewish people living outside Israel. Clearly they do not want to partake of Jewish Nationhood in Zionist Israel. There should be no pressure on them to do so.

Dear Craccum,

May I reply to some of the correspondents who took up pens or typewriters against me because I dared criticise the appointment of a Zionist as Race Relations Conciliator, reminded people of the co-operations of the Zionist Organisation with the Nazis and the links between Israel, a racist country, the other highly racist entity, South Africa.

Jonathan Stone points out the obscenity of collaboration with the Nazis. I'm glad he recognised it as such but saddened that he can't accept the evidence of the many Jewish writers who have little difficulty in acknowledging that their fellow Jews did in fact collaborate. Lenni Brenner (anti-Zionist) 'Zionism in the Age of the Dictators', Edwin Black (Zionist) 'The Transfer Agreement', Alfred Lilienthal (anti-Zionist), Roberta Strauss-Feuerlicht 'The Fate of the Jews', Morris Zilka (propagandist, World Zionist Organisation on Radio Pacific Friday 20th June. These are all members of the Jewish faith! Perhaps people like Stone feel guilty that the Zionist State of Israel is following a Nazi style in its defiant occupation of West Bank and Gaza. Many of the appalling actions of the Israeli military authorities parallel those of the Nazi occupation of Western Europe and evidence is freely available from the International Commission of Jurists, Amnesty International, members of the Israeli League of Human Rights and probably even from your own International Affairs Officer.

Stone also tries to perpetuate the myth that all people in Israel have equal rights. How does he relate his belief to the fact that over ninety percent of Israel land is *for Jews only*? It seems such truth is revolting to Jonathan Stone.

Adam Ross is no better. Like all others of his lk he tries to frighten us by saying that our 'real' object is anti-Jewishness. Then he complains that we don't 'froth at the mouth' about Sikh, ARab, African or Maori nationhood. Of course we don't. The Sikhs, Arabs (Palestinians), the Maoris are asking for nationhood in their own ands - NOT SOMEBODY ELSES. He can't grasp that Zionism and 'Jewish nationhood' are purely European concepts and have nothing to do with Judaism. In fact the earliest known form of Zionism (Return to Zion) is a Christian nvention to encourage Jews to 'go away

Justin Perry tries to blind us with figures to prove' that Israel and South Africa have no economic or other ties. He obviously doesn't know of the huge imports of rough diamonds from South Africa and the importing of unfinished South African goods for re-export. Israel is the only country in the world whose exports have unimpeded access to both EEC and U.S.A. without a reciprocal access - helps South AFricas sanctions busting . S.A. Minister, Barend de Plessis (Jewish Herald, S.A. 27/11/84) said 'Ties between South Africa and Israel go well beyond the published economic ties and the available trade statistics'.
