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
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


BAD TASTE

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Irony abounds in the murky world of international politics. Very few people in New Zealand today would be able to expound on the virtues of apartheid in the South African context, nor be able to justify it morally as a desirable method for the ordering of a given society with any degree of seriousness, that is. It is therefore ironic that the political furor generated over the Zola Budd tour has not been duplicated for the Israeli Soccer team's visit this Sunday 27th of March.

While I'm sure the analogy may well have escaped many, a closer analysis of both countries will shock and astound the most impartial observer. Even the television coverage of the 'unrest' in both countries has increasingly begun to look more and more similar paramilitary units patrolling the streets; mobile units spewing forth tear-gas on stone-throwing youths; armed soldiers firing bullets, sometimes rubber, sometimes not, on unarmed civilians; and the almost daily 'body-count' of Blacks/Palestinians gunned down by the respective 'defense forces'. But the analogy does not stop there. Israel and South Africa have enjoyed close links historically, ideologically, commercially and militarily for many years - the main difference being that Israel has run a much better public relations operation. Israel and South Africa are 'partners in crime' - the crime being Apartheid - which we all oppose, don't we?

Both states share the same apparatus of repression; both have a ruling racially chauvinistic settler elite; both are in the process of subjugating, and where possible, expelling a subject people. South Africa is a state for whites, any

franchise beyond the white one is limited and expedient. In Israel the Israeli Arabs who are voting citizens of Israel are only about one sixth of the Palestinian population and are denied the right to form nationalist parties. In the 'Occupied Territories' the Palestinians have no vote, and they provide a cheap pool of labour similar to the South African Bantustans. Labourers are forced to bus daily into the pre-1967 borders in order to find work. Needless to say, they have no union protection, nor even the right to stay overnight.

The ideology of the two regimes is similar. In South Africa, Old Testament Calvinism is interpreted to select the whites as the chosen and the blacks as the damned. So too in Israel has God assigned the

land for the Jewish migrant - any Jew from any corner of the world is entitled to settle in Israel, above and before any Palestinians who can trace his/her continuous settlement in Palestine back countless of generations. None of the million-plus Palestinian exiles are entitled to return to 'Israel' having being forcefully expelled by Israeli forces.

At a time when both the Palestinian people and the people of South Africa are going through crucial phases of their struggles for freedom, it is important to emphasize the ways in which the two apartheid regimes support each other. The South African use of exile, indefinite arrest without trial, banning, censorship, torture, and collective punishment, are all matched in the Israeli system. Repressive technology, developed

for use against the Palestinian people is used by Pretoria to suppress the African peoples while South African steel provided the armour for the Israeli tanks which rolled into Lebanon in 1982. They have both actively collaborated in a nuclear weapons programme with each other.

At opposite ends of a continent, the two states disrupt regional development through their oppression of and aggression against neighbouring states and indigenous peoples. They need each other in order to do this, and Israel plays a vital role in cushioning South Africa's economic isolation by providing a market for its products which are 'finished' in Israel and reexported to Europe and the US, thereby getting around trade sanctions.

For readers who have got this far, some of this may be news to you... but there is much, much more. While the details differ between the two regimes, the similarities are so marked to justify a category apart from other states where racism exists. Unfortunately we in New Zealand. hoodwinked sophisticated Israeli propaganda, know only half the story in the Apartheid equation. We still have an Israeli embassy, and invite the Israeli soccer team to compete against us. We must organise and protest against the Israeli soccer team as we would against a visiting South African sports team.

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Come and participate in the protest! We owe it to the Palestinian people struggling for self-determination as we owe it to Black South Africans struggling for national liberation. We should oppose apartheid in all its forms.

The Distorting Mirror

For people who want to get at the philosophical roots of religion we reproduce here the well known quote:

"The basis of irreligious criticism is: Man makes religion, religion does not make man. In other words, religion is the selfconsciousness and self-feeling of man who has either not yet found himself or has already lost himself again. But man is no abstract being squatting outside the world. Man is the world of man, the state society. This state, this society, produce religion, a reversed worldconsciousness, because they are a reversed world. Religion is the general theory of that world, its encyclopaedic compendium, its logic in a popular form, its spiritualistic point d'honnneur, its enthusiasm, its moral sanction, its solemn completion, its universal ground for consolation and justification. It is the fantastic realization of the human essence because the human essence has no true reality. The struggle against religion is therefore immediately the fight against the other world, of which religion is the spiritual aroma.

Religious distress is at the same time the expression of real distress and the protest against real distress. Religion is the sigh of the oppressed creature, the heart of a heartless world, just as it is the spirit of a spiritless situation. It is the opium of the people.

The abolition of religion as the illusory happiness of the people is

required for their real happiness. The demand to give up the illusions about its condition is the demand to give up a condition which needs illusions. The criticism of religion is therefore in embryo the criticism of the vale of woe, the halo of which is religion.'





NO WAY OUT Cinema One

The scandal of Irongate and the antics of Oliver North has given Roger Donaldson's No Way Out an ominous, timely significance that has perhaps contributed to it being one of the surprise box office hits in America over the past year. Donaldson has certainly come a long way since the days of Sleeping Dogs and Smash Palace and he actually launched his Hollywood career with Mutiny on the Bounty and Marie but with No Way Out, he has really come to the fore. Donaldson is very much in demand as a director and he now enjoys the privilege of picking and choosing his films. He has since followed up No Way Out with Cocktails, a comedy about barmen in New York starring Tom Cruise and apparently hopes to return home to New Zealand sometime soon to make a

No Way Out's plot is so impossibly convoluted that you can't help but wonder how it can possibly be resolved without losing credibility. Naval Commander Tom Farrell (Kevin Costner) finds himself in the unenviable position of having to frame himself after his secret lover, Susan Atwell, (Sean Young) who is also the mistress of Farrell's employer, the Secretary of Defence, David Brice, (Gene Hackman) is accidently murdered by Brice in a fit of jealous pique. A cover up is then hatched by Brice's fanatical, amoral, insecure aide, Scott Pritchard (Will Potton) to blame her death on her mystery lover, who is conveniently labelled as a fictional

soviet agent. Donaldson does a superb job of drawing all the disparate plot threads together and wisely keeps the film's deeper political implications in check within the basic, thriller structure. And, unlike Lyne in Fatal Attraction, he doesn't resort to heavy handed audience manipulation but instead allows individual details to fall subtly into place so that the truth creeps tantalisingly and unsettlingly up on you especially after the dramatic twist ending which emphasises the fact that things are never quite what they seem. Donaldson also demonstrates his impressive mastery of the medium, No Way Out is attractively and imaginatively shot and Donaldson captures the Washington D.C. backdrop with charity and style, especially striking is the awesome, opening, long tracking shot which begins at the Washington monument and seems to span the whole city. And, Donaldson marshals his starstudded cast admirably, achieving sterling performances from them all but Costner, who first impressed as the dour Eliot Ness in Brian de Palma's lacklustre Untouchables, shines especially. He is witty, charming, suave, vivacious and cunning and his scenes with the sensuous, earthy Young really spark with sexual energy as Donaldson directs them with flare and restraint and not the erotic mannerism that Lyne

It was also pleasing that Donaldson hasn't forgotten New Zealand in his travels. An important, early scene set on a warship during a fierce storm was actually shot in an Auckland quarry and another crucial scene took place at the New Zealand Embassy and featured a Maori haka and if this could be criticised as a patronising gesture perhaps Donaldson is just reflecting the reality of such civic occasions. Let's keep our fingers crossed for the homemade kiwi

TAMPOPO

Where else, but in this film, does the simple practice of eating noodles become an art and lifeconsuming preoccupation? Where else does the creation of such noodles become an obsession of generations, the perfection of which is a momentous, aweinspiring and noble occasion of tear-jerking proportions, performed to the music of the great classics?

Such is Tampopo, one of the new wave of films by young Japanese directors, which satirises the lifestyle by which man lives to eat. There is hardly a scene where food is not present and expressing its central importance in the characters' lives.

Food and eroticism are closely entwined. One particularly bizarre couple make love with honey and cream among other edible substances and even manage to bring orgasm to an egg yolk. On a more subtle note, Tampopo, the restaurant owner, and her hero Goro, express their affection for each other in terms of food. In a passionate outburst, Tampopo professes words to the tune of 'Ever since I've known you, all I want to do is create perfect noodles!'

The young man of the aforementioned bizarre couple, in his dying words, tells longingly the recipe for yam sausages made from the intestines of wild boar. Tearfully his beloved weeps how much she would hvae loved to share them with him. Well, what can I say?

This is a comedy, and the humour is very accessible to a Western audience. Apart from the great delight the Japanese seem to take in observing people gobble and slurp their food, the humour is modern and alternative. It shows traces of the new humour of the British 'Young Ones' type comedy in its bizarre nature and unexpectedness.

Amid the plot are inserted small incidents that are totally unrelated to the characters or the story. Contrary to the spectators' expectations of these tying up somewhere along the line, these remain one-off skits.

The writer and director, Juzo Itami, has obviously made a thorough study of the devices and cliches of western film. Based in the form of a classic American Western, the story is taken off the ranch and put in the context of a Japanese noodle restaurant. The director hasn't forgotten to omit the Western film devices of sex and violence, but both only in small

doses, thank goodness.

This is worthwhile entertainment, and like the rest of the choices at Charley Grays', not the type that rubs off as soon as you leave the cinema.

Having the word combination or hook that needles that recognition nerve is a form of clever social acupuncture. Essentially its the Coke or Disney corporations that trade in this.

Also Comics! Also Culture!

Imagine the reverse. An individual; just an individual, who has the same calculated blatency and cannonball excellence, but who's operation is, incredibly, like the deprogrammer of Moonies. She engineers slogan and image like a monumental zen excercise to awaken!, not con or suck in or hypnotise. The power of suggestion is paramount in advertising. And the nature of her work is iconoclasm.

The ethic of Barbara Kruger's work is anti-commerce. Her individual 'statements' or pieces can be taken on their own, but in adding them up, there is a penetrating thrust of intellect over indoctrination; iconoclasm over propaganda. Naturally, her work can be considered propaganda itself.

In person, she is a female analog of the Liverpool bard, John Cooper Clark. Her wealth of woollen, petrified hair frames a face of white reptile certainty. She is an astounding gorgon. Dressed in black, she is as stark and monochromatic as the bleakest of her pieces. Like Cooper Clark, she is high contrast black and white. She is exactly the archetype of an intellectual you would imagine, putting together the material she does. No, she is not to be called within earshot an artist. That's not how she sees herself at all.

I first encountered Kruger when Julienne Molineaux brought home about 20 quality A3 photocopies of her 80's material. Everyone wanted copies but no one could identify her. Having no respect and less caution when it comes to copyright, I ran a 4 bar grid on one page of Kruger in Razor No. 5, because, for Pete's sake, I want people's art, (for lack of a better term), to be seen and circulated and preserved. When I presented Bar bara with a copy, she told me 'l'd have a cheek to sue with what I do', and was delighted to see her pieces manifested in yet another format of media and communication: a com ic book - no, make that an obscure comic book in a foreign country.

(Some might see Laurie Anderson as a closer analog to Barbara Kruger, as opposed to John Cooper Clark, as she is an American metaphysician of language and language politics; and a woman. You may be right.)

The scale of Kruger's work varies considerably. The smallest is matchboxes, where she is 'spared' having her name attached. The largest is something like 17ft by 15ft. The most common large, outside presentation is billboards. She has a fondness for the idea of driving. reading, passing by. It is a delicious contact. Her billboards can be right next to the boards for Xerox machines and popular novels and movies. ('I think it is totally outrageous to many theorists or even artists working outside a dense market setup for someone to be both in and about consumption, to function critically within the



marketplace.') So where hasn't her work appeared? Julienne is keen on getting slides to Charley Gray. She is simultaneously preserved in galleries and part of the infamous New York poster wars. Her work is transmitted as commonly as radio waves thanks to the technology of the photocopy and the enthusiasm of all who are penetrated by her captions and images.

Dianne Arbus and Pattie Smith are large influences on her. Barbara does not like taking photos herself. Studying under Dianne Arbus for one year taught her how little she admired the essentials of Arbus' approach. Dianne Arbus's photography captures people in a light of barren and austere discomfort. All life seems filthy with an invisible plague. If there is glamour, then Arbus promotes the antiglamour of things.

'There is a cruel, exploitive quality to her work, and I learnt from this that I hated to point the camera at other people. It's a severe abuse of the power relation'.

On the word side of things, Kruger wrote and read poetry. At her first ever reading, mistress of ceremonies was rock singer and crow poet, Pattie Smith, someone who's power of word and form had been strongly impressive already.

Before and during her fame, Kruger teaches and writes television and film criticism. She has no qualms whatsoever about the nature of her work as a commodity. She openly expresses contempt of the world of Galleries and their inflation of price and illusion of fixed value. But her success in that area allows her the ability to help wrap her work around the world. And it secures her income. She isn't going to apologise. Why should she?

Everyone who I show Barbara Kruger to have to say 'how I can't look at that' or 'isn't that appropriate?'. They are touchstones. Some touchstones have a number of possible levels of communication and interpretation. 'We Are the Objects of Your Suave Entrapments' is what she calls gender specific - if the lips of the face behind the netting depicted belongs to a woman. (I dare say they do.)

In the address of her slogans, 'You' and 'We' are common. Like any ad going for the short and curlies, you are the specified; you.

There is the 'feminist' aspect of her which she doesn't subscribe to, preferring to see matters more individually, with what she calls 'feminisms'. She breaks the unification of all words down to far more manageable points of view. It's in her style of thinking and philosophy. It's in her achievements.

Red is the colour that often frames the black and white prints. There is the use of full colour in some as well. All slogans are worked out after the construction of the image. (The exception there is with 'Your Manias Become Science', possibly her most 'obvious'/least layered and subtle piece, where all she needed was a good picture of an atomic explosion. Well, there's a few of those to choose from.)

Barbara began her career as a graphic designer on Mademoiselle. Mademoiselle centred her in the steeps of the seductions of the advertising industry. There couldn't have been better 'grooming'. What she does comes from the inside out. She has the power to '... Make my work very apparent, very obvious in terms of its overtures to the spectator. I'm not trying to get away with anything.'

That's for certain.

BEATING THE BURSARY BLUES

Buying secondhand clothing is a practical means to stretching a meagre bursary. Rummaging in op shops or 6am starts at the fleamarket are no longer necessary. Auckland abounds with 'recycled clothing' stores. These establishments are becoming ever more sophisticated. With prices and styles to meet all tastes and budgets. An excellent wardrobe can be purchased for a fraction of the new cost.

Second hand clothing stores can be divided into two general categories. Pre 1970 (vintage) styles, and recycle boutiques specialising in more recent designs.

Selecting vintage clothing helps to develop your own individual style and beats the designers at their own game. So-called designer clothing is often little more than a copy of 1950s and 1960s classic styles. It seems more astue to buy the original than a copy or a fake. Especially at one tenth of the price! Quality gives vintage clothing its edge. Clothing of past eras was made to last.

Undoubtedly the best of the vintage clothing establishments is KAOS (ex No Go Zone) in Karangapahe Rd. Hidden underground beneath Warnocks it has to be the bastion of Auckland's street-wise styles. It is a politically sound place and there is little chance of discovering snakeskin, lizardskin, or other unmentionable nasties. You certainly won't be left out of pocket. The clothing prices are among the most realistic in Auckland. Opening hours are fairly civilised so don't arrive before 10am or on a Saturday. Perhaps best included in a relaxed Thursday night shopping expedition.

TWO TIMING in the Canterbury Arcade has been a long time favourite of stylish, well heeled students. The gear is a little more flashy, but if you can afford the price tag, some excellent day and evening wear can be bought. Guaranteed to impress your friends. On the pricier end of the vintage clothing market, however still considerably more reasonable than buying new.

Others include:- The Way We Wore, cnr Albert St and Kingston St; Tatters, High St end of Eadys Mall; De Ritz, upstairs above number 10 Vulcan Lane. Gents, Upper Symonds St; Leather Forever at Hunters and Collecters, Upper Symonds St (especially for second hand leather items); Victorian Guild, Ponsonby Rd - Karangahape Rd end, (expensive); Salvation Army 'Finds', Victoria St West; Salvation Army, Dominion Rd Mt Roskill - near the corner of Mt Albert Rd

A number of 'recycle boutiques'; exist for those who prefer the most recent trends. Each shop with its own mix of styles, labels and prices. These establishments will also sell your clean, pressed and stylish clothing on a commission basis.

Perhaps the largest is 'ENCORE - THE RECYCLE BOUTIQUE'. It has two locations, in Lorne and Darby Sts. There is a wide range of fast moving stock. Including designer labels, children's wear and men's wear. It is often possible to pick up this years styles for less than half the new cost. Prices range from \$5.50 upward with many good bargains to be had.

The 'Great Mistake' in Eadys Mall is a little down-market, but well worth a visit. A Good budget wardrobe can be had with a little time and imagination. They have a good range of shoes, but no men's clothing.

Others include:- Elegant Errors, Bledisloe St-behind the Civic Theatre, (excellent); Second Time Round, underground in 'The Corner', (also excellent); Deja Vu, St Kevins Arcade Karangahape Rd; The Budget Shop, Upper Symonds Street; Second Chance Boutique, Canterbury Arcade; Encore, Three Lamps Plaza Ponsonby Rd. Encore, Halls Corner Arcade Takapuna; Second Glances, 467 Lake Rd, Takapuna; Second Thoughts, Olivers Arcade Osborne St, Newmarket; Grand Rags, 960 Mt Albert Rd, Mt Albert. Gails, Sandringham shops, Sandringham Rd.

Half a day's investigation will convince many of the joys and the expediency of buying second hand. One small path to beating the bursary blues.

As for the 'Best out of student' ad, SRC directed me to voice our disapproval which I did in no uncertain terms but \$50,000 for a new ad convinced the others to stick with it.

I went to Senate and Council last week, pretty dull stuff - I've been given 'the justification behind the costs (\$3,000) of the MBA course.' That will be in next week's Craccum.

We are currently running a campaign regarding the creche. The University is in favour of this well-patronized facility but would rather we met the full costs. So far they have yet to produce the exact figures and I am getting the impression that the powers-that-be are pissing us around. This is being highlighted.

On the lighter side, TTN had a practice pub crawl last week. A number of students participated especially at the Kiwi where a salute took place. ('tis a pity I never acquired a piece of that carpet which I got to know so well).

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ROY BUCHANAN

Town Hall March 13

Roy Buchanan, the name lit up the entrance to the Auckland Town Hall. Pleasant tension was apparent everywhere as I filed through the main doors of Auckland's architectural tribute to Italian Reformation Opera houses. Leather jackets abounded along with the familiar sweet odour of an ever present gentle narcotic which filled one and all's nostrils with an air of delightful expectation. The stars were out tonight, regardless of the drizzle. Sonny Day staggered into the gents and wasn't seen for some time. Graham Brazier mooched around in the background whilst Colin Hogg sniffed the air, tilted his head back and proceeded to spend the rest of the evening looking down his nose at all and sundry.

Old hippies and hard rockers made up the bulk of the hardcore Buchanan following present this evening. Buchanan's ability was being hotly debated in the lobby by a group of staunch Yardbird fans. Would 'he' still have the 'old magic', could he still walk on water, can the Master of the Telecaster still provide a blast from the past. When the lights dimmed so did the conjecture. God was about to appear on stage and the noise had begun to

climb.

On strode the man who has turned down lead guitar positions with Eric Clapton and the Rolling Stones. Ironically the Stones replacement for the deceased Brian Jones was Mick Taylor, a very talented young guitarist who idealised Buchanan and his sound, along with a good many others. During the early sixties several unknown guitarists (at the time of

course) such as Clapton, Beck, Robertson (who actually learnt from Buchanan first hand), Dave Edmunds, Page, Frampton, Mick Taylor, Billy Gibbons and yes, even Hendrix all collected bootleg and/or demo tapes of the great man. Buchanan's single-minded intent to create an individual style and distinctive sound endeared him particularly to those who knew what he was doing and how difficult it was. His influence, though largely impossible to pin down individually, has permeated through R & B, Blues, Rock, Hard Rock and even country music as far as electric guitar playing is concerned.

He is internationally accepted as being on a similar place to such quality quitarists as John McClaughlin, Jimi Hendrix and Al Di Meola, innovator, teacher, self-proclaimed perpetual pupil and also a master in his own right, Buchanan proved himself all of these things and more to a truly appreciative crowd. Not even a general evacuation halfway through the concert could halt the maestro from his course. Apparently unperturbed by the unexpected interruptance. Roy fired up the crowd with a raunchy cover of Honky Tonk Blues, laid them low with a tribute to Jimi Hendrix (Hey Joe) that blasted everybody's socks off, and then really set the joint on fire with a rip-roaring version of the great Rand B favourite Green Onions. The last song of the set was however the best. One of the few originals he played this special evening, Roy's Bluz was a spiritually moving experience. The 'old magic' was most definitely there as his telecaster screamed, wailed, sighed and cried, roared and whispered much to the adoration and appreciation of a madding crowd.

Forgotten were the strained squeaks of the bass guitarist who tried to imitate Robert Plant on the 'Stairway' cover. Forgotten was the mid-set evacuation. Everybody present went home satisfied they had been in the presence of genius for two hours of unequalled rock guitar bliss. If you have yet to encounter Roy Buchanan then I suggest you begin by purchasing his greatest hits album (featuring his telecaster floating over water on the cover). This has a good variety of Roy's past history. If you like good quality electric steel string guitar playing, it's an absolute must.

MURRAY KHOURI

Music Theatre March 16

Murray Khouri is a performer of whom I have read many favourable reports, but have also heard many bad comments from acquaintances who have met and worked with him professionally. Because of this I made a definite attempt to attend this recital with as open a mind as possible, and entertaining no preconceived notions. This proved to be a waste of time, as it took only 5 minutes to confirm his ineptitude (in my humble estimation).

One reason that I was moved to attend this recital was the choice of repertoire. None of the pieces played were familiar to me (I had heard the Stanford Sonata some time ago on the radio), and it was refreshing to see a programme of clarinet music that did not contain

one of the famous works by Brahms or Weber. The Burgmueller (Duo for Piano and Clarinet) admittedly was not instantly memorable - neither was it a masterwork. However it is deserving of performance. The Romantic period was laden with composers writing heaps of semiquaver arpeggios (don't waste your time listening to the concerto by the 19C Hume), a composer much inferior to his musical family of the Baroque) and this piece did come close to being shallow. However it contained enough charm (and tempered 'technical bombast') to be entertaining.

The Stanford Sonata for Piano and Clarinet should be a master-work! Cleverly tailored with English charm (buzzword) intensity and pastorality (or pastoralness?). It was enjoyable from start to finish, sometimes challenging.

Mr Horowitz certainly did himself proud, his Sonatina (composed in 1981) must stand out above the mushy drivel that I have previously heard (admittedly I have not heard very much of his composing). Filled with rhythmic and harmonic interest this Sonatina was instantly

listenable from the opening movement and its melodic wisdom, to the jazzy, syncopated last movement

It was a pity that the programme was not more challenging to listen to, however this was probably a godsend as the clarinet playing certainly was!

Now let's get technical. Wide untidy phrasing and slurring, messy articulation, messy fingerwork, poor tonal and dynamic control and rather unhealthy tuning (although everyone is guilty of this sometimes). I won't complain about his tone except to say that it was very English and I hate the English sound, you might like it done well - but this was less than mediocre.

I wanted to say that it was a pity how few students attended, but instead will say thank goodness! If I had paid to hear that I would have been mostified!

All right, so I am biased against a certain style of playing - but what's so wrong with being biased against scrappy, uncontrolled, inconsistent playing?

At least Acker Bilk is consistently tasteless and awful!



a 24 Hour Cafe.....

At 11pm Customs Street is largely deserted and quiet.

There are only two customers in the Queen City Cafe when Jim and Sam start their nine hour shift. The Cafe is the only basic hamburger-and-chips type place open 24 hours in Auckland. The food is the usual array of burgers and fried food, along with some meals (eggs-and-chips, steak-and-chips etc). Nothing special, maybe, but late at night the customers are as varied a cross-section of Aucklanders as you're likely to meet anywhere.

Sam has been working here for only a week. She says she likes it 'cause she doesn't sleep much at nights, and likes shopping during the day.

Jim likes the challenge of shift work and dealing with strange people. He's been here for a year after finishing trade training in the shoemaking business. He wanted to see the other side of Auckland. His most bizarre story is of the time four men in suits came in, two with briefcases and the other two the two biggest guys he has ever seen. The upstairs seating area was closed off but the two with bags went up anyway, while the gorillas kept watch and told Jim that if he went up there they 'wouldn't be responsible for what happened' to him. He still doesn't know what went on that night.

Tonight, however, the customers are much less astounding.

Bob and Jerry, for example. A couple of business types who are on a seminar at the Kingsgate Centre. They've come in to the only place open for a cup of coffee.

At 11.20, Teresa and Barry come in. Barry's just finished at the chess club, and McDonald's is closed. The 'only place open' syndrome seems to be quite common. Ten minutes later, Alan enters and orders. He says he's a black belt at Lee Shau Lung Kung Fu, and has had a 'hard day' training at his instructor's place in Ponsonby. He's not very convincing, even with his shaven head.

Wendy and Peter are more believable. Wendy is an MoT trainee, and has just finished her shift. They're off to Dunedin after they've finished their munchies. Antonio comes in at this time too. He's bleary-eyed and tells me he's off to Wellington soon to work on the buses. Tonight he's filling in time since he's not tired. He wanders about a lot at night. Like James, who lives up the road but is bored at home so he goes for walks about once a week.

James points out how different the centre of town is at night. That's what he likes. He's right. Outside a few drunks shamble along to the taxis. Other than them the only movement is the rubbish blowing along the street.

At 11.53 Antonio makes his second visit. Just after midnight loud music enters, followed closely by Cage and James. They say they've been wandering down this way doing a few jobs, i.e. car burglaries. They may even be telling the truth. Just behind them is a loud Australian, Bill. Alias Video Bill, so he says. He's over here making videos on the skifields. He says the White Lady is a rip-off, so he comes here

The milkman arrives at 12.20am, and the ARA guys go past, cleaning the streets in their fluorescent overalls. Two cops are talking to a guy outside. Jim says it's the boyfriend of one of the staff.

Soon after a young family, Jan and Ricky Chiu and their daughters Nachi and Nawai, pop in before heading home. Ricky's just finished work, and they often come in here.

12:44 and some staff at the Park Royal, the posh hotel across the road, call up for their regular order.

12:51 and Antonio returns.

Clive and Daryll arrive at 1.00. Their housebus is parked around the corner, and they've just had a 'mellow evening' at the beach. Bryan isn't quite so mellow. He's a Masters student whose various business enterprises (???) have lately not been going so well...

1:24, Antonio again.

Close behind him is Madeleine, carrying half a dead bamboo plant and a plastic container with whells and a tabacco packet in it. She has a crazy air about her. She gets a drink of water and tells me she's 'working with the police' but that she 'can't talk about it any more'. I wonder what's in her 'tobacco' pouch...

At 1: 40 the ARA cleaners come in, as they do every night, their trucks converging on the cafe from all directions.


At 2:15 the first of the day's deliveries, croissant and french bread, is delivered.

REFERENDUM RUNDOWN

On Tuesday 29th and Wednesday 30th of March, there will be a referendum held where every student will have the chance to vote on the following issues:



REFERENDUM 1: That AUSA tenants pay 80% of the market value for accommodation with annual adjustments to this figure.

REFERENDUM 2: That AUSA give notice of withdrawal from NZSAC (New Zealand Students' Arts Council).

TENANT'S VIEW

1. We as tenants recognise that an annual rent increase is required in times of constant inflation. However what we dispute with the Executive is the amount of that increase and the manner in which it is to be determined.

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It has been proposed that the rentals on student properties be directly indexed to the assessed market rental of these properties. This position ignores the distinction between the so-called rental housing market and the student sector of that market. The primary consideration of students seeking accommodation is cost - they seek housing in the cheaper end of the market, which is not necessarily suitable to anybody else but students. With bedrooms measuring approx. 3.5 M x 2.0 M and a small open plan living area in relation to the number of people living in the flat, the Collingwood Street flats are not normally marketable in the overall accommodation market. They were designed as student flats and should be leased accordingly.

2. A market indexed system for determining rental values would ultimately result in the Collingwood Street flats becoming too expensive for students to live in, not because the flats themselves are desirable places to live in but because the land on which they are built is in a desirable area to live.

3. Rents should be equated to student income levels so that the financial status of students is not further jeopardised. Any excessive rental will only be detrimental to the welfare of the student tenants. Many of the students who have only just recently moved into the flats have budgeted for only a limited rent increase. Their continued stay at the flats will be determined by the level of rent increase to be imposed.

4. An overall philosophical stance on student accommodation is required from the AUSA so a comprehensive strategy can be prepared for dealing with these and other related issues. Such a stance will allow for a more co-ordinated approach to this important area of student welfare. We feel that the AUSA should play a dominant role in the provision of student housing and pursue it with renewed vigour. Student housing is very much a vital part of student welfare and exists a strong case to preserve and protect it.

EXEC VIEW

Current policy is that AUSA tenants pay 80% of market rental, subject to a ceiling of 1/10th above the accommodation grant per room. This policy was decided by referendom in March 1986. At the time, 80% of market rental was below the ceiling, and so the limit had no effect. At the time, the government was giving an undertaking that the accommodation grant would move in line with rental increases.

In 1987 there was no increase in the grant, and the ceiling limited rentals on properties administered by AUSA to \$41 per room. This was an average of \$7.58 below 80% of the market rate (assessed by annual valuation), and resulted in a loss of \$24,206 to your Students Association, through the government's miserly attitude. All through the year, it was expected that the grant would be increased. Meanwhile AUSA tenants were paying \$41, whereas the average student was paying \$70.

It is now 1988, and these tenants are still paying \$41, while we are still waiting for an increase in the accommodation grant. Quite simply, the circumstances under which the previous policy was passed have changed, but we are still bound by our policy to maintain the rental levels as they were last year which were already artificially low.

The tenants have come to AUSA and have said they would accept an increase in rents. We cannot even increase the rents by 10c under our policy, as the votes of students is binding on your association. So vote for this motion, to bring our rentals back into line with reality. Any increase would not be able to take effect until June 1st at the earliest. If policy is not changed now, and the accommodation grant is not increased then we will be operating the houses at a loss next year.

It is estimated that the average rental is likely to increase by about \$15 per week per tenant, taking rentals up to about \$55 if this policy is carried. Compare that with how much you are paying. This motion still gives AUSA tenants the privilege of paying 80% of the market value - they should not have the extra privilege of a ceiling that has become outdated.

Currently your student associations are working for a \$10 increase in the accommodation grant. Even if this increase is gained, we would still have a ceiling that would reduce the rentals of this small group of students by \$12,000, and next year the same problem we face now would return. Unless you believe that you can rely on the promises of this government, and the

WHY AUSA SHOULD PULL OUT....

1. Auckland is the largest entertainment centre in N.Z. There is little NZSAC can do that our social activities organiser can not. Even alternative acts come through Auckland, political or otherwise so the opportunity still exists.

2. We have an S.A.O., and C.A.O. NZSAC is an additional expense to the tune of \$14,000. Do we need this on top of the \$22,000 budgeted for the other two.

3. If we worked better with our local arts councils we would be much more cost efficient without 'artistic' detriment. If we withdraw it would be for the sake of art in the Auckland area. Auckland money for Auckland students! What do we owe to other campuses? Should we finance acts at Taupo Polytech!

4. In the past, NZSAC has been a refuge for either trendy arts nonstudent types, special friends of the band scene or old political hacks with no where to go! Such organisations are top heavy with (usually) self interested people. Some of these administrators pay some of their acts all too well surely not!

5. The NZ scene is too large for the student constituent arena. Acts aren't really that interested in small income events.

6. Canterbury University pulled out in May 1986. There has been no lowering of standards just a lowering of costs!

7. Let's pull out - NOTE: this is not effective until next year but it will scare them into cutting away all their dead wood. Let's be cost-efficient.

WHY AUSA SHOULDN'T PULL OUT....

NZSAC is basically a coordinating body and communication catalyst between campuses, with its prime objective being to make arts events happen for students.

As is the case with all good arts organisers, the huge amount of administration they do is invisible to the masses, who only see the final product, ie: 'The Show'. We don't realise everything that has to go before it, which is a lot of planning, negotiating and problem-solving. Student Arts Council's regular functions are basically these:

- Co-ordinating Orientation tours for bands and theatre groups.

Capping tours

- Touring art exhibitions throughout the year

Sharing file information on artists Running workshops to teach campus organisers how to do

their work (and there is a lot to it) Running workshops/seminars for the student radio stations and

newspapers Arranging for discounts on travel for artists (making their costs to

us cheaper) One-off surprise tours (including

lunchtime shows)

An example of one recent benefit to us from NZSAC was the recent tour of Frank Chickens where all the Orientation concerts were much cheaper than any of their public shows, as is the case with all touring bands. Recently some campus arts organisers from Australia were in Auckland, who commented that they had no co-ordinating body, and how much they need one.

The idea of AUSA pulling out of NZSAC does not surprise me, as most people don't understand the great value of such an organisation; not to mention undervaluing the arts generally. But arts events can give you some of the best times of your life (it's true isn't it?)

So it's less than the price of caf chips for a really worthwhile thing, particularly now that we have an exceptionally efficient and motivated NZSAC director.

Another important point to remember is that if Auckland pulls out of the Arts Council it will mean that it won't have the funds to continue at all; so all the other campuses will miss out and so will the arts in Aotearoa as a consequence. And that would be really sad.






