
Apart from all the rest of the wild exciting stuff in Craccum this week, there's also several sheep wandering around aimlessly after they crawled out from under the fence.

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YOU WILL NEED...
A bottle of wombat Pheromones.
Two wombats who love each other very much.
45 kilos of agar mixture (PDA will do).
A linear particle accelerator.
A industrial sized tin of Swarfega.

First of all, get all the things together you need as listed above, and put them in the room you intend to grow your wombats in. A simply decorated bedroom with a window that catches the sun is preferable. Take the two wombats you have purchased (who, don't forget, must love each other very much) and place them in the room together with a bottle of Moet in an ice bucket and two champagne flutes (serving this on a silver tray and perhaps adding a rose in a tall vase is a pleasant and recommended touch), closing the door quietly behind you and leave them alone for at least four hours. 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MORE SUD'S ON BREWING.

This week Lance Suds continues the series on home brewing covering some of the ingredients needed in the brewing process and the best places to get them from. This week Lance Suds continues the series on home brewing dealing covering the ingredients needed in the brewing process and the best places to get them from.

Putting aside brewing from Kits, I'll cover the ingredients needed to brew from scratch for mid range ales. The costings provided are for amounts that cover the recipe that will be provided in the next installment of this series.

Yeast.

Yeast is the most important ingredient. The particular Yeast Strain that is used for brewing is Saccharomyces cerevisiae. There are various strains of this yeast which produce varying results. Some strains are top fermenting, others are bottom-fermenting. Bottom-fermenting yeasts are more preferable as they can handle lower temperatures and most produce a reasonably firm sediment. Yeast is available in various forms though Granulated is the most common.

Top Fermenting Yeast also requires the skimming off of foam that accumulates on the surface of the wort otherwise bad tastes can spoil the brew.

It is possible to re-use yeast by keeping some dregs from your fermentation vessel or sediment from one or two bottles. And in fact it is possible to grow a yeast culture from any commercial brew in the same manner. This I will cover in a later installment. COST: approx \$ 1.50

Hops.

Hops are the flowers of the hop plant. Hops are added to give the beer it's bitterness and hence the more you put in the more bitter your beer will be. There are several

different varieties of hops available, most of which are grown in Nelson. I use the Wakatu, though I suggest you experiment to find your preference.

COST: approx \$5.50 for 450gms, i.e. about 74 cents per 25lt batch

Malt

Malt gives the beer its body, flavour and strength. The easiest forma nd most common is liquid Malt Extract. This can be got from any supermarket. There are special prepared brewers malts which can be obtained from brewers supplies, though I think the common malt is more than O.K. There is another type of malt that, is Grain Malt. Which is available barley converted by the malting process.

COST: approx \$10 for 3.25 kg i.e. about \$3/25lt batch.

Sugar

Simple, just use household white sugar.

COST: approx \$1.85 for 1.5 kg

Other Consumables Sterilizer

There are various types of sterilizer available, the main one being Sodium Metabisulphate. Sterilizer is used to clean all equipment and bottles.

cost; approx \$2

Bottle Tops.

Well what do I need to say? COST: approx 90 cents for 30 (amount for 25 lt)

An Average American Illusion

Is the great American dream a reality? According to the Federal Reserve Bank survey of 1983 the average American family had \$24,000 in financial assets. But is

this the whole picture? Well not quite.

Column 7 (Ak Star 28.1.88) reports that the term 'average' in this case is grossly misleading. 'Average' becomes very distorted when most of the wealth is heavily concentrated in a small percentage of the population.

It turns out that the median wealth is just \$2,300 of assets, and that more than a fourth of all families had financial assets of less than \$1000.



Just how few hold all the wealth in America is staggering:

'86% of America's financial worth was held by 10% of the families. The remaining 14% of the nation's financial assets was held by 35% of the families. 55% of American families had nothing. The top 2 of the families owned 30% of all liquid assets everything from all chequeing and savings accounts to money market funds and bank cer-

tificates of deposits.' (Ak Star 28.1.88)

Save the Wails



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PLAN B

A is for archaic, B is for B-card.

BFM has recently updated its managment/financial organisation, and the B-card is the part of this scheme that the public can be involved in. Listeners can pay \$26 (\$20 for students and unemployed) which entitles them to special benefits in return for their support. B-card holders receive discounts at various shops, pubs and movie theatres, as well as free entry to Campus Radio events and the chance to win on-air giveaways.

Domanik Nola, the programme director, says that she is pleased with the sales of the card, which have now reached around 500 (including 350 students). The sales began in a burst during enrolment/orientation, and, although they have since slowed, are still at a steady level of 10-20 daily. About 30-40 businesses now offer deals to B-card holders.

The restructuring, however, goes much further than the 'subscriber radio' concept. It's aim is to bring the administration up to the level of development that the technical side of the station has achieved, according to station manager Judy Anaru, 'Being part of the university students association and the university itself means that you're part of a fairly transient organisation, and what we were trying to do was to set up a consistency and a support group for the staff' she said.

The re-organisation does not alter the objectives of the station. The stated aim of BFM is 'to provide student oriented alternative radio programmes for Auckland's radio audience. That's basically why we exist,' and this aim is stated in the memorandum of association of the company. Providing good training for students, particularly to ensure that 'groups who traditionally don't have access to radio such as, unfortunately, women and ethnic groups, do', is another important part of BFM's work.

The restructuring means that 'our objectives' have been carved into stone by the way of putting them into all the legal documents'.

The new structure meant setting up a new company, Campus Radio BFM Limited, and a trust, Campus Radio BFM Trust, to take over the functions of the old Campus Radio Management Committee. The committee was not functioning well last year, as it depended on 'people who, being exec members, have so many other things on their plate they could not afford to specialise or give the station all the attention it deserves'. The station needed such attention and so the new organisation was set up after 10 months of discussion and consultation.



The company's Board of Directors is responsible for overseeing the day-to-day running of the station, and specific student interests are represented on the board by Richard Foster and Graham Hackshaw, as well as Helen Foers who handles the admin side of AUSA and the company. The Trust is responsible for holding the stations assets (equipment, etc) on trust, and provide a range of talents to 'retain knowledge of the stations past and be able to use that base to help the station look forward and to assist the incoming staff ... with knowledge of how the station fits into the whole environment.'

The future course of BFM is uncertain owing to the fact that the entire 'environment' in which it operates is under scrutiny by the Minister of Broadcasting, Richard Prebble. The station also faces constraints of money, space, and time (full-time staff receive less than the dole). But Campus Radio has a long history of 18 years (compared with, for example, Hauraki's 21), and the new organisation may give it the footing it needs to face the challenge.


Organiser Chris Cooper said he was very pleased with the way the weekend went, with over 3500 people attending over the two days, fifty percent up on last years' figures. There was also a forty percent increase in the number of exhibitors. Some lectures were so popular that the theatre was filled to capacity and people had to be turned away.

The annual event aims to provide a focus for the alternative healing arts. There is no other event of this type in New Zealand, although the practice of 'alternative' medicines is widespread, Mr Cooper said it was this situation that led him to organise the first such gathering last year.

The wide array of alternativecum-orthodox-cum-everything displays included such things as Vitafit Megavitamin Laboratories (N.Z.) Ltd, the HPB Lodge of the Theosophical Society, Sun Energy Communications, Re-Balancing Sagarperm, and the Spiritual Venturers Education Trust. Less exoticsounding groups represented included the Home Birth Association, Greenpeace, the N.Z. Homeopathic Society, the Vegetarian Society, Lite Licks, and Adjustable Massage Tables.



'SHOCKING' CURE FOR ADDICTION

'Well, let's see - what name am I using this week? My name is Riley Hansard Crabb, MsD...

We are talking about today one of the front areas in therapy and that is the use of the weak electro-magnetic signals, to stimulate new growth cells of the body and so on, elimination of the old. There's really nothing new about it. Therapists back in the nine-teenth century began to get into the use of weak electric currents.

The story as far as we're concerned - electronic medicine - if you want to call it that, back in the 1960's began to explore the area of what are called ELF waves, not alpha, ELF lextremely low frequency) from zero to a hundred hertz or cycles per second, and another name for it is neuro electronics using a neurotransmitter in the brain to carry the signals...

It began pretty well in the 70's in Hong Kong. Doctor Alex When, a Chinese acupuncturist, was on the staff there of the Hong Kong Hospital that was run by Doctor Meg Patterson, a brilliant Scotch woman doctor... of course, if she's running a free clinic type of place. But (Dr) When stumbled into the cure for addiction by accident. Thirty percent of the people in Hong Kong are on heroin, and there a few years ago, heroin was cheaper than a packet of cigarettesd. And of course people were coming into the clinic for treatment and (Dr) When didn't know which were addicts and which were not. But when they came back and said, 'What have you done to me, Doctor? I don't need a fix any more!', that's when he pricked up his ears. Drug addicts were finding there were no withdrawal symptoms. This is amazing - it's a miracle - in three days some would be cured, some in say, three treatments. Fifteen minutes, twenty and thirty minutes, others took as long as ten days. He mentioned this to Dr Meg Patterson and so she set up a research programme and this clinical experimentation went on for years. This is no fluke, this is no quackery - (Dr) When has published twelve papers on this Dr When was using the number fifty

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
acupuncture point in the ear for treating people. Orientals don't mind it at all, interestingly enough. Even the addicts who had been shooting up still didn't like to have the needles put into them for acupuncture. So they finally decided on just a simple contact of the two acupuncture points right under each of the hollow, and a simple electrode so this shandy skin over metal electrode ... soak it in salt water, squeeze the salt water out... you want a good strong contact, and just turn it on, that's the only control there is., Just run the volume, that's all... until you feel the tingle of the signal. This is powered by a nine volt battery so it isn't possible to get much of a shock." (Sound of the brain-tuner: a high pitched motor. Riley turns it on... tuned to a static if there ever existed one sound that was a pure hit of high and constant vibrated humming wahhhhhhhhhhhhhhhhl) 'That's close to the cure for heroin, turn it up high and feel a shock myself. So the rates discovered there about 110 or 111 for heroin, seventy cycles per second or seventy hertz for alcohol, nicotine down around four hertz. How did Dr When discover these rates? His acupuncture equipment had a variable rates dial on it and when he had an addict he would hook him up and then say, just keep turning the dial till you feel comfortable with the rate that is coming in. He established the rate over hundreds of trials. It was the addicts that set the rates. And so then his equipment was set so that he had maybe a rotary switch and set it on four hertz if nicotine was your problem, and treat yourself with that rate. My own personal opinion is that the rates really aren't so important it's your own higher self. Your own being is intelligent enough to pick up whatever you send in and use that to cure the condition if you are interested in curing yourself... If you want to cure yourself, have something simple like this and of course you can treat yourself at home whenever you feel like it. Bob Beck, an electronic engineer designed this one. He picked it up and laid it out on the table and said, well, there is about twenty five dollars worth of parts in this. (Riley gives a crackly breathy giggly laugh... then a sigh in lazy

'So let's see: Here's one reason why the drug companies are against it. The tranquiliser valium - I suppose you have all heard of it, maybe used. Thirteen billion, six-hundred million dollars worth of valium is sold in the United States every year. There are twenty seven million tobacco users and they spend about twenty-five billion dollars for cigarettes, cigars and tobacco, and then behind them is the Mafia. It is estimated they are taking out about ninety billion dollars a year on drugs. There's a hell of a lot of opposition to a cheap ittle electro-magnetic device anybody can use to stop that kind of addiction, and it could even go to murder of course...' (a motorbike goes by ... the pulse of the brain tuner speeds up Riley Hansard Crabb is a theosophist from the United States now living in New Zealand. For 26 years he was director of California's Borderland Research Foundation, which studies metaphysical phenomena of all types. His talk is about the valuable device with a rather Orwellian name - the brain tuner. The tuner is used particularly in curing addiction and formed part of the treatment received by Boy George recently for his drug problem. Designed by Dr Meg Patterson and developed at her free clinic in Hong Kong, the brain tuner is here fully explained by Riley

who gave this talk at the abovementioned Alternative Medicine & Healthy Lifestyle Exhibition, and is due to present the same talk to the 14th World Congress of Natural Medicines in Malaga, Spain in April. So without any further ado here are extracts from Riley's talk speaking to the microphone of Case Piap's cassette recorder....

"Have you been introduced to the brain tuner? Allow me," says Riley.

'My second wife..., whenever she felt a chronic pain coming on, she'd go and lie down and put herself up with that, with two electrodes, and in a few minutes the pain would stop and would be gone for three or four bours

The alcohol dry out centres in the United States, they charge \$8000 for a ten day treatment - they certainly won't want that kind of device in their place. It takes them that long to get the money back just on the advertising. One more item on this - doctors at the government hospital there in Washington DC. heard about the Russian so-called, 'sleep machine', and they found out that it really wasn't a machine for sleep, it was a machine for curing Russian generals of their vodka habit. And so these doctors of the government hospital said, 'Well, we should get some of these while we are here and start curing some of our American generals who're addicted to bourbon whiskey.' And so a couple of machines were obtained by the CIA and given to the hospital, and they set up a programme there and found that they were very effective in curing alcoholism and some other 'isms' in people, and... 'Hey! This is a good thing! We better get some of these manufactured and distribute them around to government hospitals, private institutions...' And then suddenly the whole research project was shut

down, and the doctors involved were scattered through other government hospitals around the nation.

One of the results of getting into the thing where you are taking heroin or one of these tranquilisers is that the brain in your head stops making endorphines, our natural pain control, and that's where the addiction comes in, and apparently this is just really a theory... that these little weak electro-magnetic signals in the alpha wave region stimulate the brain immediately to start producing endomorphines again, that's why the sudden relief...

This guy who was twenty-eight years old had been hitting, hitting himself up for years. He said, for eighteen hours after his first treatment that within three days he was almost back to normal. He couldn't believe it...

Nicotine-10 hertz, heroin 111, Coedine, barbiturates seventy. It stays there and keeps putting out energy.

This guy... in America, somebody from neuro-systems in Texas, got to one of the men who was running one of these outfits and working for it, and this is what he got back.

'Just what the hell are you guys trying to do? Well, don't you know it's worth \$9000 to them from the insurance company for every person they treat for alcoholism? It takes eight days of treatment at the centre for them to collect the cost of their adver-



tising and four or five days more for the alcoholic to dry out. Then they know that in six months 75% of them will be back again... this is guaranteed income for the dry out centre. And you guys are going to cure them permanently in only three to ten days? Get outta here!'

The H factor in the alpha wave goes through everything - it can't be shielded out in the magnetic wave. The Russians know this. I suppose some of you have heard of the Russian woodpecker... Three huge Russian transmitters... thirty million watts of power started broadcasting July 4th 1976, and the signal goes all over the world, goes through and through.. me and everything else, and that rate has been determined clinically to cause riotous behaviour in people. Some of these rates are ngative, some are positive. So the idea is if you have a variable rate type, adjust it to where you feel comfortable with the rate, and these other rates that are built in are beneficial. Let's see if we can create a resemblance of the Russian Woodpecker with this little ELF wave transmitter - ten cycles per second..' (Dadadadadadada sound is similar to a screwy worn-out jackhammer thudding on a concrete old building crumbling in destruction..) 'That rate has been hammering at you since 1976.

Dr Patterson says I can take anyone off a drug-abuse in a matter of days, no matter how severe his or her addiction is, and with only minimal discomfort.

Pete Townsend' (from rock group The Who)... 'back in 1980, his world was collapsing in around him - he was drinking a bottleand-a-half of cognac a day, and that didn't help so then he got into the alcohol-cocaine oscillation.

'Eventually I became such a physical wreck that I went to this doctor who prescribed sleeping pills with an anti-depressent called Adavan, and these made me feel great and soon I was taking eight tablets of that a day and then taking three sleeping pills a night so I could sleep.'

So he's in this oscillation back and forth between these two things.

'A month later it dawned on me that I was dying..' So then it was when he heard of Dr Patterson and contacted her in London. He said no, it wouldn't work for him, 'but by the second day I knew I was on the home straight, and on the third day I felt feelings of sexual desires returning, feeling of just wanting to go out for a walk - it was incredible! There was a sense of inner joy as I started to gain independence from the drugs, a natural energy flow slowly returned to my body, I could feel the old me coming back, and the first emotion I felt was arrogance. The fourth day I got depressed and initially I had been given low electric frequencies for heroin. But when I became depressed I was given some high frequencies for my cocaine addiction. And at this high setting I would sometimes have psychadelic experiences. The colours in my room would suddenly start to go
Wooooooo!.... After the colour experience I had another setback followed by a day when I felt superhuman. It was just like being on heroin, but the next day I again felt like death warmed over. Some withdrawal symptoms returned gradually, my mood levelled off, so that by the tenth day I felt fairly normal. I realised the treatment is an education in itself, NET re-educates the brain to produce its own drugs, and in the process you learn about your own human

I've seen Peter Townsend wearing a little tuner on his belt and having electrodes taped behind his ears, and I suppose he thought that whenever he needed a fix he would turn the machine on and get an electro-magnetic fix.

The two kinds of electricity in acupuncture practice in the past in China, as you know... the acupuncture needles were twirled between the palms of the hand of the acupuncutrist as they spun the needles. While they were doing this they were producing static electricity, and that's what was charging the needles... Dr Patterson finally realised that a weak electric current was being created by this friction and sent into the patient's body along with the needle. So the obvious thing is well, why not use a little electro-magnetic circuit in a battery.

Sorry I don't have any of these to sell to you. We are getting some of these made... we can get them made here for around \$140, so we are not promising anything, but we may be able to get some made. By the way, I'll go out right after this lecture, I'll load up my gear and we can sit down out there in the open area on one of those picnic tables and I could talk to you more about this if you want...'

WE, the undersigned, add our names to this great declaration, demanding that it be respected by all governments throughout the world.

IN COUNTRY AFTER COUNTRY even the right to speak up in defence of human rights is being crushed. Thousands have been jailed and tortured for demanding and exercising their rights. Many have "disappeared" or been killed.

THESE ABUSES MUST STOP. We call on all governments to ratify the world's human rights treaties, to bring their own laws and practices into line with them, and to act to protect human rights worldwide.

ON BEHALF OF THE VICTIMS who have been seized and silenced, we appeal to every government and to the United Nations to protect all those, wherever they may be, who raise their voices in defence of human rights.

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Human rights now!

Human Rights Now!, the largest campaign ever organised by AI to support the rights set forth in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, began early this month on 3 March 1988.

Throughout the year, Al will distribute copies of the Declaration to all the world's countries. While informing individuals of their inviolable human rights and collecting signatures on an appeal endorsing the Declaration, Al will press governments to respect human rights and to protect activists who promote 'these rights.

The Universal Declaration of Human Rights, adopted by the United Nations General Assembly 40 years ago, proclaims fundamental and equal rights 'for all peoples and all nations'. Drafted in the wake of vast human suffering during World War II, it calls upon 'every in dividual and every organ of society' to promote respect for human rights. It provides a worldwide standard for preserving human dignity. In today's world, however, governments have not translated the principles they accepted in 1948 into global reality; many governments in all regions claim that they practice and value human rights while in reality they violate human rights. Unjust imprisonment and denial of fair legal treatment occur daily. At least 60 governments have tortured in their custody during the 1980's, and over 120 governments still permit use of the death penalty.

In addition to focusing public attention on the general principles proclaimed by the Universal Declaration, AI is stressing the need to uphold international and regional human rights agreements designed to give these principles legal precision. By becoming party to the agreements, governments affirm to the international community their determination to respect human dignity. They also help to ensure that future administrations will be obliged to guarantee specific and fundamental rights.

Al bases its 1988 campaign activities on several rights agreements, including two international covenants which give legal form to the Universal Declaration

and legally bind all nations party to

* The International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights - which protects inter alia fundamental rights to life; freedom of conscience, expression and association; freedom from arbitrary arrest and torture or ill-treatment and the right to a fair trial. The Optional Protocol to this Covenant provides individuals with a means to report complaints of human rights abuse. By the end of 1987, 87 states were party to the Covenant and 39 were party to the Optional Protocol.

* The International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights - which promotes inter alia rights to work, fair wages and trade union participation, as well as rights to health care and education. By the end of 1987, 91 states were party to this Covenant.

Only half the world's governments have signalled their commitment to human rights by becoming party to the Covenants. Al seeks adherence by all governments.

adherence by all governments.
Other agreements on which Al's

campaign will focus include:

The Convention Against Torture and Other Cruel, Inhuman or Degrading Treatment or Punishment - a significant step towards worldwide eradication of torture. Twenty-five states had become party to the Convention by the end of 1987, and are therefore bound to its terms under international law, while 40 others had registered their intention to become party by signing the Convention.

* The Convention Relating to the Status of Refugees and its 1967 Protocol which grant refugees freedom from being returned to territory where their basic rights may be denied.

* The Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide - which establishes an international legal system restraining governments from mass extrajudicial executions.

Al will also address regional agreements which specify basic human rights. The organisation recognises adherence to international agreements as central to the human rights struggle, unifying the world community through accepted norms and creating a legitimate basis for the efforts of

human rights activists within individual countries. Their action is crucial. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights and its supporting agreements are invested with urgent meaning by men, women and children now struggling to preserve their lives and their dignity.

By collecting signed appeals throughout the year, Al will gather evidence that people everywhere support human rights. On behalf of signatories, the organisation will present appeals to the United Nations and to representatives of individual governments in December, during the international observation of Human Rights Day.

Progress in South Korea

South Korea has a new Constitution, approved by referendum on 27 October 1987, which strengthens some individual rights. Press cen sorship is now prohibited and publication and assemblies no longer need official authorisation. Arresting agencies must now inform detainees of the reason for their arrest and of their right to contact a lawyer. They must also tell relatives, without delay, where detainees are held. Al regards this as an important practical measure to prevent the occurrence of torture. To Al's regret the new Constitution failed to introduce the right of detainees to be promptly brought before a judge. In Al's view several laws used to detain people still need to be amended. Al welcomes the improvements and hopes that further progress will be made.



ABOUR CLUB IN UPROAR



Labour Club. A power struggle continues between two diametrically opposed camps. One claiming it was elected as the new 1988 executive, refusing to comment further. The other headed by the 1987 executive, claiming the election was unconstitutional and a 1988 executive has still to be elected. The wider issue concerns pro

and anti government struggles within the Auckland Central electorate.

The 1988 A.G.M. of the Labour Club and Princes St Labour Party Branch (two organisations with common members and officers) was convened on the 25 March. The meeting became unruly, broke down and was postponed.

A special meeting on March 31 called by the Auckland Central Labour Electorate Committee (L.E.C.) elected a new executive, with Seamus Donegan, a law student, as its President. The 1987 executive states that an A.G.M. did not occur. It considers itself to be in charge until a constitutional A.G.M. is convened. They have rescheduled the A.G.M. for the 14 April.

The 1987 Exec has published a special edition of the clubs 'Red Mole' newsletter. It outlines why

they believe the March 31 meeting to be unconstitutional.

The new executive was inter-

viewed by the N.Z. Herald immediately after the March 31 meeting. They now refuse to comment further. Says Vice President Chris Diack, 'Our official comment is that it is an internal party matter to be resolved internally. We will abide by the party decision in that matter.'

The Labour Party does not want its 'dirty linen aired in public'. It will invoke party discipline on members involving themselves in media comment. Members could be suspended or expelled.

The 1987 President Charles Chauvel is willing to go on record, not frightened of the possible consequences. 'I find it ironical that they took the topic to the media themselves and yet they are not prepared to make comments to Craccum. This is important as Craccum is one of the vital sources of information students have on the matter'. He believes it is a grave breach of party discipline, but feels it is necessary for him to respond to statements made by the pro-Prebble pro-government camp.

Prior to its decision not to comment, the new exec announced itself as the official leadership of the branch. They are sick and tired of the dispute. The old exec has been beaten twice and they wish it would die so they could get on and run the branch. They say the 'Red Mole' is invalid and clouds the issue

The branch in 1987 had, they say been left to run down with only 24 members which was disgraceful considering the huge potential audience at Auckland University. The old executive only valued the branch once others wished to become involved.

Charles Chauv el sees the matter in the context of the whole Auckland Central issue. The Princes St branch of the Auckland Central L.E.C. has been involved in the Auckland Central infighting.

Their two objectives are to elect Labour governments and to ensure they are in fact Labour governments not 'right wing, freemarket musketeers'. They object to the political and philosophical leanings of the pro-government/Prebble new executive.

'I believe the principles have been eroded' says Chauvel, The Labour club and branch has been well known for its prominent and vocal position on the ideological left of the party.

Control of the Princes St branch and its voting powers at L.E.C. could send repercussions throughout the whole Labour movement. Delegates sent by the Princes St branch to the Auckland Central A.G.M. could sway the balance on the candidate selection process. Branch control is critical of re-selecting or rejecting Richard Prebble as candidate for the next election.

The selection committee has six voting members. Three are appointed by Labour party head office, one is voted for by electorate members and the other two appointed by the L.E.C. The power struggle in Auckland Central is for power in the L.E.C. Whichever camp gains control of the L.E.C. chooses members on this selection committee. Princes St delegates have voting rights at the L.E.C. A.G.M.

Left wing control of the L.E.C. could result in Prebble being replaced, or bowing to ideological pressure. This challenge to Prebble, a senior government minister could have serious repercussions on the government. If the process is repeated in other electorates it may break government unity, threatening its chances at the next General Election

Pro-government groups point out the return to a National Government would be detrimental to the left, meaning the return to policies such as voluntary unionism and nuclear ship visits.

The new (pro Prebble) executive will take any further disputes to the Labour Party NZ Council. They say

they are constitutionally elected and refuse to attend the April 14 meeting, seeing it as an illegitimate meeting.

The authors of the special edition 'Red Mole' cover the issue of constitution in a 'lengthy and legalistic constitutional discussion'. It concludes:- (abbreviated)

1. The 'Meeting' (March 31) was

not constitutionally called.

It was not properly constituted.
 It was not properly conducted.
 It did not have the authority to

 It did not have the authority to elect an ex ecutive or L.E.C. delegates, or to conduct any other business.

elect officers.

The 'Red Mole' states that branch officers must be elected at an A.G.M. The March 25 A.G.M. was adjourned. The meeting of March 31 was a Special Meeting not an A.G.M. Therefore a new 1988 executive will be elected at the meeting scheduled for April 14.

Following this meeting assuming the 1987 executive wins the vote it will be willing to go to the party constitutional subcommittee at the NZ Council. 'The appropriate forum for disputes' says Chauvell.

Disagreements exist over the voting rights of Princes St members. The 1987 executive says all members of 'the institution' have voting rights at the A.G.M. including graduates and university staff. The new executive says that criteria for eligibility was decided by the Ak Central L.E.C. The branch is one for students, not graduates.

Both camps attempted to 'stack' the March 25 and 31 meetings.

The April 6 S.R.C. passed unanimously a motion stating is recognises only the 1987 office holders, not the new Labour club executive. Only the mover of the motion Peter Frawley and Charles Chauvell can now book A.U.S.A facilities.

This does not block the new Labour club from hiring facilities as individuals.

The AUSA treasurer will be here to answer any and all questions on the accounts and the budgets. Get it all straight from the horse's mouth (no offence, Wayne - ha! ha!)



On March 21st 1988 the engineering students voted to have 50% of their fees paid to Engineering Society. The only argument used was that \$30 of this fee is wasted, and that the engineers can see where the money goes if it remains within the club.

These arguments apply to all students, not just engineers. This article looks at what the Student Association would be like if everyone paid half the fees they actually paid. This is really an Alternative Budget, and there are a number of assumptions made in it, which are explicity stated. My hope is that by the end of this article, you will have a better understanding of how your fee is spent, and a realisation that the alleged waste is an illusion of those seeking to further their own interests.

If you are interested in controlling how your money is spent, please do not forget to read the conclusion at the end of this article!

Two weeks ago Craccum printed the complete set of accounts for 1986. The 1987 accounts are being prepared now. The Association continues to fund the same activities from year to year, so a reading of those accounts will also give you a grasp of where your money is being spent this year. My qualifications are:

- 1. Preparing the original budget
- 2. BCom/BSc (one paper short of ACA)
- 3. Three years of involvement with AUSA.
- 4. AUSA Treasurer





THE CONSOLIDATED BUDGET

We will start by redrafting the Consolidated Budget. This lists all Income and Expenditure of the Association, except for purchase and sale of assets such as catering vans.

OTHER INCOME

Bookshop Commission of \$77,000, surplus on beer sales of \$15,000, less interest expense of \$13,000. This assumes:

- No Amusement Parlour. It costs us too much to provide the change required.
- Campus Radio winds up. We were going to charge them for accounting services.

PROPERTIES

This assumes that we would charge AUSA tenants the full market rental. At the moment it is 80% of market rental, and last Tuesday and Wednesday you voted whether or not to remove the rental ceiling of \$41 being 10% above the accommodation grant.

SHADOWS

This assumes no change to Shadows

COMPUTER

This system is required to process the accounts, statements, invoices and inventory records of a \$2,000,000 catering operation. As long as catering and Shadows remains, this expense will continue. The engineers claim that this system is being replaced is a lie.

ACCOUNTS

Exactly the same comments apply for the Accounts Department, as for the computer system. Perhaps \$5,000 to \$10,000 could be saved by employing a part-time worker instead of a full-time worker. I have been generous in cutting this expense by the maximum \$10,000. This saving could only be made by not providing any club accounts. That means no more club loans. No more \$200 interest free overdraft for clubs. No more cash floats given on credit for club functions. No more ordering goods from catering for club meetings - cheese, wine, juice, cups, etc. It is possible that the time saved in not having to deal with these clubs would allow accounts to reduce their staff.

THE LOSS

As you can see, there is still a loss of \$78,929. In the Actual Budget, there is a loss of \$85,583. How can we sustain such a loss?

1. Part of the cost represents depreciation. This is spreading the cost of an asset over the years it is used. This is not a cash expense, but a way of recognising that some day the asset will have to be replaced.

2. Lion Breweries provides sponsorship for Shadows.

3. There is a Bookshop Trust Fund which contributes \$20,000 a year for Capital Purchases.

4. There is income of \$72,000 from Room Hire, which is in a trust controlled by AUSA and the University. We get 34 for Capital Purchases.

5. There is a loan to pay for Campus Radio equipment. I am assuming that the sale of the various assets that have been cut, would repay all that loan.

SO WHAT?

Well your fees could be cut to \$30 each. But not without cost, as the Engineers would have you believe. Listed above are the changes that would have to be made to the services the Association provides. Well perhaps changes is a bad word - try cuts. I suggest you think long and hard about what AUSA provides for students at a cost of \$2 per week each. And then think about what you would lose if you cut that to \$1 per week.

Remember that AUSA is partly running a business. We cannot make cuts where we would like, and keep the good bits. It is very much a package deal. We have to make cuts where they are possible. Student Activities are where they are possible to the greatest degree.

CONCLUSION

You can now see where every dollar of the Association comes from, and where it goes. It is simply not possible to cut fees, and maintain the same level of services. The Engineers claim there is waste. You can now see where the money goes. At some time in the past, students have voted to support all the activities listed above. To change that, all you need to do is move a motion at a General Meeting of the Association, and if that is carried by a majority, then that change will be made.

I hope that you found this article interesting. Craccum have been very kind to let me have the space. If this matter interests you, please write in and say so, otherwise Craccum won't let me have this space again!

Furthermore, if you have any questions about anything to do with what the Students Association spends its money on, then again, please write in and ask. Next week, I hope to be allowed space to answer all the questions the Engineers raised.

THREE MEN AND A BABY

It is always difficult to effectively remake a good film, but this American version of 'Trois hommes et un couffin' clearly fails to capture any of the clever essence of the original, but obviously succeeds in its pursuit of box-office coffers

The movie rolls along OK, but is far from sharp or concise enough. The acting is bland and flat, partially due to the weak and uneven script; the lonely jokes delivered without flair. The direction is reasonably competent; Leonard Nimoy however, remains only at the level of a mediocre version of Spielberg. The musical score is strident and often incongruous, but crudely points to the more emotional moments, and is sometimes loud enough to overpower the dialogue.

The film reeks of excessive sentimentality that drowns, as in so many similar American efforts, the essential point of the story, being in this case, flippant male attitudes to casual sex and subsequent responsibility. It would have to rate as good example of the disparity that frequently exists between a good film and a successful one (five attractive 'stars', expensive sets, Yuppie depictions, and all the above).

I worry about the expectations of today's youth: some actually applauded at the film's end.

BROADCAST NEWS

When Aaron (Albert Brooks) warns Jane (Holly Hunter) that 'Tom, while being a nice guy, is the Devil!' the comment is not motivated solely by male rivalry. Nor is it inaccurate, if the concept of network news as an extension of the entertainment industry bothers you. It bothers Aaron and Jane, respectively talented producer and brilliant reporter of a Washington news station, who both react indignantly to the hiring by their station of television-audience pet, Tom (William Hurt) a man of limited education, who by his own goodnatured admission often doesn't 'get' the news he is reading. Tom, whose office desk drawer opens to reveal assorted 'professionallylaundered' shirts and an oversized hairbrush, is a decent guy, ready with helpful hints for Aaron when the latter fills in for him one Saturday night. 'And if you find yourself just reading the news, stop! Start selling a little.' The ominous music that accompanies this cheerful advice belies the director's antipathy for this attitude to the news.

If 'showman' Tom is guiltily aware of being unqualified for the job that is earning him a fortune, his amiable personality suffers little torment at the thought. Aaron and Jane, on the other hand, dauntingly confident and competent in their careers, reserve insecurities for their private lives. When alone, Jane succumbs to spontaneous sobbing fits. A nice touch is her 'unscheduled' weeping at the office as colleagues file past the morning after blithely sending a station journalist into Tom's arms. Aaron hides his vulnerability behind sometimes acerbic wit, delivered deliciously deadpan with accompanying soulful expression. Over the phone to Jane he muses, 'Wouldn't this be a great world if insecurity and desperation made us more attractive, if needy were a turn-on'.

Broadcast News captures the essence of an exciting friendship. It also depicts intelligently the dilemma that binds the three central characters. Jane is intellectually compatible with Aaron but physically attracted to Tom. While Jane cannot respect Tom for personifying 'something I truly think is dangerous', ignoble passion dictates that she struggle to subdue her principles. Some of the funniest and most poignant scenes arise out of this conflict. As Jane sits outside her apartment with Tom one evening she moans, 'I'm so tired ... I'm just a dead lump of poured-out flesh. Want to come up?'

Taut direction and a witty script the cast seems to relish uttering as much as I did listening to it, ensure an alert, clever film. Hunter and Brooks are completely convincing in their roles. Hurt less so. He seemed to be labouring under the onus of portraying an 'ordinary' hardly admirable character. As for the heavily-lauded script, there was only one part that furrowed my brow; the scene where Aaron asks if he can see a copy of the coming Saturday night's news. How far in advance is the news prepared?

I strongly recommend Broadcast .News to anyone with a taste for intelligent humour.

THE BROTHER FROM ANOTHER PLANET

(or 'E.T. rides the Subway'?) Bridgeway Cinema

This is a wonderful movie! Joe Morton commendably plays an endearing black-skinned alien who finds his way to Harlem after crashlanding in New York harbour (near the famous old Ellis Island Immigration Centre!). The Brother explores the city, encountering much of its characteristic melting pot of contrasts. After finding a young junkie overdosed he gets involved with a drug ring and his concern leads him to the man at the top in an effort to make him understand the repercussions of his dealings. He also appears to recognise messages of other aliens midst the graffitti of the city's walls. (The song at the end of the movie - about finding the promised land - implies that perhaps many 'aliens' have made New York/this planet their home...?)

I loved this film. I found it a rivetting tale filled with a delicious offbeat humour along with many touching moments. As one American critic called it - and appropriately too - it is 'very funny, very wise...'

The Tantrum theatre company, in collaboration with TVNZ, present a live stage play exploring the love, laughter and sadness surrounding a wedding reception. An all-star lineup, members of Tantrum are all readily recognisable from major stage and screen appearances. Writer Fiona Samuel is probably best known as author of TVNZ's series The Marching Girls, and musician John Gibson appeared in and co-wrote music for TVNZ's Heroes.

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Occam Theatre Company Director: Edward Newborn Auckland Youth Theatre March 28 - April 2

Considering that the Company (comprising of Richard Wasley, Helena Ross and Charles Frederick) took its name from philosopher William of Occam's maxim 'entities are not to be multiplied without necessity' (ie. the fewest possible assumptions should be made in explaining a thing) and that printed across the bottom of the prowords, gramme are the 'Psychology is about producing habits out of rats!' the Company's message seems to be 'Don't jump to conclusions about the characters you are watching.' The performance of two plays from different authors, which examine consecutively the theme of boredom and problems of communication facing a long-established relationship, and which both do so by offering the audience a couple to observe in the frustrated intimacy of their everyday lives, is an idea that works.

In 'the Colour of Heat', written by Saul Zachary (performed with minimum props on the stage of an auditorium whose black walls and downward sloping seating was reminiscent of the now-defunct Theatre Corporate,) a middle-aged American couple is sunbathing in the country. When a pair of young lovers stretch out in a nearby field the husband describes the scene wistfully to his near-sighted wife. The tension that underlies the elder couple's efforts at casual conversation was conveyed to poignant effect by Richard Wasley and Helena Ross, to the extent that some lines jarred as labouring a point already subtly established. 'Talking to you is like picking a lock. I'm your wife, not a stranger.' Otherwise, the script was sensitive and perceptive. Mood swings and an unexpected twist at the end gave the actors plenty of scope for characterisation. And they did not disappoint. You could sit back and enjoy the dexterous performance of two experienced actors, able to command a stage without obvious effort, from reclining deckchairs.

The first line of 'The Lover', written by Harold Pinter, delivered by businessman Richard to his wife, as he leaves for the office, set the tone for an hour of determinedelynonchalant dialogue. 'Will your lover be coming today?' Richard and Sarah have long-since decided that 'Frankness at all costs is essential in a happy marriage.' - only that now Richard is beginning to have doubts. His resentment hovers in flippant exchanges that have become a habit. 'His whole body emanates love' Sarah replies idly to her husband's enquiry. Richard looks sympathetic. 'How nauseating! Manly with it, of course?'

Charles Frederick, as the milkman, never ventures on stage, but can be heard off in dialogue with Sarah. Helena Ross and Richard Wasley work well together on stage, and seem very comfortable in their roles. Richard Wasley is particularly impressive. He manages the contrasting accents and manner of the husband and lover with such adroitness as to be equally convincing as both. Wasley (who toured the North Island in the one-man show 'Hess') is a delight to watch. He and Helena Ross deserved a larger audience than the five who lapped up their performances on Thursday night.

MANIA

Directed by Gordon Hall Written by, and Musical Direction by Rob Simonsen Little Maidment Theatre April 13-16 8pm Sunday matinee April 17, 2pm



Four years ago musiciansongwriter Rob Simonsen decided to write a rock opera as a vehicle for his love of a variety of musical styles, the Kingseat controversy of the time inspiring the theme of the committed psychiatric patient reduced to the plaything of his keepers. A selection of projected slides showing a web, white brick wall and barbed wire reinforce the image of captivity, a visual effect which clashes deliberately with the gaiety construed by hospital staff. The honking horn that accompanies the nurse's arrival with the medication trolley is normally associated with a clown's entrance. A gargantuan wooden syringe and scalpel conjure up memories of playschool. Patients dressed euphemistically in pyjamas toss balloons, shuffle aimlessly, on occasion straying into the audience to fix a glazed, good-natured smile on some shrinking individual. There was continual movement over and around the central platform, from which rose a single frame of scaffolding, the actors in control to the point of giving the impression of spontaneity. Certainly evident was a sense of cohesion and enthusiasm which trivialised minor irritations such as insufficient lighting and overlong pauses between scenes.

Swings in music style complemented moods, a lover's duet being followed by a plunge into a rock tempo or group harmony. The two bands coped expertly, the result a treat for the senses. singing was of a high standard, enunciation and conscientious use of microphones ensuring that no lyrics were lost. Often, Rob Simonsen's sense of black humour, so well mirrored by Director Gordon Hall, was evident in the lines; such as when hospital staff are preparing Gemma for her lobotomy operation. 'So nice of you to volunteer/To help Dr Einstein enhance his career.'

Obviously, the musicians had a lot of fun performing 'Mania'. The cheers and applause from the audience at the rock opera's conclusion showed they weren't the only ones who had enjoyed the evening.

Fay Weldon:
The Hearts and Lives of
Men
The Shrapnel Academy

1987 was certainly a banner year for Fay Weldon with the television adaptions of The Lives and Loves of a She-Devil and Heart of the Country bathing her well and truly in the limelight

The Hearts and Lives of Men, Weldon's latest novel, released in hardback last Christmas, contains the same heady mixture of savage satire, social comment (especially regarding the relationships between men and women) and high adventure that made She-Devil so popular. At the heart of the complex plot is Little Nell, the angelic and adorable daughter of handsome, whizz-kid art director, Clifford Wexford and his beautiful, impulsive wife, Helen, who has 'power over the hearts and lives of men' even though she doesn't always realise it. Nell falls innocent victim to the fickle love lives of her self-centred parents, who fall out of love about as quickly as they fell in love, divorce and then begin a selfish tug of love over the custody of their precious daughter. At first, Nell plays piggy in the middle between Clifford and Helen before she is presumed dead after an ill-fated kidnap attempt by Clifford ends tragically in an aircrash. However, Nell miraculously survives the ordeal and embarks on an eventful, adventurous life that encompasses satanic rites, a squalid, depraved children's home and drug dealing in idyllic Wales.

Weldon skilfully weaves the myriad plot threads (which span several decades) together and constantly undermines the reader's 'suspension of disbelief', daring you not to believe the unlikely coincidences that grow more and more improbable such as Nell's adoptive parents also naming her Nell or Nell eventually working for Helen. And, there are even some coincidental chances that go begging because the characters fail to act such as Nell winning a colouring contest sponsored by Clifford. Eventually, all the characters are drawn together for the as-promised, hopelessly contrived ending where all the loose ends are tied all too neatly together. At first glance, The Hearts and Lives of Men may not seem as brutal and biting as Weldon's previous novels but lurking beneath the subtly sugary surface are the usual home truths:

Clifford, Helen and Nell are shown to be leading charmed lives. Clifford and Helen seem to stumble through life with their eyes closed but somehow always managing to land on their feet, not deserving the happiness that they selfishly take for granted and remaining oblivious to the suffering of all those around them. Nell, meanwhile, always seems to survive by virtue of her unflagging optimism and her unceasing ability to endear herself to all and sundry. The Hearts and Lives of Men is a sort of fairy tale for adults and Weldon goes to great pains to emphasise that in real life, good doesn't always triumph over evil and almost nobody lives 'happily ever after'.

The Shrapnel Academy recently released in paperback is Weldon with her literary claws ruthlessly bared. In a recent interview, Weldon stated that with Shrapnel Academy, she wanted to present

nuclear war to the reader in a palatable way that wouldn't hit them over the head with a message. The Shrapnel Academy is certainly an ambitious piece of writing which is set over the course of one weekend but also spans the entire history of human warfare.

The story is based around a dinner party held at the prestigious military institute which is dedicated to the late Sir Henry Shrapnel, inventor of the exploding cannon ball. Creating eccentric, off-beat characters has always been Weldon's forte but with The Shrapnel Academy, she has done herself proud, creating a Whole plethora including Joan Lumb, the sanctimonious, tyrannical head of the Academy, who seems to live in the last century and is in love with the memory of Sir Henry and with Murray Fairchild, a ludicrous, past it James Bond, whose adventures seem too far fetched for even the worst pulp comic. And, then there's Baf, the vivacious, irrepressible weapons dealer, who thrills over his high-tech death tools like a little boy over a new toy or Mew, the tactless, bumbling but endearing, pseudo-journalist from The Woman's Times (inadvertently invited because Joan Lumb thought she was from The Times.) with a disasterous habit for putting her foot right in it.

Weldon has cleverly created an infrastructure within the Academy as vast hordes of illegal immigrant servants and their families live in ghetto-like conditions in the downstairs quarters. It is testament to Joan Lumb's general insensitivi-

to Joan Lumb's general insensitivity that she insists on renaming all her servants upon commencing employment, robbing them of their cultural identity and providing them with quaint, childlike names like Acorn, Inverness and even Raindrop. (Even the main characters have names that sound like kid's nicknames, such as Baf and Muffin, just begging the reader not to take them seriously). Head of the servant community is Acorn the butler, who seems to go power mad as he whips the servants up into a mad frenzy and begins a revolt that is always doomed to fail. And, Weldon also shows sexism existing in a minority community such as this as the men always seem to take their misfortune out on the women who always seem to be on the receiving end of all the suffering. In fact, Acorn uses the death of Miriam in childbirth as a

spark for his tin-pot revolution

when he himself is to blame for

getting her pregnant in the first

place and then for refusing to allow

her to go to hospital. Weldon creates the uncomfortable feeling that to the characters everything that happens is a game. Joan Lumb and her guests all seem oblivious to the fact that people actually lose their lives because of the weapons they're all so proud of. And, when the Academy is snowed in, paranoia grows like wildfire as they all jump to the ridiculous conclusion that they are under threat of attack. Adrenalin soon begins to pump as the characters, adamant in their belief that the best form of defence is attack, muster their forces to strike back at their non-existant adversary like little boys playing soldiers. But, Weldon constantly reminds the reader that war is not a game and that the consequences are often fatal as can be seen in the shockingly abrupt, bloody ending.

One reviewer compared reading Weldon to drinking champagne and her prose is certainly exquisite as she seems to chat to the reader like an old friend over a quiet drink. Stephen Jewell

JOHN HEARTFIELD -PHOTOMONTAGES

Artspace - Quay Buildings, 6-8 Quay St March 21 - April 29



This exhibition of 33 photomontages is of interest not just to art enthusiasts, but has a political side which is equally important.

Today the German Democratic Republic (Pop: approx 17,000,000) is the fifth greatest European power and the second-greatest socialist power. At the end of World War Two the allies divided Germany into three zones of occupation. The American and British zones were later relinquished, but a Soviet refusal to relinquish control of its zone of occupation led to the Berlin blockade of 1948. With all access

to Berlin cut off by the Soviets, foodstuffs had to be airlifted into the allied sectors known today as West Berlin over a period of months. In 1949, the GDR was established, with all elections since following a one-party list of candidates, that party being the Socialist Unity Party. In June 1953 severe rioting in East Berlin was quelled by the intervention of Soviet tanks. The flood of immigrants toward the West led to the construction of the Wall in 1961 which today cuts Berlin in two. Since 1963, residents of the FRG can visit relatives in the GDR, and elderly residents of the GDR are allowed to settle in the West. In 1976, Erich Honecker was named Chairman of the Council of State. He has since received delegates from the Green Party, and is the Patron of the GDR Preparatory Committee for an International Meeting for Nuclear Weapon Free Zones, to be held from 20-22 June 1988. In the pamphlet signed by him, of which copies are available from the John Heartfield exhbiition, he says, 'The German Democratic Republic, which is known for its deep commitment to a nuclearweapon-free-corridor in Central Europe and the elimination of all nuclear weapons from... the whole world, believes that it is high time that a discussion took place about the whole question of nuclearweapon-free-zones... Every path leading to a peaceful world... must be explored."

The Australasian Ambassador to the GDR, Joachim Elm, who is resident in Canberra, praised New Zealand's nuclear-free stand, in his welcoming speech, at this exhibition and encouraged those present to support the International Meeting whose location he gave simply as 'Berlin'. He did, also, in-


vite them to approach him, after his speech, with questions. Mrs Elm stayed behind to chat, but her husband proved much more elusive, disappearing from the room just seconds after finishing his speech.

These works by John Heartfield (1891-1968) date from 1924-1960. Through them, he fights for peace, democracy, socialism and the working class, as well as solidarity with the Soviet Union. Born Helmut Herzfeld, he changed his name to an English equivalent as a protest against chauvinist war propaganda and the greeting 'Got strafe England' (May God punish England).

His works are clever, and rarely subtle; no wonder he was driven into exile. His accusations are blatant, using strong visual imagery (often including animals), built up of photographs cut up and cleverly put together, with captions that are sarcastic, witty, deceptively lighthearted or outrightly expressive. Most refer to particular events in political history but are also valid on a more general level. 'Blood and Iron' for example, refers to the beheading of four German Communists by the Nazis - shown here by a swastika built from four axes dripping with blood.

Probably the best known is that titled 'Choir of the Arms Industry - A Firm Foundation is Our Geneva, referring to a disarmament conference, showing a church built from bullets and surmounted with a dollar and pound sign.

Heartfield's influence has been strongly felt. As well as noticing some possible connections with local artist Megan Jenkinson (currently exhibiting in the Art Gallery's NZXI exhibition), it is interesting to note that Barbara Kruger, a modern American artist working in the same medium of photomontage



and also dealing in social comment, also has an exhibition here in NZ at the moment, unfortunately only showing at Wellington's National Gallery.

Everyone who has been subjected to, or has witnessed, any religious prejudice or discrimination is invited to add his or her experiences to the filed, in confidence. Your story may involve a serious breach of your rights, or you may be concerned by insensitive or hurtful remarks. - What effect did it have on your religious feelings?

- Has it changed how you act in any way, particularly the way you practise your faith?

Be clear about these details -Your own religion - and that of others involved, if known.

Give your name, address, and phone number. You may be contacted to provide more information, or to check some details but your name and identity will NOT be published or made known unless you agree to it.

It has often been said - perhaps a bit too often - that a little bit of knowledge can be a dangerous thing. Yet, time and again, we are reminded of the accuracy of this aphorism; and by the article of Mr/Miss/Mrs/Ms 'Friends of Palestine' last week comparing Israel and South Africa, we were treated to a timely reminder.

The author of that article (whoever it may be) claimed that Israel was an apartheid state like South Africa. The proof? Because in both countries, we see violent intercommunal conflict involving the army. Therefore, Israel is like South Africa; therefore, since South Africa is an apartheid state, so too is Israel: QED.

The logic of this 'proof' of course, does not stand up to the briefest examination. One could find dozens of examples around the world where there are intercommunal tensions which explode into violence, where teargas cannisters and rubber bullets fly, where there is anguish and fear. But this does not make them apartheid states.

The writer of the article displayed a complete inability to understand the gulf of circumstances which separate the South African situation from that in Israel.

South Africa is a vast country governed by a minority white

"A nation defamed - the lie of population, which maintains supremacy by refusing to enfransupremacy by refusing to enfran Israeli Apartheid"

supremacy by refusing to enfranchise the large majority of that nation's population. By contrast, ALL citizens of the State of Israel, Jew, Arab, or otherwise, may participate in the democratic process. This is to be distinguished from the situation in the West Bank and Gaza, where there is a military occupation arising from a war Israel fought in self defence. The Arabs who live in this area are JORDANIAN citizens, and participate in JORDANIAN elections. The only way they could be given a vote in the Israeli system is by annexing the West Bank - not a solution which the Israelis or the Arabs (not to mention the Friends of Palestine) would find very appealing. The status quo, unfortunate though it is, cannot be changed until there is a peace agreement between the principal parties to the conflict. To date, despite Israel's outstretched hand, the PLO has preferred to conduct negotiations through the barrel of a gun. This has brought nothing but disaster on the PLO itself and the people it claims to represent.

South Africa has no significant external threat. Despite this fact, the government strenuously suppresses the media and opposition groups in the interests of 'national security'. Yet Israel by contrast, in a constant state of siege by all her neighbours except Egypt (Syria

ALONE has tank torces equivalent to those of NATO), scrupulously protects the freedom of the press. Indeed this is attested to by the fact that journalists covering the entire Middle East converge on Israel because of that freedom and security. Israel, per capita, has the largest foreign press corps in the world. In straight numbers, it is third behind only New York and Moscow. Even in the occupied territories, where Israel has the right to ban ALL media activity under international law, there is very little restriction - with the result that we have nightly telecasts of the current turmoil. What little restriction there is, is to prevent outbreaks of or incitement to violence, and to protect vital security information.

Apartheid in South Africa is upheld by a legal system which does not recognize the basic equality of all South African citizens. By contrast, Israel's Declaration of Independence says: 'the State... will uphold the full social and political equality of its citizens, without distinction of race, creed, or sex'. These fundamental rights are enforced by a strong and vigilant judiciary which is widely respected for its independence by Jew and Arab alike.

South Africa is a vast country, rich in mineral resources and largely self-sufficnet. Its national wealth could support a democratic system

of government. Yet the minority refuses to share this wealth. On the other hand, Israel is tiny - 1/10 of the size of New Zealand - with no natural resources. (It is often said that if Moses had turned right instead of left, he would have got oil, not just milk and honey.) Its only real resource is in the ingenuity of its population, and their will to survive. It is surrounded by hostile states, whose leaders continue to dream of Israel's destruction. It is bedeviled by the consequent crushing defence budget. Furthermore it is stuck in an area of the world where there is little or no respect for human rights, or for the norms of international conduct. Despite this, Israel continues to cling strongly to its democratic values and traditions.


Thus South Africa - in security chooses tyranny. Israel - in mortal danger - chooses democracy. There is no comparison. The writer for the Friends of Palestine bemoans the fact that the people will make a fuss about Zola Budd, but not about the Israeli soccer team. The simple answer to the writer's dilemma is that most people can see the distinctions which he is incapable, or unwilling, to see himself.

TROUBLE CARDS!

Wednesday's SRC looks set for a battle as the Evangelical Union attempt to affiliate to AUSA.

At the SRC of the 30th of March, allegations were raised about E.U.'s handling of the white club cards at enrolment. Graham Watson announced that the cards of some groups, notably the Lesbians on Campus, the Gay Students Association, and NORML appeared to have been 'lost', or worse, by the E.U.

E.U. has denied these allegations. Mens' Vice-President Alistair Hookings told Craccum that E.U. was involved with the white cards 'to a certain extent. We took them and put them in a box ... That's all we did really'. Secretary Ri Weal added that because they were short staffed they didn't even get the chance to sort the clubs' cards, only AUSA's file cards. When asked whether anyone from E.U. was involved in 'losing' the white cards, Ri replied 'Not as far as I know'. In fact; E.U. themselves had only received five of theirs, she claimed.

An eyewitness, however, said that he saw proof that cards were selectively thrown into the rubbish bins at the AUSA enrolment table. The eyewitness, who declined to be named, said that 'there were some suggestions that while they were on the desk they were throwing cards away and I did see what I thought to be quite suspicious evidence. He took over from an E.U. person at a seat on the table. The previous worker had also been an E.U. member. He then noticed that on the top of the rubbish bin (which was meant for unfilled cards) there were some club cards which had been filled out. 'It was quite full, so I emptied it out to make sure, and the ones that seemed to be going into the bin predominantly were ... basically all the clubs that are involved in any sort of drinking, or things that would probably go against E.U.' including the Gay Students Association.

He took the matter to AUSA President Richard Foster, who told him that they had heard rumours that E.U. were involved in such activities, especially against the Gay Students Association.

Richard told Craccum that one club saw a pile of their cards sorted on the table one afternoon, and that when they went to check on their numbers the following day the cards had disappeared.

AUSA secretary Pilar Alba also spoke of the selective way the cards appear to have been lost, with the Gay, Lesbian, and NORML clubs being particularly hard hit. The complaints began to filter through on an individual level when clubs held their first meetings for the year. Some new members asked why they had not been contacted after filling in the white clubs cards. The problem was that the clubs had not

received them. This is not the first year that this appears to have happened. However Pilar expressed satisfaction with the way which E.U. carried out their work. She said that they had proved to be the most reliable group to work on the AUSA tables, and that before the present crisis arose she even sent them a letter thanking them for

their work. Both Pilar and the eyewitness have pointed out that there is no concrete evidence that A.U., or anyone else, deliberately sabotaged the white card but that it looks suspiciously like it. The eyewitness added that 'maybe it isn't E.U. itself, maybe it's just some of their members'.

The next chapter in the controversy will occur at this week's

Ed's Note: Most clubs, unless they actually went through the cards themselves at enrolment, received only a small fraction of the cards that had been filled out for them. Craccum received only five. The Field Club, one of the most (deceivingly) innocent clubs on campus, received only a fifth of the number of cards that they would normally. Obviously it was not only clubs like Unigays, Norml, etc that were affected. The question is, was it purely incidental that these particular clubs didn't receive any cards, or was it intended?




Sadly, she has now burned her bridges: publicly admitted her position; there is no going back. Now, she cannot even make a pretence at possessing that most vital and valuable quality of a successful reporter: the capacity for objectivity, and thus, a high standard of professional integrity.

It would surely be better that she now move aside - or be moved - to make way for someone who appreciates the value and dire need for such qualities in key positions of the news media. But will it happen? Faint hope!

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
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
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
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
