New Zealand is supposedly a democracy, but what is it real choice? We are not offered a wide, diverse range talented potential Prime Ministers. For the Prime linistership we can choose between two candidates, these ring the leader of the Labour party and the leader of e National party. Even for the member of parliament your local electorate there are seldom more than eight indidates, but the real choice is between only two or one stential winners. Less than twenty of New Zealand's 95 arliamentary seats could be considered marginal, and these seates it is always a contest between only two ptential winning candidates, be it Labour vs National

In New Zealand, the voter who is not a party activist has a very limited choice of who governs.

r National vs Democrat. The majority of seats are safe or either Labour or National. Labour holds the city and 4aori seats, while National holds the rich city and rural eats. The marginals are the provincial town and mixed ity seats, both of these types having a cross-section of oters, which gives candidates of either major party a easonable chance of victory. The problem remains that 1 less than twenty seats do voters have a real contest from thich to decide, while in all the others the voter has little impact on what is a certain result. It is the party which olds a safe seat that determines who the MP shall be, of the voters.

It is party candidate selection level that our MPs are chosen. Only party faithful participate in this selection process, and in the vast majority of New Zealand seats (the safe ones), only the party faithful determine the candidates who then become MPs.

The mass control over the choice of Prime Minister is even less. The National conferences of the major parties decide who their party leader will be. Again, these conferences are typically attended by party activists, and when their party is in opposition the question of party leadership is inevitably raised. Occasionally an opposition leader is replaced, and the new leader then faces the voters in six months to two years time, as a possible Prime Minister. The governing party's conferences have not in the history of the NZ Labour and National parties voted out their leader while he was Prime Minister.

Unfortunately for New Zealand, cake donations take precedence over genuine skill and a refreshing approach.

Incumbency counts for too much in New Zealand. A challenge to the sitting member is worthwhile and can only promote competent politicians. If the parliamentarian is capable, s/he will have nothing to fear, and will merely be reminded of his/her accountability and the need to be an effective representative. If the MP is not representing his/her electorate well, and is incompetent as a parliamentarian, there is an obligation on the party to replace him/her with an efficient candidate.

Good candidates do not necessarily make good MPs, so it is especially important that an MP be given a critical review by his/her party after his/her first term of office. This is not so crucial upon completion of second or third terms by an MP, as s/he will have already survived an evaluation of his/her introduction to parliamentary life.

Incumbency counts for too much in New Zealand.

The blame for the inadequacies of our current representatives rests with the party candidate selection process. Most electorates have a local electoral committee for the electorate. This is sub-divided into local branches by area, there being an average of about ten in an electorate. Each local branch sends a delegate who is a member of the L.E.C. The LEC takes a stronger interest in selection in safe seats or marginals where the party's candidate has a chance of winning.

On the night of the candidate selection meeting, a handful of hopefuls harangue the LEC heavies before a decision is made.

Herein lies the heart of the problem. The candidates who are successful are preferred on the wrong grounds. Outsiders who may have excellent organisational abilities are usually overlooked, in favour of a local who has assisted the party in the past. This assistance may take the form of donations to cake stalls, canvassing, or pamphlet distribution. This local person has slowly worked up through the Local Electoral Committee, and is usually an officer within the electorate's party structure. By natural progression, these locals become candidates who become MPs who become Prime Ministers. Party candidates may have status within that party, but for what? Unfortunately for New Zealand government, cake donations take precedence over genuine skill and a refreshing

The reason for this conservative approach by our political parties toward candidate selection and MP review is the revered tradition of 'party unity'. For the sake of apparent 'party unity' the New Zealand political structures are reluctant to challenge incompetence, and reluctant to promote diversity.

In New Zealand, the voter who is not a party activist has a very limited choice of who governs.

For MP the usual real choice is one, sometimes two potentially winning candidates. Our list of alternatives for Prime Minister numbers only two.








Guide to Cheep Eats

Korean Barbeque

Some of you may not believe in time warps but down in High St, is a small piece of Korea which you really should try to experience. The Korean Barbeque has a relaxing atmosphere and in this world of artificiality and chrome, muted greys and coral pinks, it's a pleasure to find a restaurant with interiors of natural wood. The service was uncharacteristically good for a New Zealand restaurant where, as we don't vell like the Yanks or whinge like the English, things are inclined to be a little lax.

The Korean Barbeque is unique in that you cook your own food in a small steamer which has a dome in the middle for frying. The assortment of seafoods, meats, and vegetables served were very fresh and tastily presented. Our host explained the use of our unusual cooking appliance and the adventure began. I had ordered King prawns and Mussels and my friend had opted for the Beef and Chicken; with this we received a plate of vegetables comprising spring onions, bean sprouts, cauliflour, sweetcorn, bamboo shoots, carrots and marrow - all uncooked. The meal was very sustaining, and the generous portions we were served took approximately 2 hours to cook and eat, although your intrepid reviewers may have been a little timid in the amount we were cooking.

The desserts on offer were a variety of liqueurs poured over ice-cream, and also Lychees and icecream. These were all very reasonably priced at \$3.00.

The Korean Barbeque is definitely to be tried by those looking for something a little different and very enjoyable. It provides an excellent setting for initial outings with a new friend - if the conversation runs out, there's plenty of cooking to do! It is a B.Y.O. restaurant and averages out in price at \$20 per person. A culinary experience all of its own.




TOMATO AND PASTA BAKE




BEDFELLOWS

RAZOR 4 REVIEW

RAZOR, for those of you who don't know is a magazine produced by Aucklands 'student' underground, it is not ommercial nor is it well known outside a select few. Included in the content are film-shorts and comic

reviews, illustrators are interviewed but by far the majority consists of comic strips and serials.

Many of those who follow the local comic scene will find familiar names from Craccum of past years; Tisco by Kupe has a notable presence in Razor, Cornelius Stone and Warwick Gray also feature prominently.

There is no faulting the graphic and layout ability of the strips, - clear, large and well balanced. However the same cannot be said for the articles and reviews. The small type used (60% the size of this type) while allowing a great deal of information to be transmitted, it does so at the risk of discouraging readers. As to the style and content, while humour is certainly present, it's of the sharp satirical style rather than Garfield meets Dog. Instead imagine George Orwell meets Judge Dread. But that suggests that Razor doesn't have its own style - which it most certainly does.

I have no idea of the cost involved in obtaining a copy of Razor 4, but no matter what it is, buy it, it will be value

Razor 4 was edited by Graham Hedgeman and is available from the University Bookshop, Old Book Cellar, Just Desserts, Mark 1 Comics and 'other places'. In July Razor 5 is due out.

As a final note on the nature of Razor's production an excerpt from it's frontispiece:

Craccum talked with Grant Simpson, a member of A.U.S.A's 16 member executive.

CRACCUM: Grant, could you please tell us what environmental issues you're working on at the moment? Grant: One of the biggest ones I'm looking at is 2.4.5-T. I've got a few reports coming in on this, some about the health aspects of 2.4.5-T and some on the alternatives to it. Later on I'll be looking at doing something with Michael Heriot on Student Union beautification. We'll be having some sort of competition where people, particularly in Town Planning and Architecture, put in proposals. These are judged, and the best one is implemented or at least thought of seriously.

Another big project, continued from last year, is the building for the corner of Alfred and Symonds St. CRACCUM: This is the Student Union Tower Block

Grant: Yes, the reason why I'm interested in that as Environmental Affairs Officer, is that if you want to make something nice you've got to do it at the planning stage when it's a lot cheaper, rather than complaining about something once it's done. The current student association building here is in many ways a case of "We've got what we've got" and it's very difficult to do anything with it and that's just tough.

Another thing coming up is the Beech forest issue. I might have been too late for that this year, because I'm not sure whether the conservation bill is going through. I'm having a motion on that at the second S.R.C., so I can write something on this supported by A.U.S.A. policy rather than just a personal opinion. It's really hard for me as Environmental Affairs Officer not having been in touch with that issue over the summer, to really know what to do. I could just jump in and say things on behalf of the association, but really I don't know what I'm talking about. But that's not my priority at the moment, I can't really do much about that. My priority is 2.4.5-T. There's quite a lot I can do about that issue because I've got the resources, the scientific material together.

Contrary to popular belief, TISA CARDS are not University enrolment cards. Auckland University students must BUY a TISA CARD, if they want one, for \$20. The 1987 student discount book is an excellent advertisement for TISA CARD, but it should not be funded with succent money.

VISIBILITY VIBES

here are good reasons for slowing down in the wet.
You need the length of a rugby field (100 metres)
to stop in the wet if you are travelling at 80km/h.
On a dry road it would take about 60 metres.

Road surfaces can become very slippery when they are wet. It is therefore very important that you adjust your speed and following distances to allow for the extra stopping distance needed.

During rain the road accident rate is about four times the fine weather rate. The main types of wet weather accidents due to road conditions are head-on collisions, cornering accidents and losing control on straight roads. And most of these accidents are linked with slippery road

surfaces and/or bald tyres.

It's not just at high speeds that rain can seriously affect stopping distances; around town at 50km/h you will have to allow for the rain. Travelling at a speed of 50km/h may not sound very fast, but think of it this way—a car travelling at 50km/h will move 14 metres in just one second. Research has shown that on average it takes three quarters of a second to react to a hazard and get your foot on the brake. That means at 50km/h you will travel 10 metres before you begin to stop. On a dry road with good brakes you will have stopped in 26 metres. But on a wet road you will need about 40 metres to stop. So, in the wet, it takes you nearly twice as long to stop. In other words your braking ability is only half as good as it is on a dry road.

Slowing Down

You can make allowance for this decrease in your braking ability by slowing down. Then, if you have to stop you will need less distance for braking. And it also means you won't have to slam on your brakes, which is just as well because slamming on your brakes on a greasy road is the surest way to get into a skid. The best way to stop is to apply the brakes progressively as this prevents the wheels from locking up.

Because your stopping distance has doubled, you should double the distance between you and the car in front. Don't go into the extra gap left by someone else. The other driver is being sensible in leaving a larger gap to stop in.

The early phase of rain is a dangerous time because it creates a slick film on the road surface, which is very slippery. It takes continuing hard rain to wash it away, so it is important to slow down with the first showers.

Slowing down helps you in another way too. You will have more time to spot hazards such as water lying on the road. Driving fast through surface water can cause the water to spray the engine and drown it. Water spray can also hinder another driver's vision.


It is always important to slow down to go around a corner but on a wet road it is even more vital. Slow down before the corner, not halfway around it. That could be too far to stop yourself skidding off the road or into an on-coming car.

Dealing with a Skid

The first advice about skids is avoid getting into one in the first place by adjusting your driving to suit the conditions.

However, if you do get into a skid then DON'T JAM ON THE BRAKES AND DON'T PUSH IN THE CLUTCH. That will only make it worse. Take your feet off the pedals and turn the wheels to point in the same direction as the car is skidding. As the car straightens out, straighten the wheels.

Look how much Longer it takes in the wet.



However, don't make violent turns on the steering wheel. The less violent your steering movements, the more easily you will recover control.

Usually speed is a major factor in causing a skid, so slow down and give yourself more time to react.

Visibility Dissolves in the Wet

A big danger when driving in rain or fog is the lack of side vision. You need to watch out for pedestrians crossing the road and cars turning out of side streets.

In the wet much depends on the effectiveness of the windscreen wipers. Rubber blades can deteriorate rapidly

especially if the car is frequently parked out in the sun. If your wipers can't cope with a downpour pull in to the side of the road and stop, or at least slow down and leave plenty of room between your car and the car ahead in case it stops suddenly.

Driving at night in the wet is one of the most difficult conditions a motorist encounters as not only is visibility reduced enormously but there is also usually glare on the windscreen and the road is slippery. Rain on the headlights scatters the beam and makes it less effective. All this adds up to potentially dangerous situations.

Wet weather accidents at night happen at about twice the rate of day time wet weather accidents. The types of accidents which are very bad at night are collisions with objects such as power poles and fences, and collisions with pedestrians crossing the road. Both occur at about three times the day time rate. These accidents are obviously influenced by problems with visibility as well as stopping distances.

There is only one way to handle poor visibility and that is by slowing down. If the unexpected happens you then have time to cope with it. Most of us forget that other drivers can't see very well in heavy rain either. We tend to think that if we can see them then they can see us. This is not always true. The same applies to pedestrians – few people on foot realise the extent to which a motorist's vision is reduced.

See Clearly

Good vision begins with a clear windscreen inside and out so wash your windscreen regularly.

A windscreen which keeps misting up can be very annoying and very dangerous. Closed vehicles tend to mist up. The best solution is to circulate air through the car. With most ventilation systems it is advisable to leave the windows open a crack because most heater systems don't have any effect on the side or rear windows. Peering through a fogged up window or struggling to wipe the inside surface clear while driving is a sure way to cause an accident.

Keep a clean cloth and an anti-mist spray handy to wipe the inside of the windscreen when the car is stationary.

In freezing temperatures carry a piece of sacking to put over the windscreen if you have to park for more than a few hours, or put a newspaper on the windscreen, using the wiper blades to hold it down. For ice on side windows use either a plastic scraper or de-icing fluid and fill the windscreen washer bottles with a fluid that de-ices as well as cleans.

Night in Shining Headlights

Put your headlights on as soon as daylight begins to fade. You must display headlights during the legal hours of darkness which are:

• 30 minutes after sunset until 30 minutes before

• any other time when there is not sufficient daylight

to clearly see a person or vehicle 100 metres away. Use dipped headlights rather than parking lights if the light is fading—they cost very little to run and will not shorten the life of your battery. It pays to keep your headlights (and side and tail lights) clean. A spattering of mud will cut down the effectiveness of the beam considerably. With old cars more powerful globes or a new reflector can brighten things up.

Beams should be properly adjusted to give the best light and to reduce glare for on-coming drivers. Here is a simple way to check that your headlight beams are pointing in the right direction:

1. Park your car about three metres back from the garage wall.

2. Measure the distance from the centre of the lights to the ground and the distance between the lights.

3. Make two marks on the wall at the appropriate height and distance apart.

4. Now turn on the headlights at full beam.

The centre of the beams should not shine above the horizontal line between the marks and they should drop about 10cm when dipped. Nor should they shine to the right of the marks. If they do, they will be pointing at on-coming traffic.

The glare of on-coming headlights can be confusing. The human eye takes seven seconds to fully recover from headlight dazzle and at 80km/h you'll have travelled 150 metres in that time. The best solution is to look to the left rather than directly at the lights.

When driving at night, slow down. Make sure you can easily stop within the range of your headlights. Outside the range there could be any number of hazards which you couldn't avoid at high speed.

Cyclists

Cyclists should also take extra care at night. With early night-fall more people will be cycling home in the dark. Too many of them don't use lights. Bicycle lights should be large and bright and clearly visible from 100 metres and this includes the tail lights. You should also have a good quality reflector to the rear, and reflectors on the pedals are a good idea.


If you are a cyclist or a pedestrian don't assume that drivers can see you. You may be out of the range of their headlights or the driver may be temporarily dazzled by on-coming lights. Approximately 40 percent of accidents on New Zealand roads occur after dark.

Your Point of Contact

Your tyres are your point of contact between you and the road. They are also your means of traction. In wet weather that traction is reduced by the slippery roads so it becomes especially vital that your tyres are in good

The law requires a tread depth of at least 1.5mm. Check that all your tyres have enough tread (and don't forget to check the spare). Just one bald tyre on a car can get you into all sorts of difficulties.

Correct inflation of tyres is important, for both safety and life of the tyres. Over inflated tyres are more prone to skid. As well as that incorrectly inflated tyres (over inflated or under inflated) don't last as long. Under inflated tyres can affect fuel consumption as well. Check tyre inflation as part of your regular routine of checking oil and water levels. Do you know what the recommended pressures for the tyres on your car are?



Car Check Up

Your car should be in good order to cope with wet or cold weather. Use this checklist and tick off each box as you examine your car.

- ☐ Tyres—Check for 1.5mm tread depth. Check there are no cracks or bulges in the walls. Check the spare as well.
- ☐ Brakes Check for wear. Is the master cylinder topped up?
- □ Exhaust system Make sure there are no holes.
 □ Battery Clean the terminals, tighten the leads.
- Check the water levels.
- □ Fanbelt Check for wear.
 □ Radiator If you live in an area where water freezing in the radiator is a possibility, use an anti-freeze in
- the cooling system in winter.

 Carburettor—Check for leaks.
- ☐ Lights—Check all the lights work. Clean the lenses. ☐ Windscreen wipers—Check the wiper blades. If worn, replace. Fill the windscreen washer bottle.
- Heater/Demisters Check they are working properly.
 Body work Check rust spots, clean them. Plug leaks in window surrounds.
- Miscellaneous—Check the jack works. Put a torch in the car. A small shovel might get you out of trouble. Carry a first aid kit. Consider a tow-rope and battery jumper leads.

Orientation's main act this year was undoubtedly Billy Bragg, so when Craccum was asked to send someone along to his press conference, Brad jumped at the chance.

It soon became apparent in the press conference that Billy Bragg was not simply a pop star, a fact that those of his followers that actually listen to what he has to say in song, would already know. Billy, during the ninety minute conference, covered a large range of topics through Politics and Music, but what impressed me the most was his knowledge of British Politics. Though he's a strong believer in socialism, he has very strong views on how a socialist state should and should not be achieved. 'Any dogma that makes Ideology more important than People, whether Left or Right, I'm afraid I completely disagree' with.

Billy is part of Red Wedge, a collection of musical performers, which includes the Style Council, Junior and The Communards. Red Wedge are backing the Labour Party in England in a desperate attempt to stop the Thatcher Administration getting in for a third term. His reasons for wanting the Thatcher Government out, include his certainty that under a third term they will completely demolish the welfare state. Yet in that desperation there still remains an incredible sanity in Billy and he thinks extremist action can sometimes do more damage, as with the Brighton Bombing. 'If Margaret Thatcher and the Cabinet had been killed at Brighton.... the best thing that would have happened would have been a state of emergency, ... the army would have had a free hand in Ireland, ... that's the best thing that could have happened...

'I used to hate Smoky Robinson because he used to know so much about my life and it used to really annoy me'.

As for his music well, Billy 'Tries to reflect what he sees around him, and in Great Britain at the moment that's quite a political context', but this also includes human relationships, as can be seen in his love songs. He aims for 'that common touch' remembering how he 'used to hate Smoky Robinson because he used to know so much about my life and it used to really annoy me'.

Bragg himself enjoys Motown music and had a 'religious experience' when he got the chance to visit their studios in Detroit, while touring with The Smiths. Other music he's into includes The Clash, The Jam and Elvis Costello And he doesn't mind sharing the music, in the form of people doing covers of his songs. He finds 'it's always interesting, for two reasons you hope that they are to take the song and change it in some way ... and secondly I made more money out of Kirsty's song (Kirsty McCole's version of New England) than all my songs put together.

And the future? Well Billy wouldn't object to making those pop star millions for his idea of socialism is that everyone should have 'the opportunity of getting two cars and go on their holidays to Miami or Japan or Australia Well, must dash.

In the beginning

The earliest evidence of our plants being used was 6,500 years ago. The Yang-Sao used the plant for fishing implements such as rope. Recordings of the plant have been found from the beginning of man. It was important for fibres which eventually were made into clothes which were worn only by the elite of the classes. Also the seeds were used as a major food source before cereal grains were discovered.

When the 1st medical concepts were being formed it was recorded that if the fruit of the plant was taken in excess it would cause hallucinations (literally seeing devils) it was also recording that if taken over a long term one would be able to communicate with spirits. The root also was used in early medical practices, it was ground into a paste and then used as a pain killer for broken bones and surgery.



Around 100BC the Chinese invented paper made from the fibre of the plant. This paper is known for its durability and its resistance from tearing. Amazingly enough this paper has been used very recently (ie in the last few years and still maybe presently) as money in Canada. Perhaps high quality bibles have been produced from the plant paper.

The British parliaments encouraged the plant product to supply ropes for the British fleet. The American government also encouraged this production of the plant, and eventually imposed penalties on those that didn't grow this plant. By the year 1860 the production of the plant became a mass industry, second only to cotton in the south. The production of the plant was disrupted by the American Civil War, never to return in this capacity. Attempts were made by the United States Dept of Agriculture to cultivate hemp by importing Chinese and Italian seeds. But by the early 1900's production stopped due to Labour and lack of modern machinery for the industry.

In the USA, the illegalisation of the use of the plant eventuated because of who was using it - Mexican labourers and Southern blacks. Politicians and high non-white populations created myths of insanity, violence, lust and crime and also that it lead to harder drugs cocaine and heroine.

Inexperienced politicians and journalists caused the anti-plant hysteria by the next generation. This hysteria has now lead to the private cultivation or illegal production of the plant.

This weeks Classic Car is another English model - it is a Morris 1100. The 'Morri' has always been a favourite amongst students.

This Morri is something special. NTSOPA MOTSAU

Ntsopu perhaps epitomises the struggle of black university students

Ntsopa Motsau is the Southern African Scholar for the 1986/87/88 period, and is studying nursing at Massey University. Previously studying at the University of South Africa in 1981 she could not complete her Nursing degree because of lack of funds, and workload. She was forced to work while studying.

Ntsopa perhaps epitomises the struggle of black university students in South Africa. She was brought up by her grandmother, and later sent to boarding school for secondary education. Unable to make ends meet, she was unable to continue on with her education and had to seek employment.

She later decided to take nursing because it was a skill to help the community and received enough money to help her struggling family.

Ntsopa has worked for 3 years as a district nurse (Clinic Sister) in one of the Bantustan's and was a member of the People's Common Pool of Resources Union in the homeland - Basotho Qwaqua.

In 1981 she was elected president of that Union. As a member of the Black Consciousness Movement of Azania, Ntsopa is a committed follower of the theology of liberation and intends using her Nursing Skills gained in New Zealand in training nurses in the frontline states, Botswana and Zimbabae.



NKUTSOEU MOTSAU

Nkutsoeu, 33, is travelling throughout the country on a 6 week trip to New Zealand. He presently resides in Harare, Zimbabae and is currently the Deputy Secretary for Foreign Affairs for the Central Committee of the Black Consciousness Movement of Azania.

As Deputy Secretary he is chiefly responsible for liaison with foreign government and political organisations. Nkutsoeu has been involved with black political organisations since leaving school in 1971.

In 1972 he became the Organising Secretary for the Sharpville Youth Club and helped with the organisation of the Black People's Convention. He became heavily involved with the Black Consciousness Movement and in October 1973 was arrested and charged under the Suppression of terrorism and Suppression of Communism Acts.


He was found guilty and was imprisoned for 5 years in the same institution as Nelson Mandela, Robin Island. Released in 1979, Nkutsoeu became a banned person, and was restricted from being allowed to speak to more than one

He was also restricted from any political activity and entering any school or

In addition, he was banished for 5 years to a Bantustan homeland near Losotho, Qwa Qwa, where he met Ntsopa.

While still a banned person Nkutsoeu still engaged in political activity and 1983 left in exile to Botswana and later Zimbabae to continue work for the Black Consciousness Movement of Azania.

Nkutsoeu will be staying at Palmerston North with Ntsopa until he leaves for London and the United States to meet other anti-apartheid activists.



THE SCHOLARSHIP

EDUCATION, along with everything else in South Africa, is affected by Apartheid. The basis of the system was created with the Bantu Education Act which was designed to ensure African students had an education inferior to that provided for whites.

Even so, education is a valuable weapon for many black leaders. Steve Biko developed his political outlook while part of the student movement. Again, as with anything else, Apartheid South Africa tries to prevent this by denying an education to politically active blacks.

In response to this, the New Zealand University Students' Association established the Southern Africa Scholarship to provide educational opportunities for students from Southern Africa, who because of their political beliefs or activities are not able to continue their education at a tertiary level.

The Southern Africa Scholarship is a source of funds to enable the recipient to live and study in New Zealand, and all scholars are selected by the Scholarship Trust Board on the basis of their educational standards, but also the Board takes into consideration their active opposition to apartheid which results in their persecution by the South African authorities.

The present Scholarship trustees are Ms Fran Wilde, Member of Parliament for Wellington Central; Professor Whatarangi Winiata, Professor of Accountancy at Victoria University; Rev. John Murry of Wellington; Mr David Morgan from the Federation of Labour; Ms Bidge Smith, the President of the New Zealand University Students' Association (NZUSA) and Ms Sandy Smith, Administrative Secretary of NZUSA.



SEPARATED **BRETHREN**

Dear Sir,

As I was enrolling at Auckland University last week, I was staggered to find no less than 12 different Christian groups on campus. I am transferring from another university where there was nothing like this mess. Perhaps you could make some weird allusion to the 12 tribes of Israel or the 12 apostles, but for the 1st year, Christian student, this must be a bizarre situation. What the blazes do those outside the faith make of it? On the other hand, maybe we've all got too used to the stupidities of christendom to notice.

One can, no doubt advance excuses for the separate existence of each. After all Catholics and Protestants just never do anything together, dear me no. And everyone knows that students from Kenya and Malaysia have one heck of a lot in common. Of course we need an overseas Christian Fellowship.

My experience is though that the Christian community on campus would have been far more enriched by doing far more together, no matter who people were. Sure, one can understand different theological interests and emphases separating us. But I would have thought biblically there was far more to unite us. I thought that was what the bible was on about. Really, I did.

Each group could however, deny the other 11 were christian. Thats got a certain appeal. It's simple, clear and each group stands a good chance of being right.

Nah, maybe it's better to call the others 'separated bretheren' and ignore them. (There's ecclesiastical precedent for this). Simple. Doesn't hurt anyone's feelings. Except maybe the one who bound us together in the 1st place.

For a brief second of ecumenical and pentecostal fervour, I wondered whether they could unite under one name, eg the Federation of Christian Students. (Can anyone think of a more boring name?). I remembered Newbigins words 'What is the proper form of the church's unity? It must first be such that all who are in Christ in any place are, in that place, visibly one fellowship?

However, reality ascended in me. No one really wants unity on the terms God has already set out. We all want to define who we are to be unified with. It's threatening let God have it his own way, we insist on the power of control.

Unity is now more difficult to find than when the Ecumenical Movement began. (oops - 4 letter words in some circles) at least then the agenda was based on the various denominations creeds histories traditions and affirmations. There was something concret and substantial to

Now christian unity depends entirely on the same 'spiritual experience', whether gained through ones understanding of (bits of) the bible, the moving of the spirit, tradition or social perspective. How on earth or heaven can you get any unity out of that? But unless our unity is such that everyone else can say 'how these christians love each other', then we will simply remain 12 or more rather silly irrelevant little groups.

A word for the confused christian. Avoid any group that talks only of a personal relationship with God or only of social action. They're not serious about understanding Jesus. Look for a group

You may be going to a dead dull boring church somewhere. Some times the exciting thing about such churches is that they know that that is exactly what they are. The church can begin when the nauseating triumpholism of much modern christianity is seen for what it is.

I dream that all will unite, possibly around a revamped Tertiary Students Christian Fellowship, as the oldest broadest and largest Christian Student Group (SCM may be older, but it seems to disappear periodically). But the name Evangelical has got to go. No one knows what it means, and grappling with the great Evangelical themes in NZ is about as common as the South Island Kokako. Evangelicalism hasn't been either a NZ or an entirely laudable phenomenon

I dream, but remain anonymous so that when I visit these groups, I won't be the object of fervent prayers for deliverance.
