




I must admit to having been, before this concert, one of the unenlightened many who had never heard anything by the Groovies outside 'Shake Some Action'. But the hype accompanying this fleeting visit gave me some high expectations.

Get it right, this band ain't The Who or the Rolling Stones, and the Hoodoo Gurus have surpassed them with similar material. They are a long-standing cult band with one all-time classic (and is it ever a classic) to their name. This is probably what they should be. But they have aged considerably better than the two aforementioned supergroups, and it is easy to see where the wonderful Gurus get their ideas from. The impression this one concert gave me is that the Groovies could have gone far further, given some more careful songwriting that avoided the sixties rock'n'roll rut. An enjoyable show sure, but what a shame about the lack of variation.

Having said that, there is no doubt that Cyril Jordan knows his stuff. Great guitar, up there with the best. Jack Johnson and Paul Zaul complimented with, respectively, fine rhythmand-vocals and strong drumming. George Alexander is only an adequate bass player, but what he lacked in innovation, he made up for with energy.

In fact, the whole band kept the energy level high, despite the poor vocal mix and the disappointingly-small crowd. As true professionals, they won the crowd over with their enthusiasm and fully deserved their two doubleencores. So there it is. A good show, if not a great one. I enjoyed it at the time. And that's what matters.

Two months ago, hearing Martin Phillipps perform to an enthusiastic, overfull Windsor was a memorable experience. Sunday at the Galaxy was not the same. The small crowd was not particularly warm, the mix was not good and the sound that echoed around the cavernous space was rather unlovely. A shame, because these are good songs, far more original than anything the

THREATENED COST RECOVERY

A Laurel and Hardy Approach to Uni Education



'This is a fine mess the Governments got us into Stanley!

At the moment the Labour Government's catchry is 'user pays' which is being applied to everything from the DSIR to the National Health System and now the 'user pays' principle is being mooted to include tertiary students. This will probably take the form of a 'cost recovery' icheme'

So what is cost recovery? When the Labour Government talks about cost recovery fees (or fullcost fees) they mean that tertiary students will have to pay the full cost of their education and not just the smaller tuition fee that is paid at the moment. That is, if a cost recovery scheme is prought in tertiary students could be charged up to \$45,000.00 for a three year degree.

To make matters worse, at no time in this debate has the Government stated that when a cost recovery scheme is adopted, the tertiary grants will increase to meet this extra burden

- NOW USER PAYS FOR EDUCATION?

In his address to Victoria University graduates ast May, the Education Minister, Mr Russell Marshall, said 'New Zealanders have three firm beliefs about education. The first is that it is a good thing and everyone should have it. The second is that no-one can have too much of it. And the third is that everyone should have equal opportunity to have as much education as he or she can benefit from.' Therefore by bringing in such a scheme the Government is not only contradicting themselves but contravening these fundamental beliefs.

Mr Marshall argues that it is hard to justify subsidised tertiary education and that 'Equality of educational opportunity is no longer enough'. This cost recovery proposal comes at a time when the Government is trying to reduce the internal deficit of \$600 million when GST is introduced as well as slashing \$15-20 m off the education

However Mr Marshall has come under heavy criticism. The Senior Government Whip, Dr Michael Cullen has attacked the Government's proposal to make students pay back the cost of their training. Dr Cullen argued that 'Not only will such a scheme create a tertiary education system for the elite of NZ., but we shall end up with a non-skilled society which in turn will mean a low growth society.

Professional employers, educators and academics are worried about the ramifications of a cost recovery scheme. It will most certainly mean a massive decline in student numbers forcing the wind down of tertiary institutions and a shortage of professional and technically trained people

Dr Tony Baird, deputy chairman of the Medical Association called the Government's idea 'a giant leap backwards into the dark ages'.

'It is unacceptable and inexplicable' he said. 'People who go on to practice medicine make their contribution in taxes, long hours as registrars and taking responsibility.

Knowing how concerned the Government is about deficits and budgetary shortfalls, one student suggested a more practical solution might be, 'to apply the same user pays principle to Government Ministers which means they would have to pay the full price of their accommodation, lunches at Bellamy's air travel - or better still introduce a cost recovery system in place of their ministerial pension. In that way the national dept will soon be cleared.'



1) A Special Meeting of S.R.C. may be demanded by resolution of the S.R.C. indject to Rule 38 of these rules, upon receipt by the S.R.C. Chairperson of the Executive Isolation or notice in writing as the case may be, the S.R.C. Chairperson (or if she/he fails omptly to do so, the Executive) shall fix the date, time and place for the special meeting, which be no later than five days after the passing of the Executive Resolution or the giving of notice in enting as the case may be. The special meeting shall in any event be held on a day on which lectures ar scheduled for all Faculties."

(ii) The notice convening any special meeting of the S.R.C. shall specify the nature of the business intended to be transacted thereat in any manner sufficient to give reasonable notice of the purpose thereof, and although the words of any proposed resolution shall be given in any such notice, any amendment thereof or any other motion dealing with the same matter shall be in order. Except as provided in this clause, no business other than that specified in the notice convening the meeting may be transacted by a special meeting of the S.R.C.'

THAT Rule 16 be amended by inserting the word 'shall' after the words 'proposed resolution'.

THAT Rule 63(i) be amended by the addition of the words: 'The Honorary Solicitor shall approve only such alterations or additions as appear to her/him to be free from ambiguity and to be not inconsistent with the other Rules and Schedules. Any alterations or additions not approved by the Honorary Socicitor shall not be registered but shall be referred back to the Association in General Meeting for reconsideration in the light of the Honorary Solicitor's comments thereon.'

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General Accounting Policies

- The measurement base adopted is that of historical cost. Reliance is placed on the fact that the Association is a going concern. Measurement under the historical cost has been observed in the preparation of the accounts except for the revaluation of plant and equipment.
- Accrual accounting has been used to match expenses and revenues.

Particular Accounting Policies - Accounts Receivable

Accounts Receivable are stated at expected realisable value.

Inventories
 Trading stock are stated at lower of cost, using a first in first out basis, and net realisable value. Base stocks of cutlery, crockery and light fittings are valued at cost and all subsequent purchases expensed.

Depreciation of Fixed Assets Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis for all fixed
 assets other than land at the rates that will write off the cost
 of the assets less their residual values over their expected useful
 lives. The principle rates used are as follows:

Rental Properties - Buildings 2.50% - Furniture and Equipment 10.00% Catering & Btudent Block - Plant, Equipment, Furniture and Fittings 10-40%

Campus Radio FM Station 20.00%

- Valuation of Plant and Equipment A full inventory of Plant and Equipment was undertaken in the 1980 year and valued at cost less accumulated depreciation, where the cost was identifiable, and by comparison with assets of similar age and type where no records existed. All subsequent additions have been recorded at cost.

<u>Changes in Accounting Policies</u>
- There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on bases consistent with those used in previous

11. STUDENT UNION BUILDING FUND

In addition to the annual subscription, members have since 1961 paid an annual contribution (currently \$12) towards the Student Union Building Fund. This fund has been used to pay for the construction of Student Union Buildings, including the Maidment Theatre, the Recreation Centre and the Human Sciences Caferteria. Since 1971 members contribution have totalled \$1.730,392 and the University has advanced further sums which are to be repaid from future contributions from members. The University claims that \$419,033 is owing to it as at 31 December 1985 (1984 : \$453,531). The Association occupies the Student Union Buildings by agreement with the University.

12. CONTINGENT LIABILITIES

- b) There is a disputed debt of \$4,500 which has not been accrued in the financial statements as at 31 December 1985, as the Association does not accept liability
