VACATION SCHOLARSHIPS IN THE AUSTRALIAN NATIONAL UNIVERSITY, 1986/87

THE PLO - A TERRORIST ORGANISATION OR A PARLIAMENT IN EXILE?

How democratic is the Palestine National Council?

Our last session was held in Amman in November 1984. All the session was broadcast on television live from A to Z. Everybody saw it, so you saw the attack on Arafat, the attack on the leadership, and you also saw the praise for Arafat and the praise for the leadership. All the normal things that we associate with Parliament were televised. And Israel saw it, our people in the occupied areas saw it, and that was very important as it put all the other Parliaments to

How do you react to claims that the political approaches of the PLO have proven unsuccessful with the PLO and that it is becoming more inevitable that a military option will continue.

There is no way by which you can judge the success of the Palestinian struggle except in the long term. The Palestinian struggle is a long term issue. I cannot pronounce a judgement on the failure of one type of struggle against the other. The Palestinian struggle must assume a political form, a diplomatic form, a cultural form, an economic form - all of these have been successful in my judgement because nationally, and internationally the Palestinians have created institutions to protect their national identity. The PLO may alter the kind of emphasis given at a particular stage of that struggle. Arafat has been pushing for a political solution, and he should, because ultimately the struggle is a political struggle. By no stretch of the imagination can our national homeland be liberated militarily. How can we possibly complete against the military might of Israel and the \$4 billion they receive from the US annually?

Briefly, how do you see the 'Palsetinian problem' being resolved?

Quite simply, the PLO as the representative body which speaks for Palestinians must be involved in negotiations. But the United States and Israel have consistently opposed the idea of negotiating with the PLO. How can there possibly be any just, comprehensive and lasting peace if one of the principle partners is excluded from any negotiations? How can any decisions concerning the Palestinian peoples be made without consultation with the Palestinian peoples representative, The Palestine Liberation Organisation? We want peace. It is for the United States and Israel to acknowledge we exist! Ibrahim Abu-Loghud is a former advisor to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation. He is presently a professor of Political Science at Northwestern University, Illinois, in the United States.

COST-RECOVERY FEES FOR OVERSEAS STUDENTS.

Mr Russell Marshall, Minister of Education, has been talking lately about 'user pays' for tertiary students. This is a clear warning that there is plenty of support from the Treasury and sections of the Labour Party for introducing a loans system or a tax on graduates.

At the moment these ideas are being debated, although the danger of them being implemented is a very real and immediate threat. There is also another proposal being considered by the Government which would set a precedent for a full user-pays tertiary system introducing costrecovery fees for nonquota overseas students. The Government would sell 'spare' places in universities and technical institutes to overseas students as a way of earning more foreign

The Government will decide whether to go ahead with this policy in October. At NZUSA's last meeting with Marshall he said that this proposal had a good chance of being implemented.

Why don't we sell off spare places in our universities to overseas students?

First of all this would completely contradict the reasons why we have overseas students studying in New Zealand. For years the Government has seen this as an important form of aid to our Asian and Pacific neighbours. Selling education means that only the rich people of these countries will benefit - this is not true aid.

Do we have any spare places to sell?

We don't really have 'spare' places in our tertiary system. Because of cuts in university funding over the past decade, the universities are barely able to cope with current demand. As it is, overseas students are restricted by quotas on all courses. If there are any spare places these tend to be in low demand courses - not courses like commerce, engineering and science which both New Zealand and overseas students are keen to study

But won't charging cost-recovery fees for overseas students help the universities?

The real problem is that the Government has cut back funding to the tertiary system over the past decade. Despite election promises the Government has done nothing to improve staff/student ratios. It is unlikely that costrecovery fees are going to help this situation at all. For example, when higher charges were made to overseas students in Australia, the money did not even go to the universities but to the Immigration department! And in Britain, universities were forced to charge full cost fees because the Government cut university funding! There is absolutely no guarantee that charging full cost fees will help the universities' financial

Are New Zealand students likely to be charged full cost fees?

As with overseas students, the danger is the precedent that this policy would make if you want to make money out of one group of students how long will it be before other groups are singled out? eg., mature students who are returning to university.

In this part of the 'user-pays' that Russell Marshall has been talking about?

Yes, 'user-pays' means that those who use the education system would have to pay for it. There has been a lot of talk about introducing a loans system for New Zealand Students.

The Treasury is very keen on this idea but we believe it would be disastrous for the New Zealand tertiary system. Even less people would be able to get to university and they would have to be wealthy enough to pay.

Would this mean that all overseas students would end up paying higher fees?

At the moment the Government has said that cost-recovery fees will only be charged for nonquota overseas students. All other overseas students who come in under the present quota only pay normal fees (the yearly \$1000 overseas student fees has been abolished for 1986).

/But charging full-cost fees is the 'thin edge of the wedge'. Once one group of students is made to pay, how long will it be before all overseas students are seen as a way for the Government to

Isn't this a good way for the country to earn more foreign exchange?

The Government is being very shortsighted if they believe that this is a good way to earn more foreign exchange. What happened to Britain in the early 80's when they introduced cost-recovery fees was that they faced a severe backlash from overseas students' home countries. Remember, we rely a lot on goodwill between New Zealand and Asian and Pacific countries to promote and develop our export trade. This is one of the longterm benefits from having overseas students in New Zealand. The Government is foolish if it is willing to jeopardise this goodwill by trying to earn short term dollars. Also as mentioned above, we are not likely to earn that much money as there isn't that many spare places anyway.

Do you mean that charging full cost fees to overseas students affects all New Zealand students, not just overseas students?

Most definitely it is all part and parcel of the Government trying to run the education system on a free market basis. Do you want an education system where education is a commodity that is sold to the highest bidder? How would you feel if you had to pay \$20,000 to \$45,000 to get your degree or if you had to pay back this amount after you had graduated?

'To every complex problem that confronts the human race there is an answer that is simple, and obvious, and wrong.' So said H L Mencken, and he might have been speaking of the proposal to recover the costs of University education by deferred loans.

Whatever may be appropriate grist for the free market mill, education deserves a higher regard. It is a social investment of which modern society needs more and better, more widely distributed. When education or health become merchandise, available only to the highest bidders, the worst forms of elitism take over. Each member of our society ought to have education available to them to their best achievable standard. The stophistication of the technological age cannot afford drop-outs. This is an argument for better quality education at Primary and Secondary levels. It is also an argument for open entry to every possible University course.

The concept of cost recovery supposes that all graduates, especially in the professional schools, become highly-paid tycoons. This is by no means the case. Many carry their learning into the community in modestly-rewarded jobs. Cost recovery would encourage us to see the University, not as a place where wisdom and truth are pursued, but as a licence vendor to enable a privileged caste to perpetuate their advantage. While many other elements of modern society are polarising the rich and the poor, free, universal education of good quality is an essential counter-weight



A Social History of Women and the **YWCA in Auckland** By Sandra Coney

Introducing Every Girl

Suffrage Day, 19 September, is an appropriate day for launching Every Girl, a history of the Auckland YWCA written by Sandra Coney to commemorate the association's entry into its second century of work. Many of the association's founding members were crucial to

the achievement of the vote for women.
On the first YWCA committees were four important women who fought for the vote: Mary Ellen Wilson, married to one of the proprietors of the Herald; Joseph Liston Wilson; Anabell Knight; Elizabeth Caradus, who with her husband ran the Freemans Bay Mission, and Annie Schnackenberg who was national president of the Women's Christian Temperance Movement when the vote was achieved in 1893. In addition, a staunch supporter, Amey Daldy, who bequeathed part of her fortune to the YWCA, was one of the most prominent of Auckland feminists, chairing huge Town Hall meetings on the suffrage. It was Amey Daldy who urged women to vote in their firsst election, saying 'Let not babies, the washtub or even dinners, prevent the women going.' Most of these women have been profiled in the book.

Contemporary cartoons show Annie Schnackenberg and Amey Daldy waiting at Auckland railway station to give white camellias to supportive parliamentarians when they came back from Wellington. Modern feminists have used the white camellia as a symbol of women's

Appropriately, Dame Cath Tizard, the city's first woman mayor, will launch the book. The first Auckland City Councillor, Ellen Melville, began the YWCA businesswomen's club in Customs Street in 1911. The city's first three women councillors, Ellen Melville, Emily Maguire and Alice Basten, were all supporters of the YWCA, speaking to the girls and involving themselves in activities. In the 1920s, the YWCA president, Margaret Campbell, as daughter of the mayor Mr George Baildon, was mayoress of the city. When the mayor, Christopher Parr, launched the YWCA businesswomen's club, he probably embarrassed his progressive wife, also a YWCA board member, when he declared that he still thought 'the home woman was the best'.

OTHER WOMAN Lisa ALTHER


I haven't read this book, the truth be told - nor do I have any intention of doing so. But, allow me to commit a cardinal sin in the complex etiquette of literary interpretation and pruvey this novel on the dubious merits of its cover.

Next to an expanse of naked neck, there is mention of 'kinflicks', a bestseller by the same author, the reputation of which is supposed to perform miracles on the sales figures of this, the third of Alther's major works.

A compulsory eulogy about the author reveals that Lisa Alther is an east coast American born in the 1940's - an international dweller probably confining her cultural abodes to those with room

It was the back cover of this book that caught my attention and a quick perusal guaranteed that I would never familiarise myself with its contents. According to this piece, the starlet of 'kinfucks' was 'sexy' and 'saucy', but Caroline Kelly, our new heroine is more mature. She has been left with two children, isolated and bewildered - not such hot names for kids (sorry, I couldn't resist a bit of grammatical frivolity). Caroline's savour is Hannah Burke described as 'nonogamous, middle-aged'. Why is it that so many books about women support the worst social prisons in which women are confined according to how they are defined? Why is the number of men she sleeps with and how old she is supposed to tell us anything relevant about a woman? No, there is nothing here for me and I will gladly move on. But - if it's a light weight, read-on-the-bus, double-as-a-door-stop, sort of story you're looking for then you too could be a sles figure on the cover of her next addition.

EARLY SPRING Tove DITLEVSEN

Early Spring is the publication, in one volume, of Ditlevsen's memoirs, previously published separately as 'Childhool' and 'Youth'. In an interview the author describes the beginning of the writing of the memoirs, 'Burning with desire to continue, I rushed for my typewriter and for the first time in three cursed years I wrote something that was good.' Although written in a period of deep depression shortly before the author's death there is vividness, wit, immediacy, there is much being said.

Tove Ditlevsen grew up in a crowded apartment in a working class neighbourhood with a desperation to escape the future of a 'stable' child-filled marriage. Chapter six begins... 'Childhood is long and narrow like a coffin and you can't get out of it on your own', and betrays the desperate bleakness that is an intrusive backdrop to the narrative.

After a prolific output as a writer, Tove Ditlevsen died in 1976 and is considered to be one of Denmark's most important writers. She is also hailed as one of the first and most powerful female voices to come out of the depression of the 1930s.

Recognition goes too, to Tiina Nunnally, recipient of the 1984 American-Scandanavian translation prize for her work on Tove Ditlevsen. Nannally, in her introduction to Early Spring comments, 'Translating is rather like taking a house apart brick by brick and then rebuilding it. You must examine every sentence, turn over every word. But the translation will never be the same as the original. It is a reconstruction.'

Early Spring is another Women's Press publication which on its own merits is a commendable enough introduction.



So The Saints are back in town and there's been a lot of changes since three teenagers not long out of Corinda High put out their first single on an independent label ten years ago. The manic drone of I'm Stranded, often labled punk by an enthusiastic overseas market is a far cry from the more melodious strains of the band's latest single, Burn Like Fire Would, which is already climbing the national charts. The band's lineup with the exception of the ever present Chris Bailey, have been as changeable as the wind.

The Saints original drummer, Ivor Hay, has reunited with Chris Bailey to join the band's latest Australia-wide tour promoting their newest album "All Fool's Day". On the subject of change, Hay has only one thing to say. Brisbane hasn't.

"Well I came on a short tour of Queensland with Christopher about two years ago and had a sort of summer holiday up here. But it's been eight or nine years since I lived here and a few things still spring to mind.

"People still tell you on the trains what station you'reat, and when you're at places like the RE there's always someone telling you there's only ten minutes until you have to stop drinking.

"What's annoyed me a lot is the number of cover bands around, people you find doing a lot of the support gigs and so forth.

"Ten years ago that's what used to get up my nose the most, you know, bands doing things like "Smoke on the Water" and stuff like that.

"I thought, well Brisbane's a cosmopolitan city now It's got big stadiums . . . main roads. Yet the system still seems to perpetrate cover bands. It seems the main ob-jective now is to get as dressed up as possible and get out

and play as many top 40 songs as you know.
"The Saints have neve been that way inclined. When we first went overseas we were accused of playing punk but never taking on the physical characteristics - you know -like dressing the right way. There was always some type of criticism," he said

Criticism of the band still abounds but in a different form. During tours audiences still call for Stranded, and

"It just doesn't seem relevant at this point in time. "What seems to have happened is a lot of people tended to miss out on what happened with us ten years ago and want to relive 1976.

'If punters wanted us to play a cover version of Smoke "If punters wanted us to play a cover version of Smoke on the Water ten years ago we didn't and we were persecuted for it. If punters now want us to cover the Saints of ten years ago by playing Stranded we'll ignore them.

"I think basically the band would like to make it without Stranded. It might be relevant to some people in the audience but it's no longer relevant to us," he said.

"Actually we were quite revolutionary, in our own way.

"Bands at the time were calling themselves things like Blob and Grunge. All we wanted to do was call ourselves something with 'The' in front of it.

"I guess we chose Saints because of our religious upbringing at various times. Bailey was heavily into Catholicism, Ed was into some wacky West German religion, and my grandfather was a bishop or something." Ivor said.

1976 saw the issue of Stranded, voted as best record of the week by Sounds Magazine, and of course, a host of offers from companies around the world.

"In the end none of us made a penny out of the album. We made a deal with a company, went off to England and they cut 50,000 copies and no more. I guess they went broke. EMI tried to get the original rights back but couldn't. None of us saw any money at all.

The group stayed in Europe quite a while, but ended by splitting. Ed and Ivor made their way back to Australia,





The company is the concept of Larry Parr who established Mirage Films in New Zealand, and who has spearheaded a revitalised New Zealand film renaissance. Five very different feature films have been made by Mirage in the last three years, all of which have had overseas sales and which have achieved distinctive maturity and recognition. These films include 'Pallet on the Floor', 'Constance', 'Shaker Run', 'Came A Hot Friday' and 'Bridge to Nowhere'. In addition 'Queen City Rocker' has just been completed. Larry Parr also coproduced 'Merry Christmas Mr Lawrence'.



Recently Reuban joined up, so the membership has grown and grown and now there's keyboards music to build the sound into a solid effect and work the waves out to live gigs with good effect. Both Reuban and Jason have the same surname, Craig, but are completely unrelated! However to complicate matters further, and luckily not on stage either, Reuban's dog is called, wait for it... 'Jason'. I'll say no more...

Like a lot of bands Work to Rule are into cover versions of material from the Narcs, Angels, U2 amongst others specializing in parties, dances and college socials. Now they are into writing and performing their own originals, and combining the material within their sets. It's always hard to get known in the musical jungle and even getting a booking for an unknown band can be a break of sorts these days when it's becoming such a professional costly industry, and promoters only want name bands or want to have you sell your soul to rock & roll along with the favours that they are doing you - never the other way around of course! Still, the ATI

rech's cafe has seen the band in action along with recently the University's very own varsity cafe for the recent E.U. rage there. The band has even done a gig for the Parklands convention centre at Warkworth as well as the many too numerous to mention dances and socials.

And they will do more. Neil will take your booking on 871-884 in the evenings if you would like to give him a bell. The only trouble be tells me is that the coming examinations will put paid to being completely available for about a month while the pressure is on but after tha, post examination parties, and social events are all go. Seems a little strate, that we all have to compress our social active into a small package while there's examinations, then let rip after to make up for the hibernation!

What about recordings? You thought I was never going to get around to the subject didn't you? (And Rajan tells us that they recorded a two song demo tape in March at the Last Laugh recording studios downtown but was actually mastered here on campus. At Campus Radio no less and it's been played by none other than Graystoke of course. Only once he assures us - will we all believe it.. or not?

Well, what actual music does actually invluence this band, Work to Rule? Influences come from all different directions according to the individual band members' tastes. Even more pub, club work means exposure and you bet that you never know when some A. & R. person is in the audience just looking for such a promising band... the dream machine continues. My aroha to Chris, the people of Otaakau Marae, Hine o te Iwi Marae Ki Murihiku, and oku hoa Katoa o Otepoti.



CHILE - Hasta Cuarado? by David **Bradbury**

Hasta Cuarado translated to 'when will it stop' is a really worthwhile and shocking film by Mr Bradbury. He combines different live episodes, shot in Chile, in a documentary style film that paints a vivid view of life under the aresehole

The situations he has captured are almost unbelievable in their relevance. Mr Bradbury in effect says nothing - the live footage speaks for itself

In one example a woman is notified of her husbands body being identified at the morgue (tortured and shot by the secret police). Impromptly she cries out about the injustices and evil deeds of Pinochet's regime. 'Hasta Cuanado?' she screams 'Hasta Cuanado?'

Story outline: Elizabeth, young, beautiful and divorced, works for an art gallery with particular responsibility for mounting an exhibition of unknown artist Matthew Farensworth. She is too intelligent and busy for most men to cope with, although her ex-husband still needs her reassuring company. One day out shopping Elizabeth has a brief meeting with John, a stockbroker who clearly finds her attractive. They meet again, perhaps by chance, and a relationship develops that is at first a mixture of flirtation and caution. But what seems to be a boyish mischief in John's love games begins to reveal itself as an eroticism with undertones of sadism. Initially reluctant, Elizabeth yields more and more readily to John's humiliating and dangerous demands. Her work suffers as a result of her obsessiona nd her private life is given over to John. She no longer confides in her colleagues at the gallery. The only time that she becomes more like her old self is when she visits the elderly artist Farnsworth in his quiet country home. John imposes the ultimate humiliation on Elizabeth when he tricks her into receiving the caresses of another woman. A meeting with Farnsworth at his one man show confirms her self disgust when she is next in bed with John she decides to leave him. He realises too late that he is truly in love with her but she does not return. Critical comment: This comes out of the same Pandora's Box as Last Tango and Emmannuelle insofar as it deals with a master and slave relationship such as figures in more erotic fantasies than is publicly admitted. (Except in the many postcard advertisements to be found amongst the French lessons and large chests for sale.(Abetted by cinematographer Peter Biziou, Adrian Lyne has given New York the stylised aura of a tourist resort in which Rourke and Basinger desport themselves in a manner most remarkable yet only in a degree more candidly lustful than the gambollings of models given the job of publicising package holidays for singles. And, indeed, this is not inapt. Elizabeth does, in a sense, take a short holiday from the sanity and endeavour of her ordinary life. It is her return to reality - perhaps sadder and wiser - that links the movie to the integrity of the autobiography from which it is derived and reinforces the temporary insanity motif. The film may cause shock embarrassment, rage, but many will respond to it because they recognise something of themselves. Or because they are bored with the cheap thrills of video soft porn.

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
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EGYPTIAN CHAPLAIN'S CHAT

WAGE PEACE

The Great Peace towards which people of goodwill throughout the centuries have inclined their hearts, of which seers and poets for perations have expressed their vision, and for which from age to age the sacred scriptures of mankind have constantly held the promise, is now at long last within the reach of the nations. For the first time in history it is possible for everyone to view the entire planet with all its myriad diversified peoples in one perspective. World peace is not only possible but inevitable'. (1)

Archaeology, oral traditions and all other attempts to rationally express our own misty beginnings suggest that strife, confrontation and bloody warfare have forever been as widespread in a suffering humanity as today's common cold. Just recently, in Western China, lifelike ceramic armies confirmed vividly what the written records already told, that large scale military manoeuvres had already become well established as the life-style of China thousands of years ago.

On campus, religious principles or concepts may not be universally welcomed or approved, it is self-evident that a genuine and widespread spirit of enquiry breeds in students a healthy and unrestrained scepticism, scarcely paralleled elsewhere. Long may this endurel Nevertheless, and in spite of this challenging spirit of agnosticism, a yearning towards peace and away from the escalating nuclear weaponry of megakill and total destruction, is as heartfelt here as in all other human environments. From the Middle Ages onwards universities have witnessed countless revolutions, planned, fomented and carried out by staff and students alike, yearning to right the wrongs and injustices of a suffering humanity.

CONTINUATION OF "WAGE PEACE"

The devotees of Faiths which proclaim a transcendent spirit and a dependent humanity may not, on the surface, appear to have much in common with atheists, rationalists and humanists who deny the very existence of this all-powerful Centre of the universe. It is suggested, however,t hat this is more illusionary than valid: by seeking to promote well-being, understanding, justice and mercy among their fellow beings these too are sharing with their religious co-students the establishment of a better world for humanity. Higher plants all need light, which has one source the sun. Many plants never see the sun, but life-giving light and warmth filter through to sustain them. Similarly many men never reach out to the Supreme or Unknowable, or care to study this Source through the words of Diving Manifestations or Prophets. Hopefully, in the quest for genuine and lasting peace, those of all faiths, and none, should learn to collaborate in a spirit of true love, tolerance and understanding. It is suggested now that this was the motivating principle behind the United Nations move in designating 1986 as the International Year of Peace.

Peace has come to mean many different things to many people. Probably most cogent, and widely accepted, is the total absence of violence, disharmony and discord, applied at the family, tribal, national and international levels. Without personal well being, harmony and content at the individual level, no widespread peace is possible. In archaic English peace could be used as a verb, and in the imperative is still applied today. If peace does break out soon, 'peace' may well become a commonplace form

Within several of the main world religions, the teachings on peace, as revealed in their scriptures seem to be at variance with the warlike spirit shown by their adherents. In early Christian times the teachings of the Stranger of Galilee showed Him to be a practitioner of peace and humility. He also appeared to endorse the millenial vision of the Judaic prophets. Hopes of peace, if not their realisation, seemed within reach. It was only in hindsight that theologians were able to point out that Christ spoke of bringing a sword and not peace. The world at large was not yet ready for, or able to implement

A comparable situation arose within Islam, even during the lifetime of the Prophet. The hopes and pronouncements of Muhammad on peace were changed so that a limited use of arms to protect family, tribe and state were permitted. These bounds were soon surpassed, ushering in a violent and bloody phase of warfare wherever the new faith spread. The 'jihad' or holy war against infidels, finds no place in the Quran. Modern followers of Muhammad and the Christian Prince of Peace vie with each other in senseless killing and mayhem; in Ireland Christian fights Christian, in Lebanon, Moslems and Jews become Christians, embroiled in factional fighting.

On campus numerous societies and clubs exist to ameliorate or hopefully eliminate many of the social ills and abuses of contemporary society. Some of these may be linked to religious bodies. Many, sincerely doubting the validity of superhuman striving, foster their activities in purely political, social or humanitarian circles. In all cases, however, and this is both important and timely, they all aim to eliminate the major discerned ills of our day - racism, the huge gulf between rich and poor, unbridled nationalism, religious strife, emancipation of women, universal education and improved communication eg through an international auxiliary language.

On the 24th October last, and in anticipation of the UN. declaring 1986 as International Year of Peace, the supreme body of the BAha'i Faith, known as the Universal House of Justice, presented a far-reaching proclamation, entitled The Promise of World Peace' to the rulers of the world.

Significantly this message is addressed to the 'Peoples of the World', not just their leaders, but etiquette suggested the prior release to Heads of State and the Secretary General of the world body. Since that date many state rulers, as well as civic and other leaders in society have received the statement, and day by day the number of citizens-to become acquainted with its striking contents, wholly or in part, continues to grow. In humility, but overwhelmed by the profound and pressing nature of this unique pronouncment, the A.U. Baha'i Club wishes to share it with all who may wish to sight it.

In the last six months, two weeks have been particularly noteworthy for Aucklanders interested in peace activities. Firstly the week surrounding UN Day, and coinciding with the initial release of the Baha'i peace message, was set aside by the Auckland Council of Churches and associated bodies as a prayer week for world peace. Those involved included the Council of Churches, the Baha'i Community, the Buddhist Community, the Catholic Commission for Justice and Peace, the Indian Association, the Jewish Community, and the Moslem Association. An excited Sikh observer, sharing his personal views over a cup of tea enthused over the breadth of religious involvement and putting in a heartfelt plea that the peace plaus and programmes such as we were then experiencing, might persist. Only last week, three days had peace events organised either by the Council of Churches or the Baha'i Community

Somervell Presbyterian Church, the St John's Theological College and the McLaurin Chapel were all to have hosted Bishop Toth a prominent theologian and peace worker from Budapest. In the event Cyclone Martin precluded his presence at the first, but on arrival he was able to share his knowledge of the Soviet, and eastern Europe as well as a surprising knowledge and understanding of the problems viewed from the West. He was able to deal with ascerbic guestions on both U.S. and Soviet policies with commendable restraint and understanding.

The Saturday Conference, appropriately held in a human sciences theatre, provided a forum for no less than nine highly qualified speakers from overseas other parts of NZ and our own university staff. Subjects handled included the Peace Message from the Secretary General to the UN,' 'Human Nature in the Peace Process', 'Women and Peace', 'Peace and Prejudice', 'Universal Language 'Economics', 'Disarmament' and the 'Promise of World Peace'. The daily press singled out one topic only, 'Peace and Prejudice', delivered by Wally Hirsh, the NZ Race Relations Conciliator. A stirring Maori welcome from a Manurewa group and peace songs by the Pakuranga Intermediate SChool singers helped preclude intellectual dyspepsia.

The A.U. Campus community displays a unique front to Auckland and NZ society. All age groups are represented though the median age is youthful. The typical NZ range of ethnicity is enhanced by students and staff from overseas. Peace may not be regarded as a major topic for study or extra-curricular involvement. Just the same, at their best, Kiwis make up a truly caring community, and students are always game to challenge the sacred cows of former generations. Saturday's challenge to 'Wage Peace should become our very own Karanga. 'Kia hora te maungarongo!'

ATHEISM'S SELF-INDUCED SICKNESS: **MYOPIA & BLINDNESS REGARDING EVIDENCE**

Dear Christopher John and atheists

I perused your article with much care, considerable interest, and more than a little amusement. When I read of the severe plight of the atheist - 'genuine perplexity, frustration and even anger at the fact that Christians cannot help them with where to look for God' - I was temporarily lost as to what emotional response to evoke from my repertoire. Should I weep or chortle? As if by divine inspiration, a quote from literary critic and former-atheist, C.S. Lewis, came into my mind and decided me. I opted for the latter and let out a guffaw. Says Lewis: 'The notion that everyone would like Christianity to be true, and therefore all atheists are brave men who have accepted the defeat of all their deepest desires is simply impudent nonsense'. Your article certainly demonstrated this. Allow me to explain.

It is clear from your semantic gymnastics that to you, the issue of evidence is totally irrelevant. It appears that you wouldn't recognize evidence if it walked up to you with a sign pinned to it. Why is this? Quite simply because you declare the evidence inappropriate before it has even been raised, let alone examined make an apriori judgment where no facts which reflect positively on God's existence are admissible in the case. An approach loaded with so many aprioris may be great philosophy where any assumption deserves serious inspection, including Woody Allen's poignant observations: 'If my soul exists without my body. I am convinced that all my clothes will be loose-fitting', reality is an illusion then I definitely overpaid for my carpet'. Your approach may be good philosophy, but it certainly isn't good history.

Worse than that, you set up, and shoot down, a straw man in the accusation that Christians have their own criterion by which to judge historical facts. Then, ironically, the exclusive criterion you accuse us of using, you yourself employ. 'The atheist', you say, 'knows that a certain class of statement does stand or fall with historical investigation; he also knows that those statements fundamental to Christian belief of your variety do not fall into

How does the atheist know this? Why does he know that 'no amount of historical investigation will prove these things' Again, because from the outset he rules out historical facts which

deems threatening. This is precisely what you have done.
I can understand why you so earnestly wish for the New Testament documents to be at best a non-historical fable 'rather like a poem or story which inspires one to great heights' and which should be placed on the shelf next to the other 'greats' Winnie the Pooh and Mother Gose. Much as we might want to. however, we cannot bend the New Testament documents to fit the arbitrary mythical mould into which you would force them. As the famous Oxford don, C.S. Lewis, writes about an objector legend or romance, I want to know how many legends and romances he has read, how well his palate is trained in detecting them by the flavour... I have been reading poems, romances, on-literature, legends, myths all my life. I know what they are like. I know that not one of them is like this'.

fundamental weakness of your argument is that you try to force an arbitrary wedge between 'historical narrative' and what could be called 'theological narrative' in order to throw out the latter. I quote: 'You must discard all that is not historical narrative

cause it is not amenable to normal investigative procedures'. There are a number of problems here which I wish to examine First, although some parts of the Bible are not historical ive. you seem to have overlooked the fact that the New Testament documents in question - particularly the four gospels are historical marrative. These are the primary sources used to ide the data concerning the life of Christ. As archaeologi Albright observes: 'We can already say emphatically there is no longer any solid basis for dating any book of the New Testament after about A.D. 80... Thanks to the Qumran discoveries, the New Testament proves to be in fact whazt it was formerly believed to be: the teaching of Christ and his immediate



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Second, one of the cardinal tests 'of documentary auribul and authenticity', says lawyer and historiographer J Montgomery, 'is that of internal evidence. Here historical literary scholarship continues to follow Aristotle's eminent dictum that the benefit of the doubt is to be given document itself, not arrogated by the critic to h means that one must listen to the document itself and not see fraud or error unless the author disqualifies himself contradiction or known factual inaccuracies'

Third, your article assumes that historical facts are all parate from, and can never lead to, theological facts (Particularly abhorrent to you is the idea that Jesus is (has a claim on your life, and that this is demonstrable fro evidence.) Unfortunately for you, such a clean-cut demonstrable between historical and theological truth is not po is that the two are often inseparably wedded. And when you the documents of the case (as I hope you have, or at least you cannot but help see the obvious. Let me furnish just examples which I feel will silence you on this point.

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
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
