3. Yes, possibility of bias by markers.



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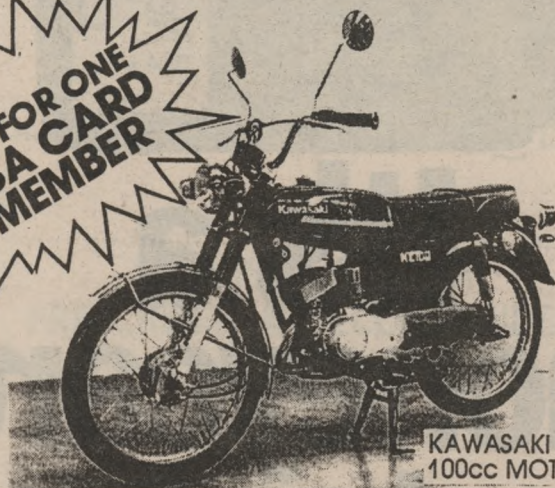

PACIFIC ISLANDS NETWORK is a group of Pacific Island Youth & Community workers working on establishing greater contact and information sharing amongst Pacific Island communities in Aotearoa.

Student members of P.I.N. have been working on issues which address the effects of the education system on Pacific Island young people, their families, churches & community.

This year, for the first time in N.Z. student history, Pacific Island, Maori and Overseas Students have organized their own National Conference to deal with issues concerning unequal access to education for cultural peoples.

We see this conference as pooling together largely divergent yet critical analyses of the education system, and the changing character of our cultural communities & homelands.

The main objectives of I.S.C. are

- a) for students to network more strongly with their community groups, iwi, whanau, cliga, churches.
- b) to gain a clearer structural analysis of education, job-market, work-schemes and government departmental policies affecting our communities.
- c) to share experiences & ideas about re-educating ourselves about our cultural history, identity & spirituality.

The Conference will bring together students and community ideas nationwide, and help create impetus for a strongere network of resource-people, information, new work-models and on-going contact and 're-educational work' amongst our cultural communities.

Reports at the Conference include

- 1986 Survey of Overseas Undergraduate students by Lee Tin Tan.  
The specific objective of the survey is the experiences of Overseas Students which include the areas of adjustment, admission procedure, living conditions, financial affairs, language difficulties, academic progress, health, personal and social difficulties.
- Research statistics about Maori & Pacific Islanders academic progress at university.
- Recent research being carried out by the Education Dept into schools & families.
- Up-date on curriculum review, & developments of educational areas e.g. Auckland College of Education, Social work institutions, concerning models of Maori & Pacific Island community-work and political action.
- Hopefully a model for social change can be developed whereby students can make a choice of how to go about working for social change, through our education and for our communities, in a more informed way.

I.S.C. should be very interesting, a lot of fun, tho' hard work.

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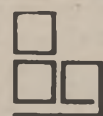
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## AN EXPERIMENTAL SCIENCE

Chaplain's Chat

Would you willingly walk blindfold across Symonds Street when it's busy? I wouldn't. I have learnt from observation something about what happens when cars hit people, and I don't want it to happen to me. My knowledge of the world affects my action.

We can sometimes get more out of our knowledge by trying to guess at hidden structures in the world which could plausibly account for the behaviour we observe; then we can work out the consequences of these hypothetical structures under other circumstances; then if we actually find these consequences when we look for them, we gain confidence in our 'explanation' of what is happening. We call it experimental science.

Once we're reasonably sure of our 'explanations', we begin to take them seriously and act accordingly: again, our view of the world affects what we do. For example: the biological scientists' identification of microorganisms as agents of disease has led to profound changes in our attitudes to hygiene, both public and private.

Christianity has much in common with the experimental sciences. It is not primarily abstract philosophical speculation about what might be, nor a utopian proposal of what ought to be. It is first and foremost a practical statement about what is, tested by the experience of millions of people over nearly 2000 years, together with essentially 'scientific' interpretations of that experience; and Christians order their lives by that understanding.

Of course, that means it has to work. If our Christian interpretation of events doesn't agree with what actually happens, then we have to revise our interpretation: so we learn. But if it ever proved impossible to find an interpretation which could accommodate both Christianity and real world events, then Christianity would have to go.

It hasn't happened yet. I'm confident that it never will.

At the beginning of every academic year the Student Union receive a number of complaints from intending students who basically wish to reap the benefits of our Union without paying fees for being a member of this Union. As a member of Executive earlier this year, I discovered 1986 was to be no exception.

One of the main reasons for these sort of complaints is ignorance of the running of the Union. Although many of the facilities, such as catering outlets and Shadows, are clearly a result of the fees collected, some of the benefits of Student Unionism are more subtle. An example is the money machines in the basement of the Union buildings which are provided by your Executive making a deal with the banks. There is also the part-time employment bureau, the travel bureau, BFM, CRACCUM, Rec Centre, the Maidment, and Student Job Search (although it should be noted that the Techs and Teacher Training Colleges are also involved in SJS). And, in fact, the list does go on.

The point I am trying to make is that the benefits we reap now are primarily a result of past members of our Union contributing (and contributing more than cold cash) to the Union. There is even now some talk of building a small tower block as Union office and meeting space, freeing up the present Union for more recreational uses. This project is one we will probably never enjoy personally but will be a legacy for decades to come.

So, I am now at a point where I can discuss this week's Officer Elections for the 1987 Executive. Last year, in these same elections, we had a record turnout of some 30% of students. In my opinion, this sort of turnout is likely again this year. Hence this column is primarily aimed at the 70%.

It is necessary to remember that your ELECTED EXECUTIVE are trustees of your money. So make the effort to vote in this week's election and ensure your choice of candidates is an informed one. So to close I thought I should quote myself from my 1984 election poster - If you don't vote you can't complain.

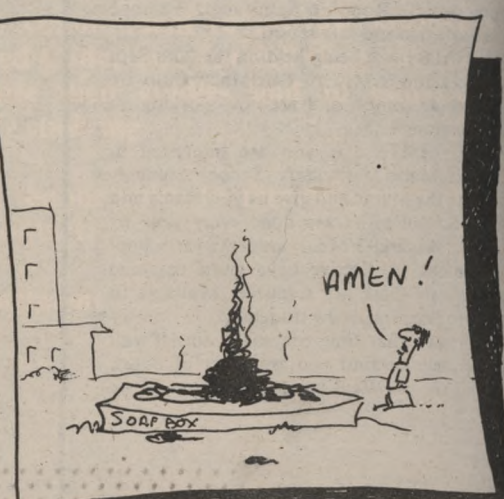
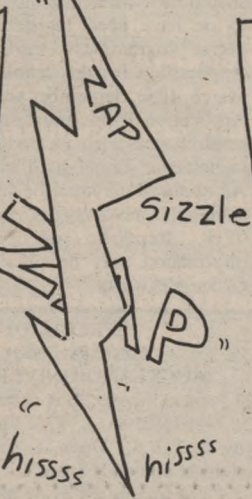
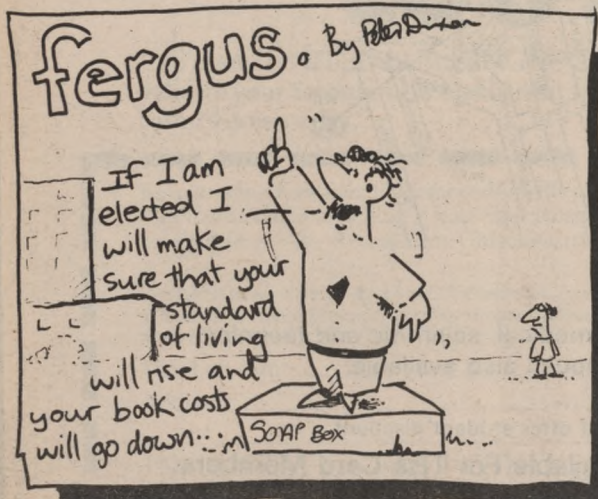

## THE XII COMMONWEALTH GAMES - TV ONE

Television New Zealand will present the most comprehensive coverage of a Commonwealth Games since the 1974 Games when the action starts in Edinburgh on Thursday July 24.

Coverage from Edinburgh will begin at 10.00pm and run through a full 12 hours until 10.00am next morning. Much of it will be live and all of it will come in from TVNZ's suite in Edinburgh. Included in the transmissions will be recorded events plus regular highlights packages so that those who simply can't stay up all night, can catch up on major events. The most important of these is the 'Breakfast Update' at 7.00am each weekday. National and international news and other sports will be included in these packages. Coverage of this year's games begins on Thursday at 11.00pm with a preview from the Edinburgh studios. Most of the night is given over to live coverage of New Zealand's cricket test against England at Lords although at midnight there's a look at the City of Edinburgh, while the cricketers are at lunch.

At 5.30am on Friday, live coverage of the 2½ hour Opening Ceremony begins.

### JAZZ SEEN - ARTIE SHAW: TIME IS ALL YOU'VE GOT SUNDAY JULY 27 ON TV2

JAZZ SEEN presents part one of a fascinating two-part documentary on the life of one of the greatest clarinetists of the swing era, Artie Shaw. Born Arthur Jacob Arshawsky in New York City in 1910, and raised in New Haven, Connecticut, Shaw was technically one of the finest jazz clarinetists, being both fluent and melodic in his approach on the instrument.

On moving to New York he began freelancing for CBS records, but his career was stop-start for seven years. He recorded with Billie Holiday in 1936, and in 1937 put together a big band which soon became one of the most popular outfits during the Swing Era. This band had a huge hit with its version of 'Begin The Beguine'. Shaw temporarily left the music scene several times, once to join the Navy. But in the late 40s he retired from the music scene altogether, with the express intention of becoming a writer; he had often been an outspoken critic of commercial exploitation of music. After several temporary musical forays, he retired to run a dairy farm in Spain in 1956. Married (at last count) eight times, Shaw resisted tempting offers to return to the music business. ARTIE SHAW: TIME IS ALL YOU'VE GOT (PART 1), screens on Television 2, Sunday July 27 at 2pm.

Shadows, they say, is not the easiest venue to play at as you only get to play sight seen to half of the audience, but they'd welcome another night there, even if it meant having to lug their gear all the way up those stairs again! (You mean there's a lift?)

What about playing at parties and the ol' 21sts etc. I asked? Smiles all around and general agreement that while the money is no good, they are useful for tuning up from the practice sessions and they are more intimate with easy audience reaction and appreciation. Which leads to the question. Exactly what kind of music do the Undertakers play? And if you think the answer is graveyard mash, you're wrong! The lads do covers of Joy Division and Hoodoo Gurus material, and when they're in the mood - but mostly original punk influenced rock.

This time the reputedly tyrannical perfectionist has chosen 'King Kear' as the basis to the plot, combined with his own perceptions of Japanese history. 'Ran' is interpreted as chaos in the older Japanese meaning of the word - a breakdown of social and philosophical order ultimately leading to pain, mutilation and death.



☆ Jean Cocteau - Self Portrait of a Man Unknown

Two documentaries directed by individuals who are well known in their own right for their work at the edges of narrative cinema. Rivette is, along with Rohmer and Godard the third major figure of the French *nouvelle vague* and his film on Renoir will provide a fascinating gloss on his own work with open ended fictional narratives in such films as *Celine and Julie Boating*. Cozarinsky like Ruiz is a South American exile and comes from a perhaps similar tradition of filmmaking. His films are known for the way in which they combine documentary material with fictional into subtle and complex political statements. He has said of his work ...

'All my films have set up fiction against documentary, exposed what is factual in novelish daydreams, and what is lying in a document. I mean they ask to be taken as dialogues, not as a statement.' The perverse nature of the subject matter of this film is likely to prove perfect material for its director's sense of convolution.

## EDITOR'S VIEW

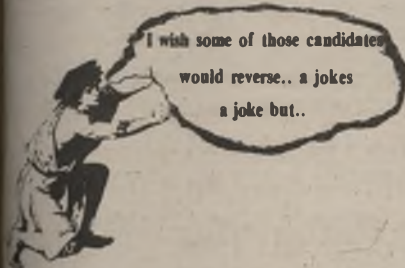
This week, a shortened *Craccum* due to several factors: One, a lack of advertising revenue, and two, the Presidential & Officers' elections this week.

#### DOMINO THEORY ALIVE

Dear Ed,

I applaud the changes that have been made to *Craccum* this year and it is definitely more readable than it has been in past years.

The following material is taken from an American magazine who interviewed Karen McKay, the director of the Free Afghanistan Movement and I think war in Afghanistan is an issue you should think of covering if you are to run issues on Nicaragua. There are two stories of Afghanistan, those of the mass media and those of the refugees.

In Time Magazine we can read of the CIA aid pipeline which is pumping weapons into the country and the money earmarked for aid. The true story is this does not exist, that aid does not get in the country and much of the money does not even get out of America. There has been a deliberate attempt by the State Department to stop effective aid for fear of being seen to get involved in someone else's war, a common accusation.

The war in Afghanistan if lost will have vast ramifications on the West as anyone who can read an atlas will see that from bases in Afghanistan airborne attacks can be launched against the straights of Hormuz through which 70% of the free world's imported oil must pass. Also from bases in Afghanistan the Soviet army will have another boarder with Iran which could be then be invaded to access the oil reserves there.

The second thing is that we do not hear much about are the Soviet atrocities against the civilian population. The Red Army invaded expecting to fight a conventional war much as the Americans did in Vietnam. 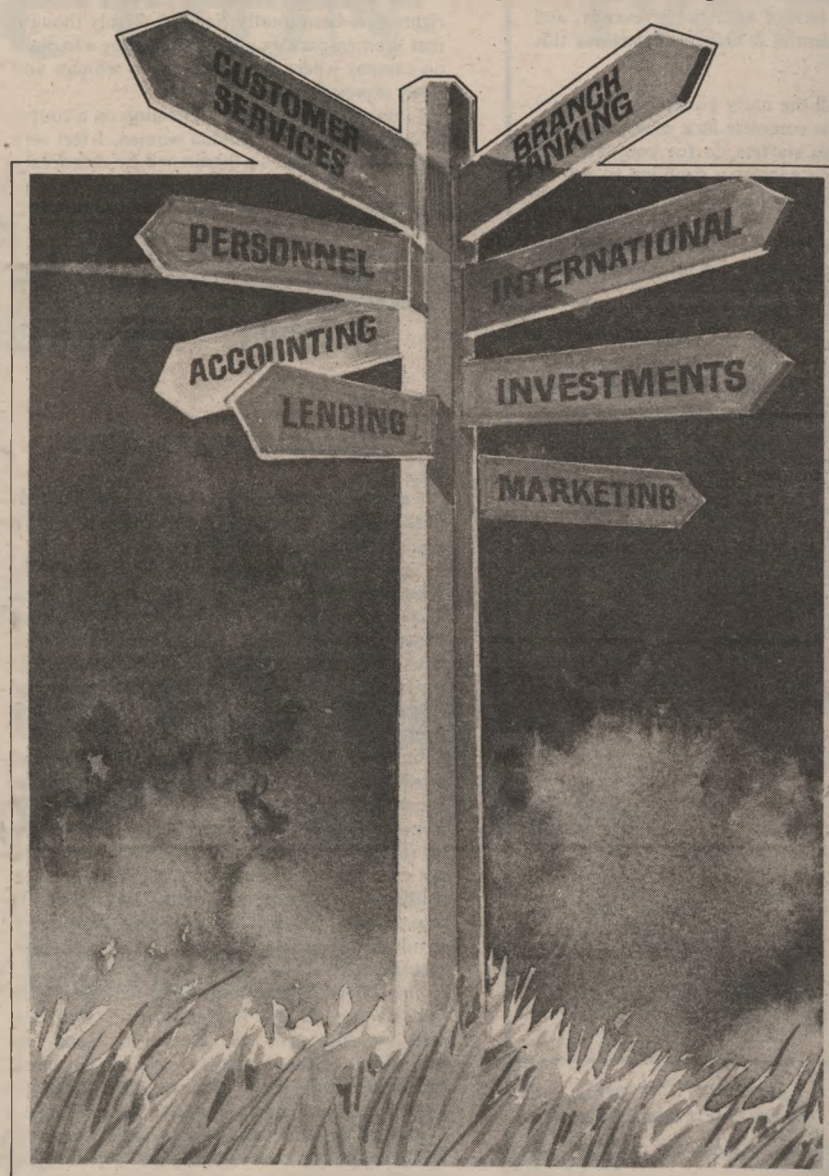
