

Craccum is currently being threatened with a massive cut in its grant from AUSA. Craccum relies on this \$40,000 grant and on advertising. If this grant was to be cut to \$10-\$20,000, Craccum would be almost entirely reliant on advertising, which would be the death of Craccum as we know it, particularly since the stockmarket crash. With so much less money around, companies are not willing to spend. Craccum has been feeling the effects of lack of advertising this term, and if it wasn't for the AUSA grant, we'd be down to about 8 pages and struggling.

An argument used by the movers of this motion was to compare Craccum to independent student newspapers like Student Life and Campus News. But there can be no comparison - these magazines come out only every now and then. They are at least 40% advertising, which leaves even less room for articles, etc. Craccum has a policy of having an average of no more than 25% advertising each issue, which is only possible through the AUSA grant. The latest issue of Campus News was only 8 pages long. Craccum is 16-28 pages long, and this is every week!

Craccum is also accessible to all students - you are welcome to contribute and get involved in writing, production, ideas and input, or writing letters. Craccum is also an up-to-date source of information, which tells you week by week what's going on around campus, and insuch a large divided university, it's important that there is some form of communication and information.

Anyway, it's too late for this cut in AUSA's grant to be brought about this year, but if this referendum is passed, it would affect future years. You'll hear more about this in the first issue next term so look out for it.

Being Capping Week, make the most of it - this is about the only time all year that you can terrorise Auckland and get away with it (and I don't mean just with the Pub Crawl - remember those things called Capping Stunts?!!)





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

Why is the Government Silent On Rat-Chewed **Babies?**

The news that Prince Charles is concerned with the plight of the homeless in Britain fascinates us. Not a single Government Minister in this country has expressed concern over the plight of the homeless in New Zealand! And their plight is appalling - and growing.

A report by the Housing Network - a social services group which includes the NZUSA - was headlined in the NZ Herald on February 19. It revealed horrifying conditions of babies being chewed by rats in Auckland hovels. Their report showed a simple equation: bad housing = bad health. Yet families with children could not afford doctors. Rent costs were a major factor - 68% of the families surveyed were receiving less than \$300 net income a week, and 38% were paying half their income in rent. Spokesperson Sister Mary Foy said it was not unusual to find 20 people living in a two-bedroom house.

Landlords say, renting is their business - they have to make a profit. And as is well-known, they make whatever the traffic will bear which, in times of shortage is plenty.

But that is only part of the picture. Social workers know that there are plenty more people families and single people - living in



cars, garages, old buses, anything that will give them some shelter.

Unemployment goes up by leaps and bounds every week, adding to the misery. Mostly - but not only it falls on Maori and Pacific Island families, who are the poorest of the

They are not yet sleeping on the public streets as are the poor in the USA and in London. Remember the song, 'Underneath the Arches', about those who used to sleep under London Bridge? Perhaps you thought those days were gone. If they ever were, they're back with a vengeance.

But it won't be long before we find homeless curled in doorways here. And what are the Langes and the Douglasses doing and saying? 'Damn you, Jack, I'm all right!' What they probably will say is: 'That's not our portfolio. Talk to the Minister of Housing, Helen Clark.' Yes, she's in it, too, but so are you all collectively. Don't think you can escape the responsibility with a sickly smile and a turned back. 'One may smile and smile and be a villain,' said Hamlet of his

More housing, now, for the poor! That is what is wanted. Not more private profit for the rich. The Government runs the economy. They are in a position to remedy these foul, inhuman conditions. Or stand condemned before the bar of public opinion.

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THE FRONT LAWN - MONSTER WORLD TOUR

Elizabeth O'Connor talks to Don McGlashan and Harry Sinclair of the Front Lawn

This monster has two heads - performers Don McGlashan and Harry Sinclair - it sings, plays, acts, dances and makes you laugh, and it's about to embark on a World Tour which will leave gigantic footprints all over Edinburgh, London, New York, and - you guessed it - Auckland, Christchurch and Dunedin.

The first step in this mammoth propagation of The Front Lawn (the Melbourne Times predicted they would soon overtake sheep as New Zealand's major export) is the Maidment Theatre, where they'll play a season from May 10 to 19.

The new show will be 'big, loud and musical' says Harry, with a number of new songs (some of which you'll hear on their forthcoming L.P.) An old favourite item will be included: The Reason for Breakfast.

The Front Lawn are used to following opportunity round the world. Harry studied drama in Paris, Don performed in New York, and since the two formed The Front Lawn in 1985 they have toured New Zealand and have made three visits to Australia.

The last was for the Melbourne Comedy Festival, 'a pretty crass, commercial sort of event where Melbourne, to its credit, celebrates the fact that it's the heart of standup comedy in Australia', says Don. Though The Front Lawn are not at all like traditional stand-up comics, their shows have gone down very well in Australia. Audiences appreciate the blend of comedy, seriousness and music







- Harry says 'a Front Lawn piece doesn't have to be funny to be good' - and the New Zealand style and content of the work.

Harry and Don don't try to change their work to fit a foreign audience - 'We have to do what we do best'. They steer clear of the easy laugh. They try to describe what they see in people around them, how they relate to each other, how they communicate.

They choose their material not by setting out to ask such questions as 'What does suburbia mean to most people?', but by throwing ideas, images, situations at each other like pancakes at a wall until some of them stick.

The working relationship between Harry and Don is immeasurably important in their success. Don says, 'The other person tends to act as a quality control. It makes you quite comfortable about saying a really stupid idea." Ideas they'd be embarrassed to contemplate alone, because they seem too uninteresting or too stupid, are thrown around: sometimes the other person can see fascinating possibilities.

The Front Lawn put their adventuresome spirit down to the kind of inspiration around when they left school and started out as performers. If it hadn't been for Red Mole, Inside Information, The Plague, Limbs' early shows, the Topp Twins and a host of other influences, they might have become 'some much more rarified theatre group'.

They think, however, that the current performance scene in New Zealand is exciting. They've recently enjoyed Tantrum's The Wedding Party in Auckland, and The Threepenny Opera featuring the Six Volts in Wellington. Harry says he's seen nothing like these shows recently in Melbourne, where mainstream theatre is much more formal and British.

The Front Lawn haven't performed on the Auckland campus since Orientation in 1986. Students shouldn't miss the chance to see them this May. The Front Lawn has built up an excellent relationship with audiences; the pair are praised for the way they press familiar material into wildly original shapes, for their unpretentious good humour and their outstanding musical and technical skills. Their favourite audience is 'people who actually want to come and see us.' If you're one of these, book for the Maidment season through BASS, 375-000.

Australia's Party Boys have been around since 1982 in many different forms and have featured many big names in Australian music. More than just a band out for the odd live performance, they have released four successful live albums. At the moment they are working on releasing singles and videos as well as another album later on in the year. They already have two hit singles under their belts - 'He's Gonna Step On You Again' and 'Hold Your Head Up'. The next single soon to be released is 'Gloria', which was an original hit for Van Morrison and more recently Laura

The current line-up includes bassist Paul Christie, one of the founding members, who has played in the Kevin Borich Express and Mondo Rock. Guitarist Kevin Borich, the other founding member, played with the La De Das in the late 60's and formed the Kevin Borich Express in the early 70's. Richard Harvey is best known for his drumming with the Divinyls for five years, but has also toured in the States with Joe Walsh. Alan Lancaster formed Status Quo in 1962 and was instrumental in writing and producing all their singles and albums which have sold in their millions over the years. John Brewster has recorded eight albums with the Angels, cowriting and producing most of the songs, and lead singer John Swan (who just happens to be the brother of Jimmy Barnes) has had many chart successes in his 16 singles and five albums.

All are very ambitious, together aiming to be the major musical force in Australia as well as getting attention overseas.

Wellington's Six Volts are a six member band, who, with a great array of unusual and interesting instruments, have developed a unique style of interpreting many styles of music - from comic opera to early jazz and 60's pop to country swing and cool bossa nova. Their repertoire includes some humorous and often twisted versions of notorious pop songs (such as the Star Trek theme), as well as many originals.

Originally called the Four Volts, they have added two new members to their lineup. They all draw from diverse musical backgrounds, one being a trained opera singer, others with a jazz or rock grounding, and some involved in experimental groups, together creating a unique style. Six Volts have recently released a highly acclaimed album, 'Something's Burning' on Braille records, and they have received high praise for their part in Downstage's festival production of the Threepenny Opera.



Campus Radio BFM (91.8FM) will be broadcasting the Six Volts performance live-to-air from 8pm on May 12th.

NEW WAVE COLOUR

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




OUTDOORS MAN:

Welcome to another column in which I seek to keep you informed on where your student fees are spent. Please write in to Craccum if you have any questions.

The Typesetter:

In June 1987 we purchased a new typesetter for \$46,198. The old typesetter was in need of repairs (c\$5000), and some people believed that it was an oppropriate time to purchase a new one. It was argued that AUSA would be able to do more outside contract work and gain income for your Student Association. A figure of \$20,000 per year was suggested - the idea was that the new machine would pay for itself in 3 years.

The machine is of middle size - larger than Campus News or Craccum requires because it aims to do outside work. Due to administrative problems it ran at a loss of \$2788 last year. Some people believe that it is a white elephant. Others believe it can still run at a substantial surplus. I fall in the latter category simply because we are stuck with it. The resale value would be low, because there is a small market for machines of this type.

I therefore believe the best action to take

is to maximise income from the hachine we have. This is the course I am pursuing. No student fees were spent on the machine - it was funded by special trusts that are used for capital purchases.

Because of the concern expressed over this item, and the Women's Enquiry, I intend to move the following policy motions at the Winter General Meeting which shall bind the Executive. If you are really concerned about your fees, you should turn up to discuss these motions which seek to give ordinary students more control.

That expenditure on projects which AUSA has never engaged in before in excess of \$10,000 (adjusted for inflation) be approved by General Meeting or referendum, provided that failure to achieve a quorum for a General Meeting shall be treated as approval.

That expenditure on capital items in excess of \$30,000 (adjusted for inflation) be approved by General Meeting or referendum, provided that failure to achieve a quorum for a General Meeting shall be treated as approval.

Please write in if you want to discuss this, or any other issue. I'm afraid I've run out of space for this column, so you'll have to wait until next week for more information on what's happening with your money. (If you can't wait, write to Craccum asking them to give me more space!)

SRC REPORT APRIL 27

This weeks meeting got underway with the SRC Chair elections. I got only one vote. Angus managed 86 votes and Fiona got 112 votes and SRC Chair. Graham then passed the chair to Ms Stevens, who had to pass it back to Graham because of calls for a division. This was turned down because Fiona had a good majority, and so the chair was passed back to Fiona.

Her first motion closed nominations for positions on the Teaching/Learning Advisory Committee and the Education Committee. Trish Shaw got onto the latter, and no-one was nominated for the former. Nominations are now, I believe, open for positions on the Teaching/Learning Advisory Committee and the Student Union Management Committee see the new SRC Chair in her office (Rm 112a).

Once again, there was no big fuss with the affiliation of clubs. No one even asked any questions. Then the chair was passed back to Graham (why did he bother resigning?).

The first order of general business was that guests should have to give their name and address to and show ID before they can get into Shadows. Concern had been raised after a woman's attacker turned out to be a guest in Shadows. They've had a bit of trouble tracing him, and it was found that some people had given false numbers.

Wally pointed out that some non-students were well known to Shadows staff, and compulsory checking would delay people going in. Alan Parker (AVP) was worried that possible attackers could get women's addresses from the register, and he pointed out that if staff had a student's name then they could track down his/her guest anyway: students are responsible for their guests.

The motion was then amended to give the staff discretionary powers, and shortly afterwards the motion was carried, with Alan's dissent being recorded.

The next motion was for a referendum on the continued existence of Womenspace. Wally thought that there should be discussion on it as it was not highly used. Some one commented that there was not a lot of common room space around.

It was said that the women who used it weren't witches and wanted to escape from the male world. In a very entertaining speech, Paul McD Gourlie likened doing away with Womenspace to doing away with love and said that we guys should keep Womenspace so that we can go on thinking we're great without worrying about women taking over the world.

In his reply, Wally said that we should discuss it in a wider forum where 2,000 could vote instead of 150. The motion was lost.

The next motion (Hackshaw/Bush) was that a 'Wallyspace' (a small, dark room without a power point) be established and that Wally be required to stand in it from 12-4 on Wednesdays. Graham complained that Wally was always niggling about rules etc and Graham was sick of it, Wallyspace wouldn't take up much room and wouldn't use any power. Anyway, Graham hadn't had a good rave in a year. Wally didn't mind the personal attack, but was disappointed that there would be no discussion on Womenspace, and Wayne didn't really have anything that he could say. This promising motion was then found to be unconstitutional (all members of the AUSA, Wally included, have a right to attend SRC).

Finally awards: chocolate fish went to Graham, Beatle Treadwell (WRO) for being nice and never having had one and Paul Turner ('give me one for being secretary').



CAREERS EXPO 1988 NOTICE TO ALL 1988 JOB SEEKERS

CAS has now put together the annual CAREERS EXPO programme. It runs throughout the second term from early June through to mid August and provides an opportunity for students to talk with prospective employers and gain specific job information. The CAS registration form is used as the basic Resume. This form should be neatly filled in, using black pen as it is photocopied and given to every interviewer with whom you have an appointment.

The current market puts a greater pressure on students to investigate job prospects in greater depth and over a wider spectrum. It is necessary to adopt a determined and persistant marketing campaign. It is pointless to be a passive applicant. You are the product and the University produces fine products - Market your potential completely !!!

Any application should begin with research. The first step is with yourself. Make decisions about what you want to do with the rest of your life. How well are you equipped for various employment areas? What do you enjoy doing? And equally important, what do you dislike doing? Make a list of your skills and identify career possibilities and alternatives. Consider the occupations where you can maximise your attributes and consider the organisations that offer such employment.

The next stage is to find out as much as possible about these employers. Look through Annual Reports, In-house Magazines, Financial Pages of the Newspapers, CAS files, and talking with people associated with the various organisations. With an increased awareness you will be better equipped to attend the interviews and participate in a full and positive manner. The staff at CAS can help - use the resources available to you.

PROCEDURE





BOOKS

GEOFFREY THE TUBE TRAIN AND THE FAT COMEDIAN

By Alexei Sayle and Oscar Zarate (Methven \$19.95)

Versatile chappie this Alexei Sayle. When he hasn't been making bicycle ads, he's been making life hell for The Young Ones as the Balowski family, starring in films like Gorky Park and the forthcoming Siesta, conquering the charts with Ullo John! Got a New Motor and Didn't you kill my brother? and not winning the Booker Prize for Train to Hell. And, now with Geoffrey the Tube Train and the Fat Comedian, he has launched his first foray into the comics medium, accompanied by Argentine artist Oscar Zarate.

Geoffrey is a deceptively complex, ambitious piece of writing. On one hand, it is an affectionate but sardonic tribute to such endearing children's illustrated books like Thomas the Tank Engine (Sayle's prose is marvellously biting 'The Southern Line went from Quelch Park in the north, where all the kind white people with the new German cars lived... to Paxton in the south, where all the nice black people with the old British cars lived.') but on the other hand, it is a savagely autobiographical account of the fat comedian's frustrations over not being able to ply his trade because of a court injunction brought against him by his former managers. (Particularly side splitting is the torrent of abuse he unleashes against an unsuspecting board of advertising executives as he takes advantage of the common abuse law which states that while you may not call somebody a liar or a cheat in public, you can call them a wanker which results in the inevitable 'A comedian dying is a horrible thing. A comedian dying in a confined space is a doubly horrific thing.') The two story lines eventually converge in true Dennis Potter style as the comedian decides to write a children's book and ends up turning detective as a series of inexplicable, gruesome murders are committed upon the Southern Line. (Absolutely priceless is the scene where Sir Jimmy MacTaggart, 'a very important person,' is electrocuted while taking a piss on the live rail.) The comedian applies all his grey matter to discovering a connection between the bizarre murders and eventually the truth dawns upon him 'Suddenly, a flash, like in all the best detective fiction... The connection came to me... All of them had been complete wankers' which I'm sure is meant to bear great philosophical ramifications.

Geoffrey does not contain the non-stop, outrageous gags that you might expect from Sayle, instead its humour is more subtle and subversive, perhaps more reminiscent of Monty Python than The Young Ones. It is, in fact, a brutally funny satire of English society which Sayle sees as rapidly disappearing down the toilet under Thatcher and no facet of the British rat

race from show business to advertising and London transport emerges unscathed. (A highlight has to be 'Widdicombe on Moped,' a 'Lost Horizon' style utopia where time stopped at 1964 'We've got no immigrants, we've got birching, public hangings, pubs close at ten. No pop music. Smashing, eh?')

And, I shouldn't forget Sayle's partner in crime, artist Oscar Zarate, who previously was known best for his comic book adaptations of Othello and Dr Faustus. Zarate's art blends especially well with Sayle's prose and he displays great versatility as he illustrates the colourful, hellish, multi-cultured pandamonium of London and the disturbing idyllicness of the storybook sequences with equal aplomb.

Geoffrey the Tube Train and the Fat Comedian is perhaps the most accomplished work Sayle has done in his erratic career and the assurance he displays with the comic book medium show him to be a natural. Anyway, I better go before I start prattling on about how it is really nice to see a comic book in such an attractive package from a respected publisher and how it proves that not all comics are for kids...

BOOKS

SPYCATCHER

Last year I reviewed 'Spycatcher' for Craccum without having read the book, so I thought that justice would be served by taking a second look through eyes that have now had the benefit of seeing most - if not all - of Peter Wright's pages.

They are a good read, especially if the topic of espionage fascinates you, as it does me. Anything one says now is bound to be old hat a symbol that Wright lends himself to in all the photos, looking a bit like a Mexican bandit with his wide sombrero. Perhaps the hat has become a symbol for his fight against the British establishment, personified by Mrs Thatcher whom he has called 'a bitch' with some acrimony when his royalties were being held up because of all the legal actions, initiated by the Attorney-General here and elsewhere. Our own Court of Appeal finally decided we Kiwis could read the book some four shopping days before Christmas, almost 5 months after the Dominion published its first extract and was banned. The main reason we were allowed this doubtful privilege was because of the extent to which Spycatcher had already been published around the world, 'achieving a unique position of notoriety', in the words of the Court of Appeal's President, Sir Robin Cooke. Reading Spycatcher when it's legit is rather like smoking a

joint when the day comes that marijuana is decriminalised - it takes the thrill of being caught

What then is in the book for us NZ'ers. Well, first up, our own fledgling SIS was hatched out under the eagle eye of Sir Roger Hollis who Peter Wright says was the fifth man in MI5, coming at the end of the long line of defectors paraded in his book - McLean, Burgess, Philby and Blunt - being the Cambridge chorus line. Hollis may have been codenamed 'Ellis' by the Russians, according to Wright, and as there's no 'H' in Rus sian this sounds a bit too close for cryptanalysts' comfort. If Hollis was a Russian mole, then our own SIS was infiltrated almost from the moment of its birth. Brigadier Gilbert - its first director - went to London in 1957 and lived in with MI5 at its main HQ in Beaconsfield House. The tricks of the cloak and dagger trade were passed onto him by the dab old hands of Hollis/Ellis. It will be remembered that the Brigadier later infiltrated our own uni with a spy/student who got booted out when his cover was blown. But the Brigadier expressed no apology and felt we were an anarchistic bunch who badly needed to be surveilled.

From these dubious beginnings the SIS grew to its present prominence. You will no doubt recall that in 1985 there were 13 French spies within these fair shores of Aotearoa. They may have covered their tracks with mince and the odd frogman's suit, but not a murmur about their presence was passed on by the SIS anti-terrorist centre to the police, though they had briefings about the French presence back in May 1985 from British Intelligence (see Phillip Knightley's excellent book - 'the Second Oldest Profession' at p382).

Wright's long standing member-

ship of the second oldest profession probably converted him into a full-time paranoiac with reds under every bed he sat upon (or slept in) - thus the mole hunts that have characterised the last 2 decades within the British Intelligence service. They were in the best traditions of the Stalinist purges of the 30's, even if not quite so many heads rolled. Even in the 1960's there was quite a backlash. I lived in London then and worked for a firm of solicitors who acted for quite a few members of the establishment. Profumo was caught out lying to the House of Commons in 1963 and we had to draft the statement that led to his demise. His other crime was to share a prostitute - Christine Keeler - with a Russian spy called Ivanov. Also in 1963 our firm acted for a man called Martelli - an atomic scientist who was the first man to get off a charge under the Official Secrets Act up to that time. As an articled clerk, he had to organise the buying of sandals in Italy which had hollowed out heels. The prosecution had suggested this was standard equipment for a spy to wear to conceal microfilm in. The defence showed that anyone could walk into a shoe shop in Milano or any other Italian city and buy some. The case collapsed and I even think we got costs which is an unusual step. So it was interesting to read Peter Wright's account of this same case from a rather different angle, since he believed our client was as guilty as hell. The trial was in July '63, just before the Profumo scan-

dal made world headlines. Wright's trouble was the fact that he was a kind of inverted snob who enjoyed hob-nobbing with the establishment and holding secret meetings at the various clubs around London to which members of the Service all belonged. Indeed, the service itself had a club-like atmosphere which didn't even allow for a long time that its members should be positively vetted - a step that Wright first himself instituted with the purges of the 60's. At about the same time I worked in GCHQ at Cheltenham, being a Russian linguist caught up by National Service which still existed in England in those distant days and so was at one of the nerve centres of MI6. I was not impressed by what I saw. Security was very lax and soon after I left the service, the George Blake and Portland Spy ring cases showed up the penetration by the Russians of our own Intelligence network. Wright perhaps was not wrong in trying to change this club-like mentality but he had an uphill battle. In the end he declared: 'After years of being the hunter I felt myself to be the hunted'. He became infected with the paranoia of others, like the Russian defector Golitsin whom he personally took under his wing and whose theories on disinformation he espoused. Golitsin was even allowed to study the files of the JSSL (Joint Service School for Linguists) where I had been taught Russian and how to spy on them. So maybe my personal details have ended up in the KGB files anyway.

The world of espionage is a sad rather seedy one on the whole. Wright and I have one common origin - both coming from the county of Essex, but there the resemblance ends. 'Peter, you're too emotional', he was once told by Hollis. It was his gifts as an elecinto the Service. Recruited from Marconis in Great Baddow, he was

instrumental in setting up the bugging equipment in Lancaster House that eavesdropped on successive Commonwealth conferences in which NZ participated and no doubt spoke, when the dissolution of the Empire was the main topic on the agenda. The same skills led to the entrapment of the Portland Spy ring and in particular a couple calling themselves Helen and Peter Kroger whose cover was as antiquarian booksellers from New Zealand. The one interesting fact to emerge about them from the trial is that they spoke with good old kiwi accents. The Krogers turned out to be American communists recruited by the KGB but Michael Parker in his book on the SIS suggests that they had been living in NZ some time before the ring was set up in London. The SIS may even have a file on them - who knows???

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Wright's problem in the end was that he knew too many secrets and he was also short of money. He sold some of them at first to Chapman Pincher who published the Hollis mole theory in 'Their Trade is Treachery'. But the man who held the secrets too close to his chest no longer had broken a golden rule that offended against the secret code of his club. He had betrayed secrets and his treachery was not going to pass without censure. Thus the long legal battles and the relentless opposition of the iron lady. Because Wright had been recruited from outside the Service. he never got his full pension. He went to live in Tasmania beyond the range of the Official Secrets Act, but the British law has a long arm - it stretches even to this farflung outpost. He has started a trend many more memoirs of Spycatchers will no doubt follow - but none as infamous as his. Try to get them from the library - it's a lot cheaper.

If someone put a rubber stocking on their arm, carefully painted it, stuck eyes on it, with a handpuppet type mouth, do you think it would look like a fearsome snake? No, neither do I but the Sidaris family seem to think it's a great idea - more about that later.

HARD TICKET TO HAWAII is probably the worst thing RCA have EV ER released - they've gone beyond mere barrel scraping and moved into the realms of corpse reviving. The opening credits are astounding pieces of paper stuck on the boxes (and fork truck!) that the 'actors' are moving around, one of which contains the aforementioned arm-snake with a sign saying 'Warning - Toxic Snake!'

The principle characters are two female couriers whose uniform consists of mini-skirt, copious quantities of blondish hair and white cowboy boots! They unwittingly intercept a smuggled diamond shipment (on a model helicopter) and when attacked produce kung fu stars from their cowboy boots (and notice they pull them out of their still living victims!) After flying home one says 'After a day like this it's good to be home' - when the villains return empty handed to their boss he calls them 'dummies'.

Suffice to say the rest of the story involves 2 secret agents, a skateboarder and plastic mannequin who gets killed by a bazooka, an evil arch villain (hopelessly overacting), some totally irrelevant football interview scenes and an extended shoot out. Often descending into tackiness the 2 females are constantly taking their clothes off for no apparent reason. Anyway the climax of the film is where one of the women is attacked by a bad guy - she stabs him, hits him, shoots him with a speargun etc. Then while barricaded in the bathroom the arm-snake explodes up through the toilet but it's OK cos one of the male dudes crashes through the wall on a motorbike and blows its head off with a 4 barrelled bazooka.

This film was written and directed, and co-ordinated by Andy, Arlene and Christian Sidaris respectively - obviously providing evidence of some sort of genetic brain defect, unless its a bold attempt at creating a new wave of artistic cinema - but I doubt it. Take heed of the blurb on the slick 'To get to paradise they'll have to go through hell' except don't expect too much paradise. Watching this film with others means you'll be constantly turning to stare at each other in wide eyed disbelief.

If you can put up with the sleaze this film is mindbogglingly hilarious (the censor has cut out the gory frisbee scene - a good move). 'Where the hell did that snake come from!?" 'Would you believe, up the toilet!?" Dramatic pause. 'Just when you thought it was safe to take a pee!?'

As well as the finished painting, the 92 working paintings and sketches will also be displayed, giving an idea of the planning and work involved in the process of such a large complex painting.


Completed back in January, this will be the first time this has been displayed. The accompanying paintings and sketches will be return-



ed to the artist in Germany once the exhibition closes but the painting will remain part of the Gallery's permanent exhibition.

'Readymade de l'histoire' is a large composition, measuring 1.5 by 1.75 metres. It is full of references to German history and art history. Organiser of the project, Andrew Bogle, describes Immendorff's art as 'expressing the' political and social realities that since the second world war have moulded the modern German ethos. His inimitable bravura brushwork, pictorial inventiveness and figurative style of painting make Immendorff's pictures a visual smorgasbord.'

The painting represents a celebrated haunt of past artists. writers and intellectuals seated in the Parisian Cafe Flor, in front of a greatly detailed historical backdrop. Included in the painting is the doven of the avant-garde movement, Marcel Duchamp, to whose work this painting makes direct reference. Alongside are celebrated expressionist artists Otto Dix, Ernst Ludwig Kirchner and Max Beckmann. These artists, along with other leading avant-garde artists of the 1930's suffered public ridicule and ostracism by Hitler's Germany, but together fought for the survival of German art. Joseph Beuys, Immendorff's late friend and teacher from the Dusseldorf Art Academy and Immendorff himself are included in the scene.



Dear Craccum The Student's Dilemma? How to respond. Nicola Patchett (Craccum, April 19) has strong personal views on animal experimentation, and I applaud her efforts in airing such views. These are issues which should be addressed. However, not all medical students hold her views. There is a wide range of opinion within the student body. For example, many people signing her petition specified agreement with certain clauses only, especially clauses 2 & 3 (not mentioned in her article) which did not condemn animal research per se. These clauses suggested technical modifications to specific ex-

periments. Others didn't agree with the petition at all. The fact that only 40% of the class signed suggests that more than half the class did not agree with the views she put forward. It is for these people I hope to

Nicky's objection to the 'dog lab' stems either from a belief that it is a source of suffering, or that the animal is put down unnecessarily. Does the animal suffer? Catherisation is a common technique in hospitals. It is carried out on patients anaesthetised in much the same way as the dogs were. If the technique caused suffering, it would not be carried out. Maybe she objects to the dog being put down by injection afterwards. But if so, surely she would save more lives by turning her protests against the S.P.C.A.? What people imagine and react to when they hear of 'animal research' and the reality it entails are often vastly different.

In answer to the question 'why such secrecy?' I feel that the recent firebombing at Greenlane Hospital has shown the inherent dangers of being too 'up front'. The 'nutters' are not the concerned members of the public, who have every right to know what goes on and why, but radicals who would use 'animal welfare' as a means to other ends. Anarchy pour is NZ and all that.

Consistency is a feature of any strong moral stance. Much of what we know in modern physiology is based on the results of animal experimentation. Therefore to criticise as cruel and unnecessary all animal experimentation, and then to spend a large amount of time learning facts derived from it could be deemed hypocritical. Obviously, a line is drawn between carrying out experiments and 'compromising our moral values', and using the results of such experimentation and escaping with morals intact. A fine line indeed. The dilemma facing us goes beyond 'learn physiology or fail'. The crux of the matter is 'learn physiology or inflict, through ignorance, unnecessary suffering upon your patients'. It may be cliche, but the understanding research has given us really has greatly reduced human (and, through vet science, animal) suffering.

I hope you will consider publication of this letter to show that the animal ethics issue is not simply a 'staff vs. students' problem, but is a major dilemma of interest to all involved in medicine. I have considered at length the questions raised and remain convinced that essential research with a minimum of suffering is a worthy goal. My cat agrees.

My name is Ella Henry and I am your new Student Parent Resource Officer. (What? You didn't know you had one?) Part of my job is to be available to all student parents on campus, with regard to your studies or any personal problems, ie child care/health/budgeting, hassles with Government departments (Social Welfare, Family Benefit etc). I also act as liaison between you and AUSA or the University, and disseminate information that may be of interest or use to you.

For instance, are you all aware that there are two creches, situated behind the Commerce Department at 30 and 32 Wynyard St, which provide excellent care and are a good meeting place for student parents? It's the place where we commiserate about such earth shattering events as our children's development, the problems of inadequate parking, the rigours of combining parenting and study, and our latest test marks. This support network is invaluable in this large, seemingly impersonal institution. If you haven't yet, why not come down and see the place and meet the staff?

The creches often need someone to relieve at short notice when staff are ill—those with child care qualifications are preferred. Also, regular part time staff (mornings or afternoons) are needed.

Qualifications such as primary or kindergarten teacher, Childcare Certificate or Playcentre Supervisor are required for these positions. For more information contact Elaine McCulloch at the creche or by phoning 737-755.

Those already using the creche will be pleased to know that now that routines have settled there are study hours available for children over two. As usual, the places available for under-twos are very limited. Enquire at the office. It's only by keeping creche usage up that we can hope to keep creche fees at a tolerable level.

ISRAEL: S. AFRICA

Dear Craccum,

I agree with Stevens and Shindal, it is unhelpful to draw parallels between Israel and South Africa under the apartheid rubric. But it is quite inaccurate to deny, as they do, that there are historical and military links. These links are well-known and publicised in both countries, but little remarked on in other Western countries where these matters are politically embarrassing.

South Africa was the first country to accord Israel de facto recognition in 1948 when its government in fact sent food, medical and other supplies to the nascent state. The first Nationalist Government accorded de jure recognition and its Prime Minister Malan was the first western head of government to visit Israel in 1953. At the time of the Anglo-French-Israeli attack on Egypt in 1956, South Africa permitted army reserve officers to serve in the Israeli army and lifted exchange control regulations to allow South African Jews to transfer

In 1967 the Vorster government again relaxed currency controls to enable the transfer of funds - to the tune of \$US20.5m int he first week of the war. At this time Die Burger, recognised voice of the South African government, editorialised that Israel and South Africa, being both engaged in a struggle for existence, had much in common which should be utilised rather than denied. In pursuance of this, an Israeli-South Africa Trade Association was established at the socalled 'millionaires' conference' in Jerusalem 1968. In 1973 the leader of the SA delegation to the ISATA conference announced a scheme to use their economic collaboration to evade trade sanctions against SA by AFrican states. Three years alter, Prime Minister Vorster visited Israel to conclude an agreement on economic, scientific and industrial co-operation which included the setting up of a Joint Ministerial Committee. The agreement made special provision to allow South Africans to invest up to \$US60m in Israel. At the time South Africans were not even allowed to invest in the US or UK. Semi-finished products are imported from SA, finished and re-exported from Israel, as a means of avoiding embargoes on SA products and to increase SA penetration of EEC markets.

Military intelligence co-operation between SA and Israel is of similar long-standing and has been of vital importance to the apartheid state. Israel has built for SA long-range fast warships equipped with Gabrial sea-to-sea missiles and Kaffir jet planes together with the supply of advanced electronic equipment. Between 1976 and 1987 Israel was a substantial supplier of and conduit for the transfer of naval, armoured, electronic and counter-insurgency equipment. All of which is fully-documented. Reports, including claims made in the Knesset, indicate that Israeli army personnel have been attached to the SADF as instructors and observers and that the facility is reciprocal

None of this has anything to do with the often virulent anti-semitism of many Afrikaner leaders. Nor should it detract from the heroic opposition to the apartheid state by the many members of South African Jewry who have suffered solitary confine ment, torture, death and exile at the hands of that state. Denying the alliance and the strategic imperatives and western insterests which underpin it is, however, just plain sloppy and does nothing to advance the cause of conflict resolution in either the Middle East or Southern Africa.

I am an engineering student. The move by the A.U.E.S. to obtain more of the monies which engineering students pay by way of A.U.S.A. fees can be viewed in any way which you choose. It would, however, be unwise to view such a move as being an isolated occurrence.

It should be remembered that university students continue to pay ever-increasing amounts of money for their tertiary education; this trend is not likely to abate. It is, therefore, in the interests of students, either now or in the future, to become more concerned about all of the costs of their education. This means that the action of the A.U.E.S. is not likely to be an isolated event on the N.Z. campus scene but, more likely, it is probably an indication of things to come.

N.Z. is in the midst of economic and social disarray. The 'bottom' line has now become a very important consideration of almost every business. As you stated in 'Craccum', April 12th 1988, p 11, A.U.S.A. is partly involved in running businesses so it should be concerned about the current economic climate. In particular, there is no concrete reason why A.U.S.A. should be immune to the current economic realities; it may well have to accept income cuts in either the immediate or mid-term future.

An important point to remember is that a reduction in the A.U.S.A. income will probably force the Association to reconsider what its prime functions might be. This should be ultimately reflected in the services to students which remain after income cuts. Surely this cannot be entirely deleterious; after all, it is possible to maintain an essential core of services to the bulk of students even with income cuts.



These are Mark (70-75 AD), Luke (70-90 AD), Matthew (80-100 AD), and John

The actual authors are completely unknown and each had more than one author who were in turn separated in time.


